Wilhelm Beats Yanks Again For Seventh Victory in Row

Gentlemen, we give you Hoyt Wilhelm—except that Paul Richards says he can't be had "even for a million dollars."

Money isn't everything and right now Wilhelm is to the pennant-minded Baltimore Orioles.

No wonder! The 35-year-old knuckleballer has won seven straight without a loss. He has a spectacular 1.12 earned run average, the capacity to pitch every third day if necessary, and the confidence that no one can hit him when he's right.

Wilhelm's latest effort was a 5-0 victory over the Yankees Thursday night. The triumph boosted Baltimore to within 1 1/2 games of first place in the American league and extended Wilhelm's streak against the Yanks to 21 1/3 consecutive scoreless innings.

"There comes a time," said the elated Richards after the game "when a player is worth more money to a ball club than anyone can possibly pay for him. I wouldn't consider one million dollars for Wilhelm."

Beats Yanks Fourth Time
Given a chance to start by Richards, the veteran National league castoff has now beaten the Yankees four straight times. During that span, he has allowed the world champions a total of two runs while pitching a no-hitter and a one-hitter against them.

Ralph Terry, obtained from Kansas City earlier in the week, faced Wilhelm Thursday night and hurled well although charged with his fifth defeat. The Orioles nipped him for three runs on four hits during the first seven innings, then picked up their final runs when Gene Woodling hit a two-run homer off reliever Bobby Shantz in the eighth.

Kansas City cut Cleveland's league lead to half a game by beating the Indians, 7-2; Boston defeated Washington, 3-1, and the Detroit-Chicago game was postponed because of rain.

In the National league, Bob Friend of Pittsburgh blanked Milwaukee, 3-0; San Francisco climbed to within two games of the first-place Braves by beating St. Louis, 5-4; Philadelphia nipped Cincinnati, 4-3, and Chicago licked Los Angeles, 7-5.

Southpaw Bud Daley, another knuckleballer who got a chance to start this year, pitched the A's to their win over the Indians. Daley scattered 10 hits and drove in three runs as he posted his third victory. Bill Tuttle collected four of KC's 14 hits, including a homer. Rocky Colavito hit his 13th for Cleveland. Jim (Mudcat) Grant was the loser.

Vic Wertz's two-run homer in the eighth inning along with Frank Sullivan's two-hit pitching enabled the Red Sox to down the Senators. The only run Washington scored was unearned, but Sullivan had no kick coming because all three Boston runs off loser Pedro Ramos also resulted from errors.

The worm finally turned for Friend, loser of his first seven games, as he posted his first victory of the season with a fine four-hit shutout over the Braves. The Pirates scored all their runs off Joey Jay in the fifth inning. Danny Kravitz drove in two of the three runs in that frame with a looping single. Milwaukee didn't get a runner past second against Friend until the ninth.

Win in Eighth
The Giants won their game from the Cards in the eighth inning when Leon Wagner tripled and Daryl Spencer produced the winning run with a sacrifice fly. Stu Miller, second of three San Francisco hurlers, recorded his third victory. St. Louis jumped in front 4-1 but the Giants routed loser Lindy McDaniel and tied the score with a three-run rally in the fifth.

Ray Semproch snuffed out a ninth-inning rally and preserved Jim Owens' third victory in the Phillies' triumph over the Reds. Wall Post's double scored Ed Bouchee with what proved to be the winning run in the top of the ninth. Frank Robinson clouted his 10th homer for Cincinnati and Gus Bell his seventh. Joe Nuxhall was the losing pitcher.

Walt Moryn's single with the bases loaded in the ninth broke a 5-5 tie and produced the winning runs for the Cubs in their game with the Dodgers. Loser Art Fowler set the stage for Moryn's blow when he loaded the bases on three walks.

