Duties, Qualifications of New Recreation Director Outlined

A statement outlining the duties and qualifications of a city parks and recreation director was released recently by Medford City Manager Robert A. Duff.

The statement was in response to public curiosity about the newly-created position in Medford and the work to be undertaken by Robert L. Haworth in filling it.

It points out that the position entails developing a program for all age groups, and serving private as well as public activities. A park and recreation director it states must possess professional credentials.

Water Safety Course Offered

A special Red Cross water safety instructors' training course is being offered at Hawthorne park pool the week of June 29-July 3, according to Medford Parks and Recreation Director Robert L. Haworth.

Four regular 10-day instruction courses are scheduled later.

Haworth reports that the city, in coordination with the Medford school district and other public and private agencies, will offer a complete summer activities program, including games and sports, social activities for all ages, arts and crafts, music and drama, nature activities and special events.

Details of this program are to be released later.

The Red Cross course, offered without charge, is open to swimmers 18 and older who hold a senior life saving rating or the equivalent. Classes are slated to meet from 9 a.m. to noon each of the five days.

The pool itself, according to present plans, is to open Monday, June 8. Hours are to be 1 to 9 p.m. daily. Rates are 20 cents for children, 25 cents for students and 40 cents for adults.

The 10-day courses, for adults and school-age children, are slated to start July 6, July 20, Aug. 3 and Aug. 17. A fee of \$2 for use of the pool facilities is required.

Academic Classes, Recreation Activities For Medford Students Listed by Board

The summer's academic classes and recreational activities for boys and girls of the Medford public school district have been announced by the district school board.

Elementary classes will provide regular academic work with emphasis upon skill subjects. The secondary program will offer required subjects for graduation. Glenn L. Linn, McLoughlin Junior High school principal, is summer school principal.

The two categories of students accepted in the elementary program in grades one through six are those who have not quite made the passing minimum for the grade level because of illness, ab-

sences or other reasons, and those who barely met promotion minimums and were recommended to summer school for strengthening.

Students in grades seven through 12 are recommended to summer school for making up lost academic credits. In grades nine through 12 many students take a new subject for credit in order to increase their program of elective subjects the next school year.

A recommendation from the student's teacher and principal is needed for summer school attendance at the elementary level. The student's own grade status determines his attendance from junior high and high school.

Classes in personal typing will again be offered to senior high students and those who have completed the ninth grade. Also available is a business education class on office essentials.

Enrollments in a driver training class already are filled.

No tuition fee for academic classes will be charged residents of school district 549C. A \$50 fee will be charged those registering from outside the district.

Registration for summer school is scheduled for Monday, June 15, at 8:30 a.m. at McLoughlin Junior High. Elementary classes will be held June 15-July 17 from 8:30 a.m. to noon. Junior and senior high school classes will be held June 15-July 24.

Classes in instrumental music and baton twirling are planned to "extend opportunities for boys and girls interested in band and orchestra to carry on their activity during the summer and to provide some individual in-

struction for those needing it."

I. A. Mirick is in charge of the project and will teach band. John Drysdale will teach orchestra and Mrs. Don Miller, baton twirling. An information meeting for beginners will be held in the Medford high band room Monday, June 8, at 9 a.m. One or both parents are expected to meet with the instructor when the beginner registers. First classes will be held Tuesday, June 9.

The beginners group is open to any 4 to 12 grade student attending Medford schools. Other students will be assigned to their proper groups when they register with their own school principals. All are expected to take the full five-week course.

First sessions will be held June 9-19 and the second session July 6-24. Baton twirling will be June 9-July 11. Orchestra will meet June 9-July 3 for the first session and July 20-24 for the second session.

All sessions will be in the Medford High school band and orchestra rooms at times designated at the time of registration. Classes will meet from 9 a.m. to noon Monday through Friday, with 45 minutes for each session.

All band and orchestra students are to register with their own principals during the week of June 1-5. A \$1 fee will be charged each registrant to assist in paying for supplies and materials.

School instruments may be checked out for the summer if the student is enrolled in summer classes. Each group will perform one concert in the city park during the fifth week.

Also scheduled this year is an arts and crafts workshop, operated concurrently with the academic school. Mrs. Hazeldean Hohensoe of Lincoln school will instruct. Projects will include wood-working, braiding, weaving, copper tooling, textile painting and others.

