

## Six Homes To Be Open for Tour

Among the homes open for the tour is that of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Hudson, 349 Windsor avenue. This contemporary home is one year old and is built around an oak tree growing in the patio. Doors from the main parts of the house open onto the patio.

The homes of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Lovejoy and Dr. and Mrs. J. W. Burba are located on Old Military road. They are both situated high on a hill with a spectacular view of the valley.

The Lovejoys built their home four years ago with the idea of incorporating their view of mountains and timber into their home. The large native stone fireplace depicts this plan. The stone was obtained from the Eagle Point area.

Dr. and Mrs. W. G. Bishop's home at 2425 Nieto Way was only recently completed. The living room is hexagon shape with a large floor to ceiling palos verde stone fireplace. The family room also has the stone fireplace and is part of the modern kitchen. The light fixture in this room is of particular interest. Suspended from the ceiling in different heights on white electric cord are six black tube shaped lanterns inserted with colored glass which reflect the different colors when lighted. Two bedrooms, a den, and three baths complete the house.

The home of the R. W. Grays, located on Cherry lane with a view off the valley and the Siskiyou mountains to the south, is of contemporary ranch design. The Grays "saved ideas" for many years before building the home and incorporated many of these into the plans. The living room has a very large fireplace, and large picture windows which frame the view. Mrs. Gray collects ruby and other antique glass and china which are used throughout the rooms.

Also open for the tour will be the home of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur R. Dubs, 2249 Dellwood avenue, which was designed and built by Mr. Dubs, who is a contractor. This ultra-modern home is given a comfortable, rustic appearance by the grey lumber and

stone exterior and the interior was designed with family living and entertaining in mind, since the couple's three children are still small. The Dubs have lived in their new home for less than a year and are still working out landscaping and furnishing details.

## Jacksonville Couple Recall Wedding Day 50 Years Ago

Jacksonville - Fifty years ago on May 19, 1909, Miss Lola Fairking, daughter of John and Francis Fairking, Crescent City, Calif., and Isaac Coffman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Coffman, Rich, were married by Justice of the Peace Henry G. Dox in the parlor of the United States Hotel, Jacksonville.

The ceremony was performed by oil lamps. The bride wore a white dress with pink accessories and flowers.

Guests included friends and relatives near enough to make the journey to Jacksonville.

Following the wedding a reception was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Goldby on the Little Applegate. Mr. and Mrs. Goldby drove the newlywed couple there in a two-horse two-seater fringed top surrey. The evening's entertainment included a country style charivari.

Looking back and recalling the details of her wedding and early days of their marriage Mrs. Coffman remembered that she and 'Ike' made their first home at what was known then as the Ryan house. The building, of brick, is still in use and located next to the late Amy Dow residence.

Mr. Coffman was first employed by one of the town's first doctors, Dr. Thomas W. Hestor at Hilltop Orchards. Dr. Hestor had the first automobile which came to Jacksonville in the early days, a Reo in which the Coffmans recall taking a "first ride".

