

Sea Lion Caves Owners Said Not Seeking To Sell

Salem—The State Highway Commission said Thursday that owners of Sea Lion Caves on the Oregon Coast were not interested in selling the site for \$500,000.

The three owners told Park Superintendent C. M. Armstrong that they made a \$63,000 profit last year and are building an elevator into the caves which they expect to increase business 25 percent.

The Legislature asked that the state investigate the possibility of purchasing the caves.

Armstrong said some 36,000 people visited the caves last August.

The federal government also is interested in the site for a park.

The state will continue negotiations to provide information for the 1961 Legislature.

Armstrong also reported that the proposed Round Butte dam on the Deschutes river would inundate Pali-sades state park. But he said if Portland General Electric obtains a federal permit for the dam, the company will provide a new park higher up.

The company also has an application for the dam before the state hydroelectric commission.

The commission approved purchase of 500 acres in the Thomas Condon - John Day Fossil bed area.

Purchase of 720 acres for the Smith Rock park area along the Crooked river near Redmond also was approved. Armstrong said the view from this point is "quite spectacular."

Feeding the Family

People are Picnicking All Over the Place; It's Done with Paper
Nowadays picnic time is likely to be any time and any place. In fact, we've been breakfast-picnicking right in our sunshiny breakfast nook. The children say that it's a picnic if we use paper plates, dishes and cups. And so it is! Minimum of work—fun for all.

Paper Plates
Plastic-coated, leakproof, wilton paper plates are handsomely patterned for indoor or outdoor use; are high style for steak, spaghetti, other party hot stuff. There are patterns for the great outdoors, ranch-house, barbecues and such; fashionable mosaics for party service and buffets.

There are solid pastel plates and dishes, patterns for children's parties. There are less expensive uncoated hard-surfaced paper plates in gleaming white and in designs; perfect for sandwiches, cookies, cakes and all other non-moist foods. These come in both dinner and snack sizes and in compartmented rectangular tray shape; cost little more than a penny; mighty handy to have around the house.

There's even a "silver service" line, the name for foil-covered paper plates, these for receptions, tea parties.

Paper Cups
Paper cups are basically divided into those suitable for serving cold beverages such as soft drinks and juices and those made for hot coffee. The latter are manufactured in plastic-coated grade and come equipped with handles for holding purposes. Patterns to please everyone.

Cold Cuts - Hot Dishes
Dice bologna or summer sausage and add to a well-seasoned white sauce with cooked peas. Serve over canned fried noodles or steamed rice.

Add diced salami or summer sausage and chopped parsley to creamed eggs.

Instant Mincing Onion
Fast, Accurate, Economical

Our part of the country is far in the lead in the growing and processing of onions for packaging as instant minced onion. Acceptance of this product has been phenomenal but it is not so surprising when one considers that onion is the most commonly used seasoning next to salt. Processors have captured true, fresh flavor.

When a recipe calls for one-fourth cup chopped or minced raw onion - use one tablespoon instant minced onion.

When a recipe calls for raw onion, use one-half teaspoon onion powder for each tablespoon raw onion; use one-eighth teaspoon garlic powder for each clove raw garlic.

Where To Use

Use instant minced onion, garlic and onion powder in sauces, gravies, stews, sandwich fillings, cocktail spreads, soups, salads, salad dressing, meat loaves, casseroles, barbecue marinades - anywhere raw onion and garlic are used.

Where there is liquid in recipe use instant minced onion dry; where none, measure one part instant minced onion into two parts water, let stand briefly before using.

Salad Dressing. Stir one or two teaspoons instant minced onion into salad dressings.

Mashed Potatoes. For new potato interest, heat one or two teaspoons instant minced onion with milk and butter before beating the potatoes.

Tossed Salad. Sprinkle one or two teaspoons instant minced onion over mixed greens before tossing with dressing for crisp, sweet contrast.

Dumplings. Stir one tablespoon instant minced onion and two tablespoons chopped parsley into dumpling batter.

