New York—UPI—Strength in a half dozen blue chips lifted the Dow-Jones industrial average to a record high in a quiet stock market session today.

These issues - American Telephone up 5 1/2 at its high; General Foods up 6 1/2; Westinghouse Electric up 3 3/4; DuPont up 2 1/4; Eastman Kodak up 1 1/2 - far more than offset small losses in leading steels and irregularity in oils and motors.
Traders sought out many special issues. They gave International Business Machines another whirl which carried that stock up 38 points to a new top at 488 at its best.

Ways to Eliminate Mosquitoes Named

Orie Moore, chief sanitarian for the Jackson county public health office, has suggested that residents eliminate mosquito-breeding places so they will not have to call on the public health department for help.

Moore suggested that all puddles and swampy places, which make ideal breeding grounds, be filled in. Deep pans or buckets should be used to catch the drip from swamp coolers placed in windows during hot weather, the sanitarian suggested. The water which runs through these coolers drips to the ground where it forms puddles and these in turn breed mosquitoes, he said.
Run-off irrigation water also causes a mosquito problem. Moore pointed out. Water gathers on land when irrigation water is used improperly, he said.
"Mosquitoes are beginning to 'pop' now although the weather isn't too warm yet," the sanitarian warned.
