Few States Left Without Sales Tax
Chicago—UPU—If you live in Nebraska, New Hampshire or Texas, you're one of the vanishing breed of Americans who pay neither a retail sales tax nor a broad-based state income tax.

The Federation of Tax Administrators reports that 30 states now tax individual incomes and 33 have a sales tax, although only 18 have both.

The FTA also counted up 35 states with a tax on corporate income. It said every state taxes gasoline and motor vehicles and that all but Virginia, Oregon, North Carolina, Colorado and California maintain tobacco taxes.

As for liquor, the 47 states where sales are legal—Oklahoma and Mississippi are both "dry"—all levy a tax on each bottle.

New York—UPU—Stocks advanced today although late profit taking pared gains. The rails again helped to spark the advance, carrying that average to its best level since early August, 1956.

There were some good gains in the main list, especially in the drug group. The chemicals, steels, and some of the electronics also featured the upside, while the oils and motors ran into some difficulties.

Bristol Myers was strong on favorable Wall Street comment. At its high this issue was up more than 4 points. American Home Products ran up more than 6 at its best in the drugs and Vick was up 8 points before running into profit taking.

Police Saves Man Then Arrests Him

A Medford patrolman saved a man's life Saturday night and then arrested him for being drunk in public.

The patrolman, Dennis Perkins, reported spotting flames under a Southern Pacific railroad loading dock at Front and Ninth sts. Investigating, he discovered Russell Bruce Jackson, general delivery, just waking up amid blazing cardboard and pieces of wood.

Perkins fought the flames with a fire extinguisher from the patrol car while Jackson crawled to safety. Perkins called the city fire department to assist in putting out the fire.

Jackson reportedly told him he and two other persons had crawled under the dock to sleep. Someone apparently had started the fire to keep warm, but the others were not around when Perkins arrived.

Jackson was then arrested for being drunk in public and was lodged in city jail over the week end. He pleaded guilty to the charge in city court today and received a five-day sentence.

Hatfield Signs Several Measures

Salem—UPU—Gov. Mark Hatfield signed 50 bills today including the \$40 million budget for higher education and the \$39 million budget for the State Board of Control.

Travis Cross, the governor's press secretary, said he did not expect any vetoes until later this week.

There has been considerable speculation that the governor would veto the bill abolishing the Board of Control which was passed by the 1959 Legislature.

The three-man Board of Control now runs state institutions, but under the new bill, the governor would appoint a director of institutions to coordinate state activities in this field.

Water Resources To Study Proposal
Salem—UPU—The State Water Resources Board plans its June meeting to take up Portland General Electric Company's proposal for Round Butte dam on the Deschutes river.

The next meeting of the Board probably will be held June 28 and 29.

The State Hydroelectric Commission held a two-day hearing last week at Madras on the proposal for a 440-foot, \$71 million dam. State Engineer Lewis Stanley said the Commission turned the matter over to the Water Resources Board after the hearing. The Board will decide whether to issue a state license.
