

Alaska Senator Sees Prosperity In Power Projects

Seattle—UPI—Sen. E. L. Bartlett (D-Alaska) Tuesday called low-cost power the sky hook by which the 49th state can pull itself up to prosperity.

Bartlett was the keynote speaker at the opening session of the 16th annual convention of the American Public Power Association here.

The Alaska Democrat said that when the President presented his budget for fiscal 1960, there was revealed a proposed policy which to him symbolized the faint interest of the administration in public power development.

"No New Starts"

"Around Washington, we call this 'no new starts' policy," Bartlett said. "The President proposed that there be no new starts in construction of public works projects—and no new starts in the study and planning of such projects."

Construction and planning already "in the pipeline" would go ahead—but in many cases on greatly decreased levels of activity.

"This, of course, is said to be necessary to balance the budget. I consider it sheer folly, particularly as regards planning feasibility studies."

Projects Pay Own Way

Bartlett maintained power projects should not be put off to "balance the budget." Such projects, he said, produce revenue and pay their own way.

Alaska has a gigantic hydroelectric power potential, Bartlett said. Greatest of its potential sites is the Rampart Canyon site which lies north-west of Fairbanks on the Yukon river. Rampart would provide a prime power supply of some 3,750,000 kilowatts with an installed capacity of about 5,000,000 kilowatts.

Women Claimed To Naturally Hear Better Than Men

New York—UPI—In the most thoroughly scientific measurements or normal human hearing ever undertaken, it was shown that women just naturally hear better than men.

Why they should and how they can were not explained, but it seemed to be a fact.

Furthermore, it is normal for hearing to decline progressively with age, but it declines less in women than in men. The decline starts with the high-frequency or high-pitched sounds and spreads downward to the low-pitched sounds.

All this measuring of what is normal in hearing was done by Dr. John F. Corso, of Pennsylvania State University, and you may be surprised to learn how important measurements of normal hearing are in this extremely noisy age we live in.

Industrial workers work in an atmosphere of noise. Residents within a few mile radius of airports complain of the roar, and even the dishes on the shelves in farmers' homes are rattled occasionally by jet planes.

Legal Problems

Countless claims for compensation for hearing loss due to these and other noises are being filed around the country. Judging whether there has been actual hearing loss and then judging whether the loss, if any, was caused by noisy environment rather than aging are all but impossible tasks unless you have precise measurements of normal hearing for men and women at different ages. Corso's measurements supplied this need.

He measured the hearing of men and women in these age groups: From 18 to 24; from 26 to 32; from 34 to 40; and from 42 to 48. How he figured who had normal hearing for his or her age is interesting. They were closely examined physically, of course, to make sure their ears and interior hearing apparatus were normal. Then they were sorted by the following:

Any man who had had six months or more of military combat or 30 hours or more of military flying was considered unlikely to have normal hearing. The following categories of circumstances were set up as possible impairments of normal hearing:

Residence of six months or more within one mile of an active airport; regular travel by subway, train, or plane for one year or more; a job in a "fairly noisy" or noisier place for six months or longer; indulgence in the hobbies of hunting or motor-boating for six weeks or more a year for three years or more.

Any person who fell within three or more of these categories was a "fail" so far as the presumption of normal hearing was concerned.

Five Years Used

The measurements were of the sharpness with which the men and women heard pure tones ranging from 250 cycles per second to 8,000 cycles per second. In all there were 500 subjects and Corso and his assistants needed five years to make the precise calculations which are now published by the Acoustical Society of America.

Corso was struck by how consistently women heard better than men through all age groups, and there was much less variation in hearing sharpness from woman to woman than from man to man. He also was struck by the slight difference in the hearing ability of the left and right ears of his subjects. He could say one ear was as good as the other.

Tootin' Sendoff Due Centennial

Portland—UPI—A whistle-tootin', jet-age sendoff will mark the opening of the Oregon Centennial Exposition and International Trade Fair at noon on Wednesday, June 10, according to plans.

Civil defense air raid sirens, factory whistles and church bells will signal the start of the 100-day event at the Centennial grounds in north Portland.

Jet aircraft will fly over the grounds. Local radio and television stations plan a five-minute program celebrating the opening.

Gov. Mark Hatfield will give a short address. Governors of neighboring states and other dignitaries will be present.

Raymond Burr, who plays Perry Mason on television, will be master of ceremonies. Hatfield will press a button which will set off a rocket barrage. Then there will be a 100-gun salute. The first six shots will be fired by six men who fired a gun salute at the start of the Lewis and Clark Exposition in 1906.

Centennial officials expect attendance at the 100-day event to range between two million and four million people.

Close Watch on Russ Fleet Urged

Washington—UPI—Sen. Ernest Gruening (D-Alaska) Tuesday asked the Navy Department to keep a "close watch" on a fleet of Russian vessels he said is operating near the Aleutian Islands.

In a letter to the department, Gruening said the size of the Soviet fleet is "variously reported as between 25 and 50 vessels."

"I think it is extremely important that the Navy keep a careful check on the movements of these vessels and that regular reports be made on them," Gruening said.

The Senator said that fur seals soon will start their migrations to the Pribilof Islands, near the Aleutians.

It is important that our authorities be vigilant in preventing any pelagic open-sea sealing," he said.

"For years this was the function of the Coast Guard but in recent years there has seemed to be no danger that foreign powers or poachers would violate treaty agreements. Now, however, with a Russian fleet in these waters, vigilance is essential."

Gruening asked the Navy to give him a "full report on the present whereabouts of the Russian fleet and the number of their vessels."
