"Acting was destroying me," said Diane Varsi when she took son Shawn and fled to Vermont, leaving behind a skyrocketing movie career.

Why Diane Varsi

The shockproof town of Hollywood was shocked. Its newest star, Diane Varsi, nominated for an Academy Award last year and on her way to glittering heights, had packed her bags and taken off for some place called Vermont. Even more incredible to Hollywood was her determination never to return.

Many newspapers and magazines sought to interview Miss Varsi, but she agreed to tell her story only to Family Weekly's Hollywood correspondent, Peer J. Oppenheimer. Here, then, is the exclusive story of why this talented but unhappy girl quit the movies.

I VISITED DIANE VARSİ in her sanctuary, a barren apartment in Bennington, Vt., and while the plumbing dripped, radiators banged, and her baby, Shawn, romped, the star who ran away from Hollywood poured out her heart to me.

She unfolded a story of lifelong unhappiness, frustration, and crises, and when I left Bennington two days later I felt I understood what she hopes to find in New England and Bennington College.

In Vermont, Diane sees a refuge of self-discipline and solidity. Here good and evil are strongly defined. Puritanism may be gone, but a firm belief in God and the triumph of hard work and humility are still apparent. To Diane, a young but soul-scarred veteran of many Hollywood cure-alls, these simple truths seem like the newest of revelations.

You can tell this by the way she talks about her childhood. The most happy days, she says, were spent in a convent school where she was disciplined and given a goal more important than selfish success—serving God. But these were only two years of a growing period in which "modern child-rearing" dominated.

Her parents were determined that Diane mature without inhibitions and with her own "individuality." Permissiveness and fragmentary education produced a young woman without inhibitions all right—but without much else, either.

Bewildered and purposeless, she left school at 15 to become an apple picker, sales girl, model, waitress, and assembly-hand in a candle factory. Then she pinned \$25 to her slip, packed a sleeping bag and some groceries, and hitchhiked to Glamourland. In her case, this turned out to be a drafty shack in the Hollywood hills.
