Later he was transferred to Bordeaux and then he spent 9 months as superintendent of the Frankfort Playhouse, the oldest and largest of the Army's community theaters in Europe. Mr. Hansons was working with German, British, and French actors and entertainers as Americans.

In addition to the Frankfort theater, Mr. Hansons supervised theaters in other cities, and worked with eight service clubs.

In the Frankfort playhouse the program included the staging of musical comedies, plays and operas, and Mrs. Hansons, who played many seasons with the Oregon Shakespearean festival in Ashland, participated in some of the productions. Mr. Hansons reports that the playhouse gave such musical comedies as "The Pajama Game" and "Guys and Dolls", "The Most Happy Fella", the modern operas, "The Telephone" and "The Medium", and the play "Trial by Jury".

The Hansons returned to the United States by boat. They are now guests of Mrs. Hansons' mother, Mrs. Una J. LaMarre.

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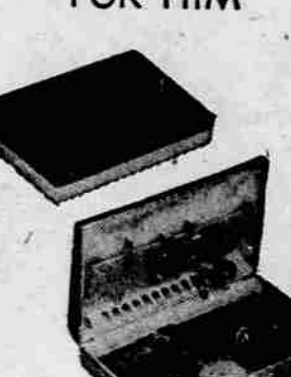


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
