Fresh Vegetables Shipped To East

San Francisco—(UPI)—A new service provides direct air shipment of fruits and vegetables to the East Coast from farms in California's rich San Joaquin valley.

The field-ripened produce is packed in "sky vans" of 600 pounds capacity. The cases are picked up by helicopters of a Stockton, Calif., firm called Calicopters and flown suspended under the whirlybirds to San Francisco International Airport.

There, the vans are dropped off beside a waiting airliner, which flies them across country. Another helicopter hauls the produce to the heliport nearest the consignee.

In a recent test, a shipment was delivered at the White House less than 20 hours after it was picked and packed at the farm.