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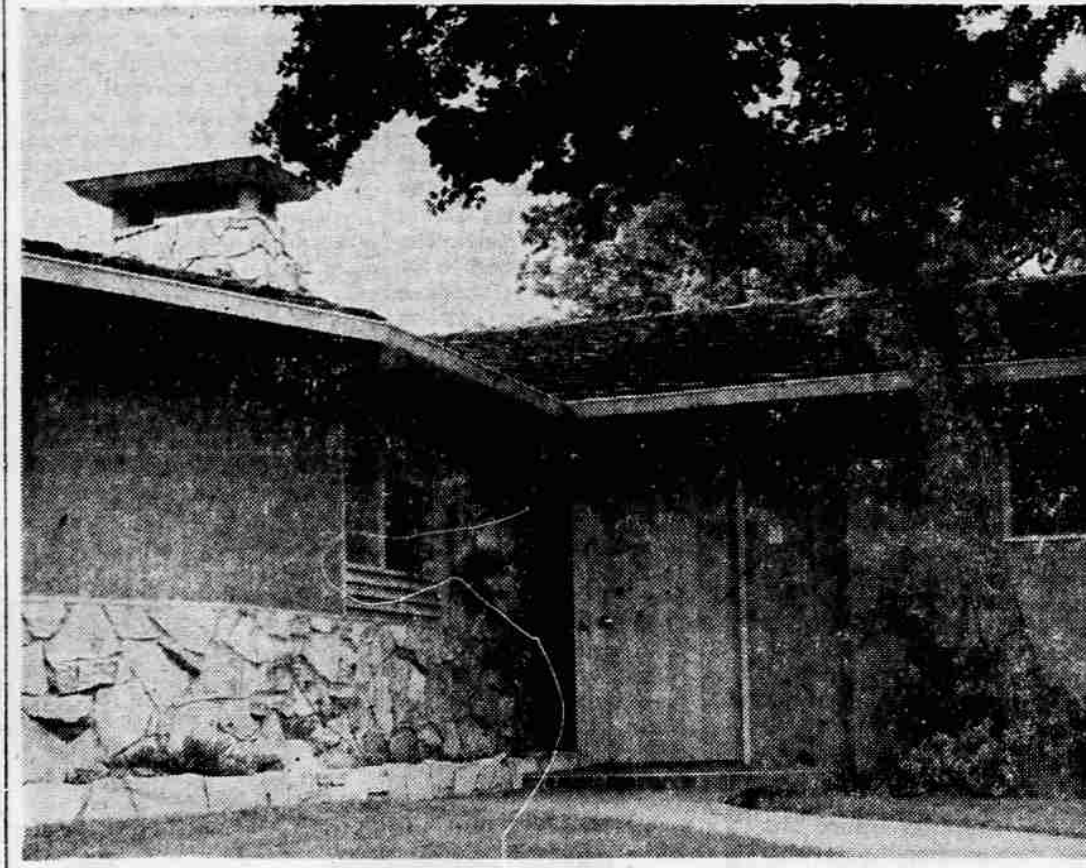