Hamburger Topping
While Dad grills hamburgers, Mom cuts big ripe tomatoes into thin slices, sprinkles each with onion salt, then grated cheese. At serving time, each burger gets topped with these cheesy tomatoes. Or blend and spread with Roquefort or Blue cheese.

Before we get over in the edibles department, we remind you to put in good supplies of paper products, plates of all sizes, cups, napkins. You'll need extra supplies of waxed paper, saran wrap, aluminum foil and other favored time and energy saving items for frequent use from now on.

Whatever the weather, we westerners stretch the summer season just as far as we can; take to the great outdoors right now.

Fryers-Broilers. Twenty six ways of fixing fried chicken, says a book on our desk; all of them and many more probably will be in use as record supplies of poultry continue to come to market. Indoors or outdoors, charcoaled, grilled, fried, broiled, barbecued, hot or cold, poultry makes superlative eating at very low cost. While you're fixing chicken, why not pile it high, hoping to have enough for another meal.

Eggs and Dairy Products. Put in extra bargain-priced eggs for hard-cooking for potato salad, macaroni salad; for stuffing with flavorful "devil" yolks. Plenty of half and half and maybe whipping cream for the strawberry shortcake; extra coffee cream for the coffee drinkers. Some extra good old American cheese will come in mighty handy, along with cottage cheese. All those ice cream specials encourage us to have a couple of flavors on hand. Remember cones for the children.

Meat Outlook. Frankfurters and hamburgers are certain to lead the parade of picnic preferences. Pork is plentiful and modest in price. Spareribs nibbling is one of barbecuing's greatest delights. Beef eaters will find fine quality beef with prices variable; look for advertised specials.

Vegetable Buys. Corn-on-the-cob, of course; and baking size potatoes! All the salad makings with lettuce and romaine at lowest prices we can remember. Green onions, radishes, crisp celery for relish trays and for stuffing with cheese. Put in plenty of onions and instant minced onion; tomatoes.

Fruit Reminders. Strawberries for shortcake, oranges for making ambrosia, cantaloupes, watermelon, grapefruit, avocados and bananas.

Facilities to Be Ready for Opening At Diamond Lake

All facilities at Diamond lake are expected to be in service for opening day Saturday, May 30, according to Ray Hampton, lands assistant for Umpqua national forest, who visited the area last week.

Forest service personnel and private concessionaires are working to have the lake recreation areas ready for the large number of visitors expected Memorial day week end.

Snow is about gone except for some drifts which still block the road around the lake from Silent creek to the YMCA camp. Summer homes may be reached by the lake of the north end and fish hatchery since the section was plowed by California Oregon Power company employees repairing the power line.

Move to Lake
Bill Eads, president of the Diamond lake resort, and John Koch, secretary-manager, have moved to the lake with a full staff of employees to prepare for the season's operation.

The 62 cabins and 10 hotel rooms were being cleaned and aired, boats and motors readied, and the resort kitchen and dining facilities renovated.

The South store has been enlarged and a restaurant added.

The 50-unit trailer court is also expected to be ready, Owner-Manager Joe Hallonquist announced.

System Revamped
With forest service aid, the campground road system has been revamped to provide only one entrance opposite the forest service guard station. All other entrances are to be closed, with a checking station at the single entrance.

Larry Neely and Bill Cox have a permit from the forest service to operate the overnight camping area.

The new system will permit a "no vacancy" sign when all camp units are occupied. Vondis Miller, forest supervisor, said the change was necessary to save the beauty of the campground from eventual destruction.

Camp Over Use
He cited the overcrowding of last July 4 when 1,070

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camp parties occupied grounds which had been developed for 187 parties. Such over use will not only destroy the beauty of the camp, but spoils the vacation for many of the campers, Miller pointed out.

This year in addition to the 187 developed family camp units, 91 temporary camps are being located, making a total of 278 usable camps in the lake overnight area.

An undeveloped overflow area will be designated south of the south end picnic area for those who do not find

space in the camp. Another convenience to visitors this year is a viewpoint parking area at the south end of the lake which commands a view of the entire lake and surrounding mountains.
