Phoenix Students Receive Awards in Academics and Sports at School Assembly

Phoenix - Awards to students who were outstanding in academic and sports fields were made recently when Phoenix High School held its final award assembly.

Faculty members made the presentations.

Award medals were presented to Mary Cole as the outstanding senior; Margaret Ann Bolz, girls' activities; Don Korth, boys' activities; and Tom Troxel, student body president.

New members of the National Honor Society, who were initiated earlier in the year, were recognized by giving them Certificates of Membership. New members are Susan Walker, Dana Halaas, Jack Hoffhuhr, Douglas James, Nancy Stewart, Joyce Hunter, Eldon Mitchell, Karen Golding and Bill Rasmussen.

Mathematics Award

Mrs. Mildred James presented awards from the mathematics department. Virginia Martin received a bronze medal from the Mathematical Association of America and the Society of Actuaries for placing first two years in succession in her school in the national mathematics contest. She received a pin from the same associations for winning first place in the 1959 contest. She also won a pin in trigonometry for placing highest in the cooperative plane trigonometry test.

Pins for placing highest in the cooperative advanced algebra, plane geometry and elementary algebra tests were won, respectively, by Gail Glidden, Roger Kelson and Stephen Kessler. Both Gail and Roger are second time winners.

In this year's elementary algebra test, Stephen Kessler placed in the 99th percentile with the highest score yet obtained since the tests were started three years ago. Forty per cent of the elementary algebra class placed in the top decile and 92 per cent of the class placed in the top half of the class.

The deciles were compiled from scores made by 15,000 students in 130 public secondary schools.

Art Award

Eldon Mitchell was the recipient of the art award given to the art student best able to apply his artistic talent.

Homemaking awards for the most outstanding homemaking students in each class were awarded by Miss Catherine Carter to Mary Cole, homemaking 3; Virginia Daugherty, homemaking 2; and Kay DeMers, homemaking 1.

In first year typewriting pins were awarded by Mrs. Donna James to Marian Troxel, 55 words, and to Patsy Stout and Joyce Stockstill, 60 words. Certificates of proficiency were presented to 8 others.

Don Learn received a 70 word pin, while Nancy Stewart and Pat Kidwell received 60 word pins in second year typing. Certificates went to four students.

Short-hand Pins

Three pins were awarded in shorthand. Darlene Palmer received the 90 word dictation pin in first year shorthand, and Pat Imhausen and Margaret Ann Bolz received the 120 word pin in second year shorthand.

For her work as editor of the year book Sandra Skinner received an editor's pin and Lola Good received a business manager's pin.

In journalism Lorene Stephenson was named the outstanding journalist of the year by Mrs. Mable Sims. This award was based upon reporting initiative, reliability, enthusiasm and loyalty. Eldon Mitchell received the business manager award and Lorene Stephenson the library assistant award for two years of service.

Forensic Speaking

Hypnosis will not work for everybody. At least one out of ten patients cannot be hypnotized at all and one out of six will not go into a sufficiently deep trance for major surgery.

Furthermore, hypnosis doesn't cure anything. It is only a therapeutic aid. (The concluding article in this two-part series on hypnosis will appear in tomorrow's Mail Tribune.)

Applying Suggests Program to Help Business Climate

Portland - (UPI) - Oregon Secretary of State Howard Applegate Jr. Monday suggested a five-point program aimed at creating a better business climate.

In a speech prepared for delivery to the Chamber of Commerce here Applegate said businessmen bear the major share of the blame for a trend toward a welfare state economy. He said business leaders had done little to counteract drifts toward more individual dependence on government.

Study of Problems

His suggestions included:

1. Undertake a day-by-day study of business problems coupled with positive, constructive action to solve them.
2. Create better understanding by everyone of the nature of businesses and how political issues will affect lives and pocketbooks.
3. Speak out on current political issues vital to public interest.
4. Make decisions at the point where varied interests of customers, employees, investors, suppliers and others come together; don't take an interest in political and governmental affairs as a mere counterforce to union power.

Back Candidates

5. Give active, aggressive backing to political candidates "of your choice."

Applegate said that in his opinion businessmen had been "the most apathetic and indifferent of any segment of our society in active support of good candidates."

"It is not sophisticated to remain independent of politics. It is just plain naive," he said.

High School Seniors May Apply for Loans

Eugene - A letter explaining loan opportunities for high school seniors wishing to enter the University of Oregon has been sent to all Oregon high school principals.

Loans are available from funds provided under the National Defense Education Act of 1958.

Graduating high school seniors are required to be in the upper one-half of their class scholastically to be eligible for loans. The maximum available for a one fiscal year period is \$1,000.

