# Many Corporations Unable To Get Cream of College Grads

New York—(UPI)—The season is on for recruitment of college graduates by America's corporations.

This year the supply probably will exceed the demand. But many a corporation is going to find that it has been unable to get the cream of the crop.

The reason for that inability to lure the college graduate lies in the fact that the par-

sonal company didn't build up a good image of its business—an image that would have been recognized by the college graduates.

This is the theory of public relations expert Philip Lesly, head of the company which bears his name.

Lesly conducted a survey among college seniors and public relations experts. He reported that companies with the best corporate images are the ones that the job seeker feels he would like to work for.

**Wrong Things Stressed**  
The biggest company in the group won top place and both groups picked it. And there was no much difference in the whole list of choices—11 of them.

**Key Factors**  
Here are Lesly's conclusions: Size of a company is an im-

portant but not deciding factor; being in an industry that lacks public sympathy is a handicap; vagueness of name is a serious detriment; being close to the consumer combined with advertising of products is a distinct advantage.

The most common reasons given by college students for their number one choice was the reputation of the company, size, opportunities for advancement, business leadership (including research, public relations, employee relations), knowledge of products,

and family's attitude. The Lesly survey concluded that "there is a close correlation between the corporate image of a company, as

attested by experienced and objective observers and the attractiveness of that company to the future executives it needs."