Any student in grades 4-12 in the district may enroll. Workshop starts at the McLoughlin girls gymnasium Monday, June 15, continuing through July 24, and will be held from 8:30 a.m. to noon Monday through Friday. A fee of \$1 is charged to pay

partial cost of materials and attendance is voluntary.

Further recreation this summer will be provided by Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Boy Scouts, the YMCA and other groups. The Medford park and recreation department will provide a summer program for Medford youngsters.

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News About Books From the Library

It is interesting to contemplate during this Centennial year what great changes have occurred in the habits and tastes of the readers of books.

In 1896, for instance, the reading of fiction was considered by many to be a vicious practice. The librarian of the Philadelphia Free library said that his rules allowed no novels in the library, not even those by Dickens. A librarian from Leeds, England, said that while his library had novels, he cancelled the cards of young people who read too many of them.

Of course there are, even today, some who feel that novel reading, if not actually a pernicious habit, is at least a waste of time. Others feel that the reader can actually learn a great deal about human nature and human reactions in situations of stress from reading fiction. Some even go so far as to say that the most influential books, and the truest in their influence, are works of fiction.

"They do not pin the reader to a dogma, which he must afterwards discover to be inexact; they do not teach a lesson, which he must afterwards unlearn. They repeat, they arrange, they clarify the lessons of life; they disengage us from ourselves."

Fielding, seconded by Stendhal, claims that the novelist is the best historian.

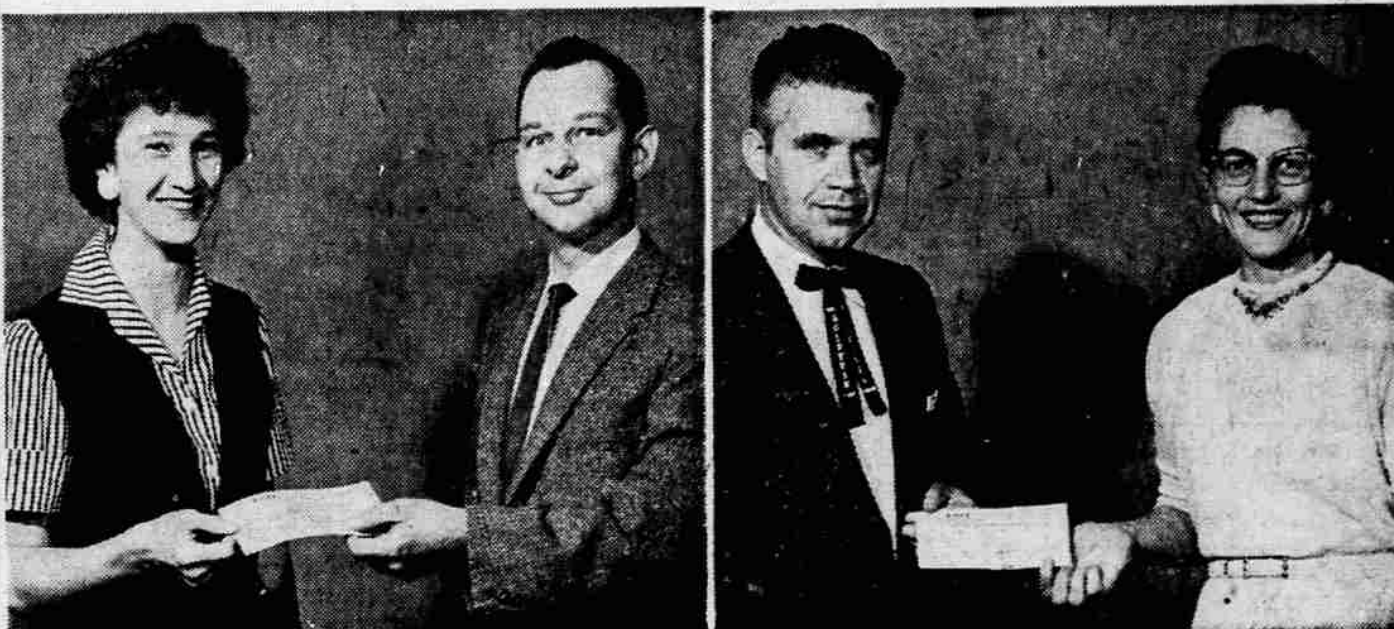
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