According to the terms of the act, special consideration will be given to superior students who intend to teach in elementary or secondary schools, or students who are preparing in fields of mathematics, science, engineering, and modern foreign languages.

REDS DETAIN GI

Berlin - (UPI) - Three American soldiers drove into East German territory and were held temporarily by Communist authorities, the East German news service ADN reported Monday night. The agency said the soldiers, two sergeants and a corporal, were turned over to West German border police after "checking of circumstances."

HYPNOSIS IN MEDICINE

"You are very tired and you want to sleep. The room is quiet and you feel your muscles relaxing as you listen to my voice. My voice is soothing and it makes you want to sleep."

The obstetrician continues talking to his patient. Within a few minutes the young woman is in a deep hypnotic trance. An orderly wheels her into the delivery room as the doctor prepares to deliver the baby.

After the painless delivery is completed, the doctor awakens his patient and presents her with the tiny infant. This mother has given birth to a child without suffering hours of labor pains - thanks to hypnosis.

A relatively short time ago, an obstetrician who used hypnosis in childbirth would have run the risk of losing his reputation and hence his practice.

Controversial Phenomenon

Hypnosis has been one of the most controversial phenomena in medical history. It has been scorned by leading medical authorities as the weapon of evil Svengalis. It has been labeled by many as the device of frauds and fools.

Medical experts today are working to prevent hypnosis from falling into ill repute and disuse as has happened periodically since the time of Franz Anton Mesmer and his theory of "animal magnetism" of the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries.

Revived and rejected in turn through the years, hypnosis now stands at the threshold of a bright and glorious future in medical science.

Lewis R. Wolberg, a psychiatrist of international reputation, has likened hypnosis to a prostitute who, once having been involved in illicit affairs, continues to be rejected by society even after she has turned from her wicked ways. Eventually she returns to her old haunts. In spite of the efforts of medical men, hypnosis has had a difficult time shaking its "stage show" past and association, in the minds of many, with the supernatural and occult.

Seeks Respectability

Recognized by the American therapeutic aid for doctors and dentists trained in its use, hypnosis is now making a desperate bid for permanent respectability.

The most dangerous foe of hypnosis is ignorance. Amateurs encouraged by such sensational hypnotic bunkum as the "Search for Bride Murphy" have mastered the techniques but not the understanding of the complex phenomenon on which they have been able to induce in willing or unwilling subjects as the case may be.

Hypnosis has a wide variety of uses in medical science. Probably the most common application of hypnosis is in psychotherapy. It is considered an aid which enable the psychologist or psychiatrist to work with the deeper levels of

the personality structure without making lengthy, time-consuming psychoanalytic sessions necessary.

Although the normal techniques for psychoanalysis sometimes achieve more lasting results and are more predictable, they are also time-consuming. Some psychologists use a combination of hypnosis and psychoanalytic techniques which is known as hypnoanalysis.

Advantages Told

Hypnoanalysis make it possible to speed up the therapy, but also gives the patient necessary insights into his unconscious problems which enable him to work out a long-lasting cure with the help of the psychoanalyst.

The personality in the hypnotic state is "softer and more moldable than one in the conscious state," according to Dr. John G. Watkins, chief clinical psychologist at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Portland, Ore.

Watkins says that "Through the use of suggestion, motivation, and insight under trance, changes in behavior can be effected which would be very difficult to accomplish in the conscious state."

"Abreaction" is a particularly valuable technique of the hypnotherapist. Of major importance in the treatment of war neurosis during World War II, abreaction is the reliving or re-enacting of traumatic experiences in the trance state. This provides an outlet for the repressed feelings and gives the therapist an opportunity to study the reactions in an effort to effect a cure.

Re-education of attitudes through hypnosis can be startlingly effective in giving the patient with speech difficulties added confidence and relaxation as he is treated for his problem. This method is generally considered superior to the technique of direct suggestion known as "symptom removal."

Temporary Aid

In symptom removal the patient is given a direct suggestion to quit stuttering, overeating, or smoking, as the case may be. In some cases this will work but generally it has been found that a permanent cure can be achieved best through examination, understanding, and treatment for the underlying causes of the disorder rather than through merely removing the symptoms temporarily.

When effects rather than causes are treated, the patient runs the risk of developing a substitute disorder. In the case of smoking, for example, the suggestion to quit smoking might cause the patient to develop an excessive appetite.

Hypnosis is used successfully as an anesthesia in dental surgery and obstetrics and in some cases used in lieu of drugs to relieve the pain of organic disease. It is effective in speeding up post-operative recovery and is even used in the treatment of such disorders