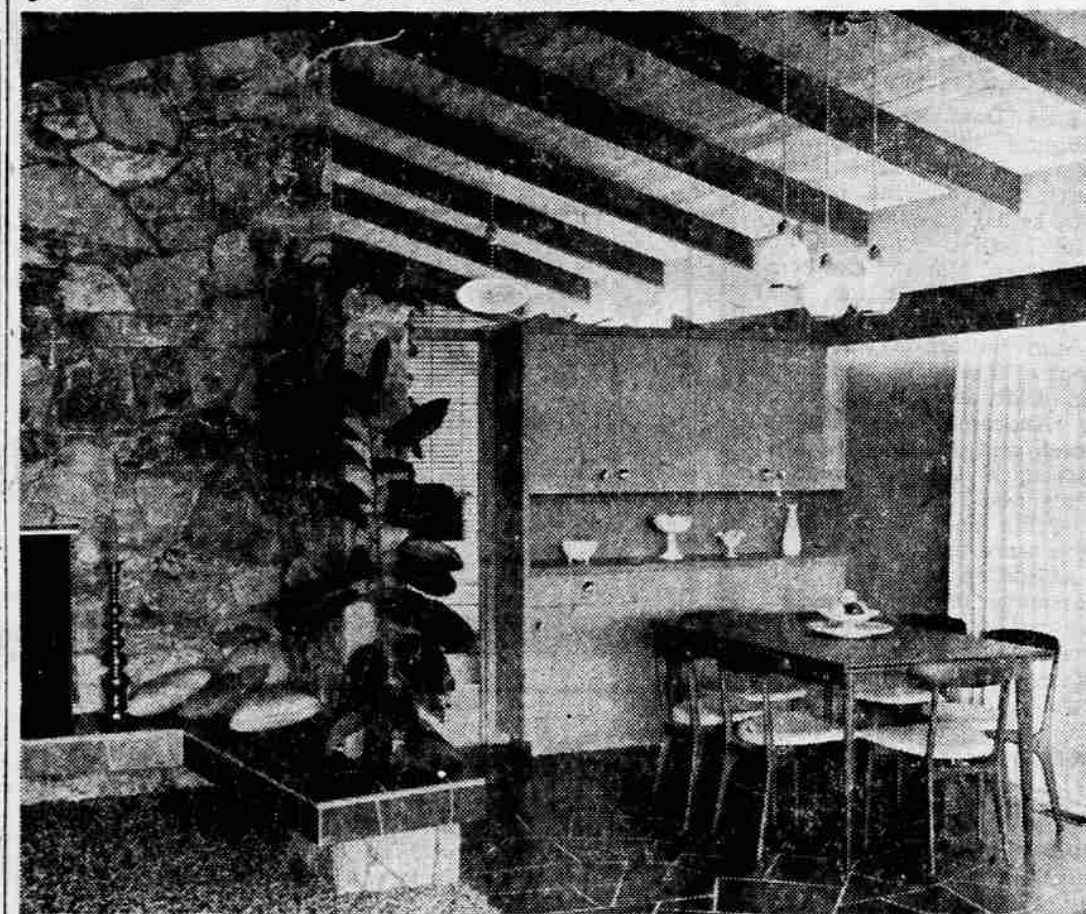

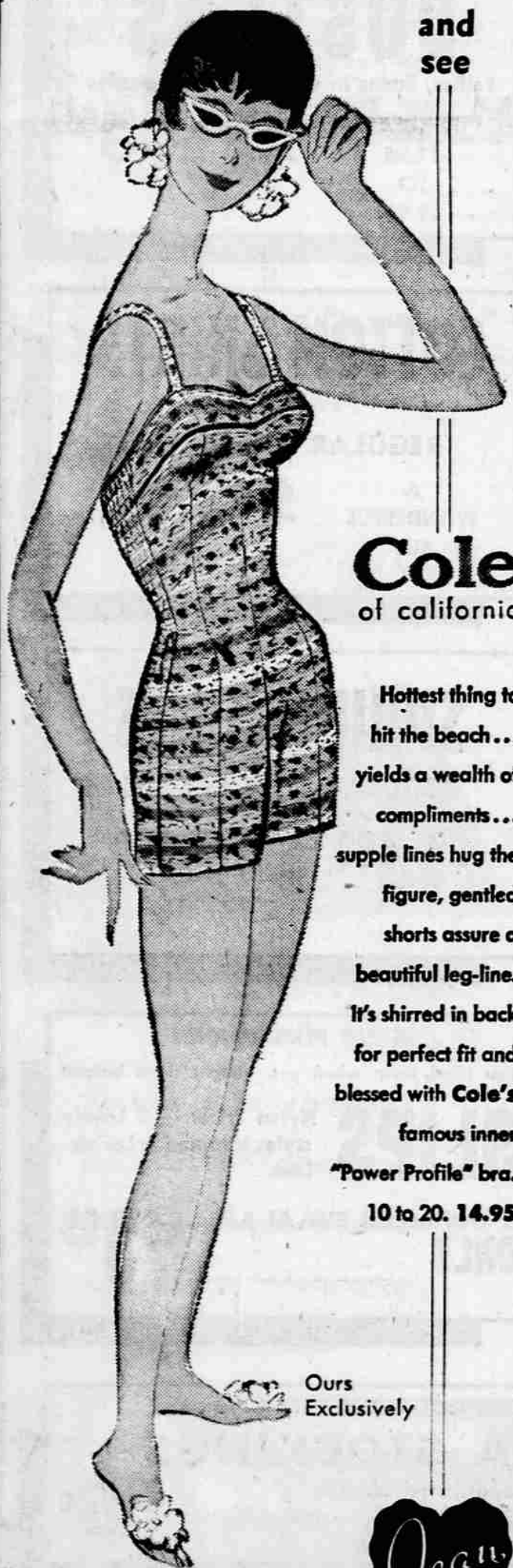
