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14 Holders of GI Insurance Reminded of Premiums

Veterans with GI insurance should be careful not to let premium payments turn into a "race period," S. T. Brannock, contact representative of the contact office, VA Domiciliary, Camp White, said today.

Over 5,000,000 veterans now hold GI life insurance, Brannock said. About 60 per cent of this number save time and money by paying their premiums in advance, either annually, semi-annually, or quarterly.

More than 1,000,000 veterans have adopted the plan of using their regular annual dividends to guard against loss of their insurance. Brannock said the VA will hold dividends, with interest, as a credit to pay any premiums the veteran forgets to pay or can't pay on time.

Premiums Deducted
Veterans who also receive pensions or compensation may have their insurance premiums deducted from their monthly pension or compensation checks.

But this leaves another sizeable number who pay month by month, all to often in the 31-day grace period, after the premiums actually are due. Some have done this for so long they apparently don't believe the VA reminders that are mailed out to

those who habitually fall behind the real due date.

Too often it happens that these men have the wrong date so fixed on their calendars, a date actually that is well into the grace period, that when an emergency arises and they can't pay at the time they planned, they find themselves in trouble.

Getting a payment in before the policy lapses then becomes a race with the real deadline, a race that can prove costly to the veteran if he loses.

Brannock gives this advice to all veterans: "Get into the habit of paying all premiums when they are due, or before. The grace period of 31 days should be used only in times of emergency, not every month."

Godfrey Believes 'Escape' Complete

Washington - (UPI) - Arthur Godfrey said today there is every reason to believe that his escape from cancer "is now 100 per cent complete."

Godfrey, who underwent surgery April 30 for lung cancer, wrote to a Senate appropriations sub-committee to urge increased federal funds for cancer research. His letter was made public along with the prepared testimony of medical experts.

The radio and television entertainer said that "surely, a crash program of cancer research is as important today to America as similar projects now being pursued by nuclear fission missiles and space scientists."

"I hope the Senate will realize, of course, that I ask this in the interests of millions of our fellow Americans, not for myself," Godfrey said.

"The prayers of my friends were answered in the fortunate fact that the cancerous tumor in my lung was discovered and removed in time, and as a result there is every reason to believe that my escape is now 100 per cent complete."

Housing Industry Missing Good Bet

Marshalltown, Iowa - (UPI) - The housing industry is missing a good bet by not making it as easy for the home owner to trade in his old house as a motorist does his automobile, according to electronics manufacturer John W. Norris.

Norris isn't sure exactly how this can be done. But he said the need is so great, there is bound to be a way and it's up to realtors and bankers to find it.

This, in turn, would help boost the sales of electric appliances such as air conditioners and automatic dishwashers.

But Norris also pointed out that easy trade-ins would help the increasing number of American families who are being transferred from one part of the country to another, and must dispose of their homes in a hurry.

Clothes Help To Tell About Job

East Lansing, Mich. - (UPI) - Clothes may not make the man but they help other people tell about his job, social status and habits, according to a Michigan State University social scientist.

"We recognize the factory hand by his work clothes, the executive by his suit and the student by his slacks and sweater," Dr. Arthur M. Vener said.

A survey in a Michigan community showed persons who have "come up in the world" are more aware of clothes than those who remain in one economic and social group all their lives, Vener said.

Castro Party Found Unharmed In Cuban Swamp

Havana, Cuba - (UPI) - Maj. Raul Castro and a party of three, missing in a small plane since Tuesday, were rescued safe and unharmed from a mangrove swamp on the south coast of Cuba today.

The plane, which for a while was feared to have crashed, was sighted by aerial searchers on the ground of southern Matanzas Province in a pouring rain this morning. The aircraft's undercarriage was smashed, but it was otherwise undamaged.

Rescued by Speedboats
Because of the bad weather, aerial rescue was impossible. But four navy speedboats, dispatched from Batabano in southern Havana Province, reached the scene and picked up Raul and his companions.

The Castro plane had crashed about 150 feet inland from the coast of Ensenada de la Broa, a small bay on the borders of Havana and Matanzas provinces.

The plane was first sighted by the pilot of a Cubana Airlines plane, one of many thrown into an intense aerial search for the missing men. The search effort was directed personally by Premier Fidel Castro, who had flown from Havana to Batabano and boarded a speedboat to the scene.

The party included besides Castro—who is commander of Cuba's armed forces—Maj. Martin Barona; Capt. Ferrer, Raul's pilot; and Maj. Majon, the co-pilot.

Clatsop To Talk Civil Defense Plan

Salem - (UPI) - Three top state civil defense officers will meet with Clatsop county CD leaders in the Astoria courthouse Thursday morning.

Representatives of the leading cities in Clatsop county will meet with them to discuss plans for a county-wide civil defense organization.

The mayors of Astoria, Seaside, Warrenton and Cannon Beach will be represented at the conference.

Indians Had Harsh Name for Lake

Minneapolis - (UPI) - The Chippewa Indian word Winnibigishish means filthy, bad, miserable, wretched water, and is the name of a Minnesota lake.

The Chippewas weren't always that harsh in their descriptions. Their language is sometimes called the Italian of the Indian language because of its musical quality.

For example Mississippi is a Chippewa word meaning Great River. Saganaga Lake in northern Minnesota takes its name from its many islands. Mahnumen, a Minnesota community, means wild rice in English and Chisago Lake means large and lovely.

The Sioux Indians also contributed their share of titles to Minnesota. The name of the state means sky-tinted water. Minnehaha, made famous by Henry Longfellow, means laughing water. Minneapolis is a combination of the Sioux word for water and the Greek word for city.
