10 Years To See End of Poverty

New York—(UPI)—In 10 years real poverty will disappear from the United States and the image of work as something manual and tedious will be fading rapidly, according to Fortune magazine.

The magazine said that in 10 years millions of Americans will be "making a living" without actually working and nearly half the families will be in the upper income brackets.

The article, by Sanford S. Parker and Lawrence A. Mayer in the June issue, said the nation is "now entering an astonishing new phase of the great economic revolution that has transformed U.S. society—and the U.S. market—in the last few decades."

Perhaps 25 million adult Americans will be living without working due to retirement incomes "substantial enough so that Americans will be largely free of the old fear of destitution in their late years."

Families now in the lower income brackets will be moving up the economic ladder in such fashion that the upper income brackets will embrace nearly half of the people in the United States.

Monorail Answer For Los Angeles

Los Angeles—(UPI)—Mile-a-minute Monorail mass transportation has been described as the answer to Los Angeles' crowded freeways and slow surface transportation.

William H. Statler, chief of Advanced Research at Lockheed's California Division, told a special meeting of county government and transit officials that his company has designed a 60-75 mile per hour air-train design that could travel overhead, on the surface or even underground.

Statler said monorail would be able to provide mass transportation at high speeds and still cut the cost of other transportation systems.

M. L. "Les" McMahon, the bureau's merchandising manager, reviewed the work of the bureau's nine merchandising representatives located in various parts of the United States. He said the West Coast representatives made a total of 7,125 personal calls on the trade. He said 119,108 auto miles were traveled by the representatives and averaged 16.7 miles per business call.

Promote Pear Nectar

Representatives were also from Oregon State college and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. W. A. Sistrunk, food technologist from the college pointed out that tests showed that D'Anjou and bosc winter pears could be used as well as Bartlett's in making pear nectar, which is becoming a popular drink.

He said pear nectar and pineapple juice is getting good acceptance. However, in tests to find an Oregon product to mix with pear nectar, Sistrunk said, it appeared that pear nectar mixed with either raspberry or cranberry juice was best for flavor and coloring.

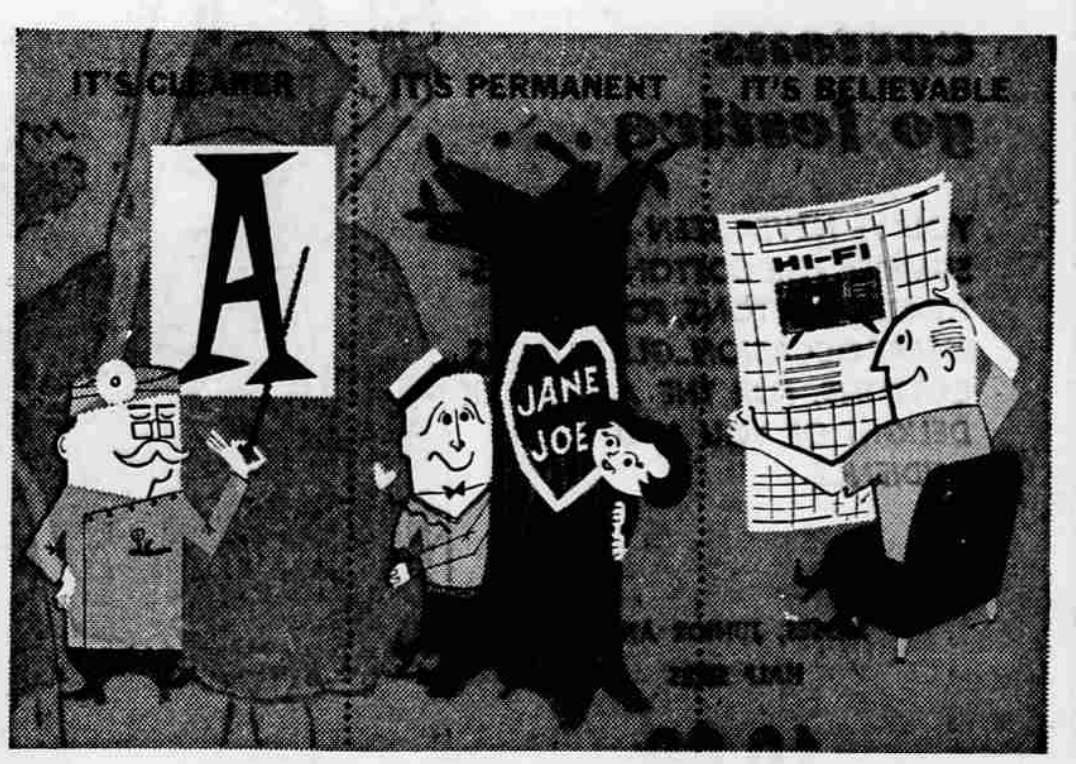
