Trout Season Opens Full Scale Saturday In Rogue Watershed

Grants Pass—Thousands of anglers need not be reminded by the Oregon Game commission that the trout season opens Saturday for those parts of the Rogue watershed that did not open on April 25.

Cole Rivers, field agent for the commission, reports that streams have been stocked and are in excellent condition for the May 30th opening.

State police today issued a warning to fishermen and picnickers that it is illegal to pick up fawns and to hold and make pets of the young deer. They pointed out that state law forbids removal of the young of game animals from the wilds and that the Oregon Game commission will not give permits to people to keep such animals. Police said that, while fawns often seem to have strayed or to have been abandoned by the mother, the doe is generally nearby.

Fifty-two thousand large rainbow were released to streams of the Rogue system last week. The fish were distributed throughout sections of the North and South forks of the Rogue, of the upper reaches of the Applegate river and Carberry creek, Sucker creek in the Illinois valley, Evans creek, Big Butte creek, Little Butte creek and in 33 places on Rogue river from Laurelhurst bridge near Prospect to Ferry crossing below Grants Pass.

PANCHO SEEMS CERTAIN Phoenix, Ariz. — Pancho Gonzales today appeared a certain winner of the current pro tennis championship tour. The lanky Californian virtually clinched the crown Wednesday night by dropping contender Lew Hoad 10-8, 7-5 before a crowd of 1,100 fans at Paradise Valley Racket club. The win gave the seasoned pro 45 victories to Hoad's 41 in the tour which winds up this week end in La Jolla, Calif. Although Hoad still holds a 15-12 edge over Gonzales, he has lost to other players while Gonzales has lost only to Hoad.

45,000 of these trout are being held at the Butte Falls hatchery for releases in June and July.

The commission again wishes to call to the angler's attention the misplaced brackets on the Rogue river chart in the angling synopsis. Above Marial on the lower Rogue and above Indigo creek on the lower Illinois the minimum size limit for trout on the May 30 opening is six inches just as the regulation has been for the past 10 years. The size limit below these deadlines is eight inches.

Fish lake will open Saturday along other Cascade lakes within National Forest boundaries. The lake was treated for the elimination of trash fish last fall and restocked with fingerling rainbow which have grown rapidly through the winter, but few are expected to be taken over nine inches in length on the May 30 opening. The fish averaged almost seven inches in length in April.

Ice-Free Lakes Cascade pack lakes are ice-free, and most trails into them are open with the exception of an occasional snow drift. The road to Bolan lake was last reported to be blocked by snow about two miles east of the Happy Camp junction.

A few steelhead will be taken early in the trout season with more later in the season from waters of the upper Rogue. Anglers are urged to report fin-clipped steelhead to any game commission employee or state police game officer with a complete description of the fins that are missing.

Much of the success of the steelhead-hatchery program will be judged upon the reports of marked fish taken by anglers. Many of the steelhead planted from the Butte Falls and Bandon hatcheries to the Rogue in 1958 are expected to return this year.

School District Bills Summer Sports Classes

Summer baseball and tennis programs are planned again this year by the Medford School district.

Baseball classes are slated from June 22 through Aug. 6 and tennis instruction will be from June 22 through July 17.

Boys from nine years of age through high school age who live in the Medford district may attend the baseball classes. Those who have graduated from high school prior to June 5 this year are not eligible. The tennis program is open to both boys and girls of school age in the district.

Each Boy Given Chance Medford High school field will be the scene of the baseball activity with instruction and play from 8:30 a.m. to noon Monday through Thursday. Each boy will be given a chance to play on a team.

Players also will be selected for games with other teams of this area. Boys are expected to furnish their own gloves but no boy should stay away because he has none. Baseball shoes are optional.

The tennis program will be conducted Monday through Friday for the five weeks from 7 a.m. until noon. Participants are to bring their own rackets.

A registration fee of \$1 is charged those taking part in each of the programs.

Lee Ragsdale will supervise the baseball activity and Alex McDonald, Frank Roelandt, Don Stroh and John Kovenz will be coaches. Bob Huff will be the tennis supervisor and coach.

Salmon Fishing at Peak In Grants Pass on Rogue

Portland — (UPI) — The general trout season opens Saturday in coastal areas and high Cascade lakes. Anglers should have fair to good success, the State Game Commission said in its weekly report.

