Pioneer Women Teachers Provide Book Material

Ashland — "Lamplighters—Leaders in Learning" is the title of a new book presented to the Southern Oregon college library by one of its three editor-compilers, Miss Florence Allen, SOC professor of education.

Materials for the book were collected over a period of 18 years since the founding of the Alpha Rho State chapter of the national Delta Kappa Gamma, education society for women, in 1941.

Sketches of women teachers who pioneered in some phase of education in Oregon were submitted to the Committee on Pioneer Women throughout the years since the founding of the organization. From these sources, selections were made for the "Lamplighters."

Miss Allen's co-editors and compilers on the project were: Miss Neva Dallas, elementary supervisor in the Oregon State Department of Education; Dr. Martha Addy, Eastern Oregon college professor of education; and Mrs. Lois Kent, Columbia county superintendent of schools.

Mary Jo Albright, art supervisor for the Corvallis public schools, illustrated the books with drawings in keeping with the Lamplighter theme.

Topical Stamps Subject for Club

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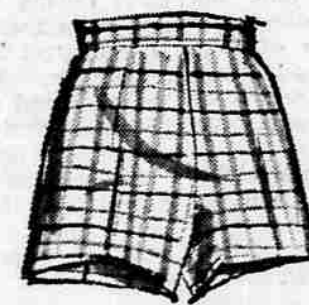