Ernie Bank's 12th homer with two on in the seventh gave Chicago a 5-4 lead but Los Angeles tied the score in

the bottom of the seventh when Jim Gilliam doubled to score Duke Snider. Dave Hillman struck out 11 men in 7 2/3 innings after relieving starter Seth Morehead and was credited with his third triumph. Gil Hodges hit his sixth homer for the Dodgers.

Solons Take First Tussle in Critical Series With Pads

The solidly balanced Sacramento Solons have grabbed off round one of their critical four-game series with the second-place San Diego Padres.

The Solons blanked George Metkovich's San Diego team, 7-0, behind the snazzy two-hit pitching of Winston Brown Thursday night. The win moved the Sacs three and a half games in front of the Padres.

Other action Thursday night saw Seattle whitewash Vancouver, 3-0; Salt Lake outslug Phoenix, 10-8, and Portland fall before Spokane, 13-4.

Two Teams Over .500 Mark
Off Thursday night's action, there are now only two teams playing .500 ball in the league—the Solons and Padres. Only

three games separate third place Portland and last-place Salt Lake.
Brown's victory was his fourth against five losses. He did not give up a hit until the fifth inning when Allan Jones slapped a solid single to center. Bill Moran collected the other Padre hit when he blooped a ball into left center in the eighth inning.

Al Heist had a perfect 3-3 night at the plate for the Sacs. He smacked a pair of run-producing doubles and drove in another tally with a single. Mike Krsnich batted in a pair of scores with a third-inning double.

Jay Hook, a 22-year-old bonus player on option from the Cincinnati Reds, hurled Seattle's shutout win over Vancouver. Hook gave up only four hits, struck out 11, and walked one.

Jack Dittmer socked a homer for the Rainiers in the eighth inning and Ed Wincenlak belted a triple in the seventh and came home on a sacrifice fly for another tally. The third was the result of an error.

The win was Hook's fourth against six defeats.
Bernier Homers for Bees
Salt Lake pushed over six runs in the first three innings against Phoenix and then held on to grab the 10-8 nod. Carlos Bernier socked a three-run homer in the first for the Bees.

The Giants came back later in the game on a two-run homer by Willie McCovey and another by Bobby Prescott.
Ken Toothman led the Bee offense with four hits, including a pair of doubles.

Otis Davis Tops NCAA

Lawrence, Kan.—(UPI)—Only two new leaders topped the NCAA's fourth bi-weekly track and field statistics of the spring—Otis Davis of Oregon in the 440 and Nebraska's Joe Mullins in the 880.

The statistics released today were based on competition through May 23.
Davis zipped through the quarter in :46.4 to replace Colorado's Chuck Carlson, who was timed earlier this spring in :46.5.

Mullins was timed in 1:49.0 in the half-mile, bettering by one-tenth of a second the time of Ernie Cunliffe of Stanford, the previous leader.

Settlement Sought in Ring Suit

New York—(UPI)—Promoter Bill Rosensohn sought an out-of-court settlement today for the Eddie Machen return-bout suit, apparently the last possible barrier to the Floyd Patterson—Ingemar Johansson fight.

Rosensohn chartered a plane and ordered challenger Johansson to fly into New York today for a settlement huddle. The promoter made that move immediately after Cus D'Amato's announcement that the big fight would not be shifted to another city.

D'Amato, Patterson's manager, announced formally Thursday night that the champion would go through with his defense against Sweden's unbeaten Johansson at Yankee Stadium, June 25, as scheduled. Previously D'Amato had considered a shift.

Johansson, champion of Europe, was reluctant to interrupt his training schedule by coming to New York today for the conference with attorneys and a federal judge. Accordingly Rosensohn chartered the plane for quick travel from Ingemar's camp at Grossinger, N. Y., and back again.

Contender Machen of Redding, Calif., is suing Johansson in federal court and trying to restrain him from challenging for the title before granting Machen a return bout.
Ingemar amazed the boxing world last Sept. 14 by knocking out Machen—then top contender—in the first round at Goteborg, Sweden.