Southwest: Spring Chinook angling fair to good in North Umpqua; trout fishing should be good to excellent in North Umpqua between Winchester and Soda Springs and on the South Umpqua between

Myrtle Creek and Camp Comfort; Chinook are in at Winchester bay; Smith river should be good as should Coos and Coquille rivers.

Rest of Rogue river will open Saturday; minimum size limit is 6 inches on the Rogue, including tributaries, above Mule creek and on the Illinois, above Mule creek and on the Illinois, including tributaries, above Indigo creek.

Some trails to Cascade lakes have an occasional snowdrift but all pack lakes are open; salmon fishing at peak in Grants Pass area, but slow on lower Rogue; Chetco, Pistol and Winchuck rivers should be good; Elk and Sixes rivers may be slow.

Central: Deschutes success has dropped off during the past week; the Rainey lake road blocked by snow about a mile from the lake; Frog lake road closed by snow; Campgrounds open and free of snow at East, Paulina, Davis, North Twin, South Twin, Little and Big Cultus, Craine Prairie, Little Lava, Big Lava and Elk lakes; roads blocked by snow into Todd and Three Creeks lakes; East and Paulina expected to be good for still fishing; South Twin should be very good; Crane Prairie also should be good; eastern brook fishing should be good at Elk lake; North Century drive open entire distance; Wickup reservoir fair to good on troll; Little Deschutes and Deschutes both above and below Bend good for fly fishing; Metolius fair to good; Suttle lake fair; if weather improves Odell lake should be good.

Northwest: Tillamook area streams have been planted; Salmon river stocked; Lake fishing in area slow; Lincoln county streams expected to be fair to good; Siletco lake good for trout; Siletco and Mercer lakes fair; upper McKenzie area should be fair; Dorena good for rainbow; upper Willamette good for good catches; most walk-in lakes near North Santiam highway are free of snow; Detroit reservoir fair to good; Elk, Dunlap and Lost lakes prospects fair; Chinook fishing should improve in Stayton area.

Northeast: Umatilla river dropping; south fork of Walla Walla river high and clear; north fork of John Day and Desolation creek high; Grande Ronde river should be good for planted rainbow above Tony Vey meadows; most Walla Walla county streams high; Walla Walla still good; Eagle and Pine creeks should be good for planted trout; smaller creeks in Baker county in good shape; Higgins reservoir good; Unity reservoir also good; upper John Day river good for eastern brook.

Southeast: Malheur reservoir slow; Little Malheur very good for small trout; Willow creek good; Chickahominy reservoir fair for large rainbow; most Harney county streams slow; Deep Creek and Che-waucan river fair in Lake county; Ana river fair; reservoir poor.

Medford won the crown in District 6 and the Southern Oregon conference and North Bend triumphed in District 5.

Dennis Barr will take the hill for the Black Tornado tomorrow with either Gary Wallace or Tom Younker to open on the mound for North Bend.

IOC Rejects Request for Gate Share

Munich, Germany — (UPI) — A world track and field championship meet which would rival the Olympic games for prestige was predicted today in the wake of Olympic officials' refusal to give up a portion of the Olympic gate receipts.

The international federations which control 21 sports had asked the International Olympic committee (IOC) to give them a share in Olympic receipts, since they have recognized the Olympics as official world championships and now need additional revenue.

But the IOC rejected this appeal Wednesday by a 32-20 vote with one abstention.

The particular request rejected was that a surcharge of three per cent be added to the price of Olympic tickets to pay for the expenses of the federations.

May Withdraw

The Marquess of Exeter, president of the International Amateur Athletic federation (IAAF) which rules track and field, said after the vote that he is "afraid" the IAAF Congress later this year will withdraw recognition from the Olympics and set up a rival world championship meet.

Similar plans already have been announced by other federations.

Although some IOC members fearfully forecast that the creation of rival world championship games might be the end of the Olympics in their present form, IOC President Avery Brundage of the United States professed to be unworried.

Brundage said he was confident that more athletes would want to compete in the Olympics than in any rival games, and he said it was impossible to cut the federations in for a share of the gate because then "everybody will come and hold out his hand."
