

### Deaths Mounting From Misuse of Plastic Bags

Baby deaths from plastic bags are mounting steadily despite educational campaigns launched by manufacturers, distributors and the press.

More than 30 infants have suffocated this year with the deadly bags plastered against their faces. The National Safety Council has estimated 100 babies could die from this cause during the year.

Most of the deaths have been from plastic dry cleaning bags which are large enough for children to pull over their heads. However, plastic bags which enter the home as covers for grocery produce and scores of other items have also taken their toll.

At Macedon, N.Y., Howard J. Samuels, president of the Kordite Corp., which manufactures plastic bags, announced his firm has instituted an education program designed to prevent misuse of the bags.

A bill was introduced in the North Carolina legislature to ban the use of plastic bags larger than six inches in width and six inches in length.

Laundries and cleaners at Winston-Salem, N.C., announced they would discontinue using plastic bags for packaging laundry. Similar actions were taken by some cleaning establishments in Chicago, Windsor, Ont., and a number of California cities.

At least three babies have died this week from plastic bags and at least two adults have used the bags to commit suicide.

### Heavy Smokers More Susceptible

Chicago-UPI-Ten times as many cigarette smokers die from lung cancer as non-smokers, according to E. Cuyler Hammond, head of the statistical research department of the American Cancer Society.

Hammond said at a meeting of the National Tuberculosis Association's medical section that the lung cancer rate among heavy "two pack a day or more" smokers was "roughly 60 times as high as the death rate of non-smokers."

He said his conclusions were based on data from three "prospective" studies which substantiated earlier retrospective studies examining possible links between the rising death rate from lung cancer and increased cigarette consumption.

Hammond made the remarks at a symposium on "smoke, smoking and chest diseases" at the NTA meeting and also said it "appeared" that death rates from pulmonary tuberculosis were higher among smokers than among non-smokers.
