Youth Repudiates Murder Story

Portland-UPB-Partic David Smith, 15, has repudiated his confession to the slaying of an elderly woman in a variety store just southeast here earlier this month, his attorney said Tuesday.

Smith has told his attorney, George Van Hoomissen, his priest and his parents he is not responsible for the hammer-knife slaying of Mrs. Minnie Swetland, 75.

The youth said he found the body in the store and became "panicky" and fled. He said he was playing with a

knife on the day of the slaying but had thrown it into Johnson creek.

A hearing on a motion to have Smith's case brought before Juvenile Court rather than before the regular criminal courts will be argued in Oregon City Wednesday before Judge Ralph D. Holman.
