Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) said Wednesday he would oppose the bill. Porter said he had no intention of sponsoring the national seashore bill in the House as Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) has done in the Senate. He also said he would not "go along" with any drive to get the measure passed in this congressional session.

Railway Express Office in Hills Plans to Close

Yreka - Southern Pacific company and Railway Express Agency, Inc., have been granted permission by the Public Utilities commission to discontinue their Hills agency and consolidate it with the Yreka office.

The PUC also announced this week that a public hearing will be held in Dunsuir city hall next Wednesday to consider an application of the express agency to close its Dunsuir office.

The decision to close the Hills agency was based on reports of decreased numbers of trains passing through Hills since construction in 1927 of the shorter SP route from Black Bluff to Eugene via Klamath Falls.

Two trains have been going through Hills daily since Passenger service on the Shasta Valley-Medford route was dropped in 1952. The PUC found that express volume in and out of Hills in 1958 amounted to only 58 parcels with \$225 revenue.

The agency cost \$6,311 in 1958, according to a hearing April 14 in Hills and transferring elsewhere would cost only \$400, with net annual savings of \$5,911.

The commission said Fruit Growers Supply company, shipped and received carload freight worth \$220,665 during the year, but can seal its own cars and place bills of lading in a box at the station for train conductors to sign.

The Hills station stands on property granted the Oregon-California railroad by congress in 1866. It was acquired by Central Pacific railroad in 1870 and the station is believed to have been built in 1887 when the railroad reached Hills.

According to state police, the Thorne vehicle was traveling north when it made a left turn into a private drive in front of a southbound coupe operated by Alexander Joseph Austin, 27, of route 4, box 369B, Medford.

A third vehicle following the Austin car collided with it following the accident, police said. It was operated by Robert Charles Buckles, 37, of 2327 Charles Lane, Medford.

Pattern Seen for Lumber Industry

Portland - (UP) - A tentative agreement has been reached between two unions and Georgia-Pacific Corporation which could set a pattern for the rest of the big Pacific Northwest Lumber industry, it was reported today.

The agreement calls for a package plan which would give total benefits of 20 1/2 cents an hour over a two-year period, a company spokesman said. The unions involved are the International Woodworkers of America and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers. John S. Brandis, vice president of Georgia-Pacific, said the agreement with the IWA included a general wage increase of 7 1/2 cents an hour effective June 1.

Soviet Diplomat's Wife Asks Asylum

London - (UP) - Mme. Nina Dmitriev, 35, a Soviet diplomat's wife who escaped to freedom with her five-year-old daughter, Lena, hid today from the secret agents she outwitted while the British government studied her appeal for asylum.

Asylum is granted almost automatically in most cases. Her husband, Capt. Aleksandr Dmitriev, the assistant Soviet naval attaché, was returned to Moscow late Wednesday by security agents aboard a Russian jet. There were two empty seats, for the mother and the daughter. Madame Dmitriev apparently eluded the Soviet agents Saturday after they had seized her husband, a long-time London resident.

125 Hail Stations Are Established Throughout Area

A total of 125 hail indicating stations have been established in the Rogue River valley so far, according to Judson Parsons, of Hillcrest orchards, local director of the hail research program.

A total of 400 stations have been planned for location in the valley to determine the density and pattern of falling hail stones.

Meanwhile, Parsons said he needs about 20 hail collectors - people to gather hail stones following a storm and preserve them for research. These volunteers should call SPring 3-4779 between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m., Parsons directed.

"I would prefer people along main traveled roads, and wish to have them distributed throughout the valley," Parsons explained. "They should be people who would be at or near their homes all the time - probably housewives."

The Medford Pear Shippers' association, co-sponsor with the Oregon State college extension service, will provide the baskets and oil with which to gather and preserve the hail. Collectors are asked to provide containers such as coffee cans or soup cans in which the hail can be placed in oil and put in either a deep freeze chest or in a freezing compartment of a refrigerator.

The announcement was made last Wednesday that the Rogue valley hail research program had been started. The pear industry is interested in the effect of hail on pears and how practical a continuing hail suppression program would be. The forest service will observe hail occurrence and lightning during storms in relation to lightning caused forest fires.

Boys at McLaren Stage Small Riot

Salem - (UPI) - Officers of McLaren school for boys were in Salem today to check with the district attorney the possibility of preferring charges against seven boys at the school who staged a small riot last night.

Superintendent Amos Reed of the Woodburn institution said that in subduing the riot, two boys received superficial scalp injuries along with security officer Donald Barrett, Woodburn.

The disturbance was in Benson cottage, the maximum security cottage at the institution.

Reed said that the seven started the rumus about 6 p.m. by breaking arms off a dozen chairs and pounding out 10 heavy windows. They persisted for about an hour before Reed ordered that fire hoses be turned on them. School officials then rushed the boys and subdued them by force.
