Spinal Injuries

Recently, I had a column on the opinion of expert orthopedists who feel that boys in high school should not be playing football because of the danger of dislocating the growing ends of their long bones. Now I read that the American Football Coaches' Association, meeting in Cincinnati, decided that they still need better helmets which will absorb the heavy blows that the players get on their heads. They were 473 total deaths between 1951 and 1958. Last year six sandlot players died of injuries. The high school death rate was found to be 1.53 per 100,000 exposures, while the college rate was 2.17. Naturally, the number of injuries is immensely larger than the number of deaths. I know that few parents will want to refuse their boys the right to play football, but the large number of serious injuries to the joints should be causing many of us to think.

A Man With a Psychotic Wife

A man recently dropped in to tell me about the terrible time he is having with his wife. She obviously is psychotic, but not incapacitated enough to be hospitalized. Like so many psychotic people, she thinks she is sane and that her nice husband is the one who is causing all the trouble. Naturally, the man would like to put his wife in the hands of a psychiatrist, but she absolutely refuses; she maintains there is nothing wrong with her. Obviously, then, no one can help her. The husband has thought of "shanghaiing" her into a hospital, but I advised strongly against that. She might never forgive him for it. The couple have four children, and the man is frantic because often the wife gets to writing poetry or hot letters to the local newspaper, and wants to get any dinner.

Sample of Problems

This is a sample of the many mental problems that arise in our community every day. Society has not yet grappled with them, either intelligently or adequately. We doctors are not of much use because of college weren't taught how to handle this type of problem. When, today, professors try to teach the medical students something about helping disturbed people, the students say they never intend to see a psychotic patient, and they don't expect to see one. Unfairly, they couldn't be more wrong. I am no psychiatrist, but day after day for the last 50 years a third of the patients I see have some sort of a psychological problem, with which they need help. I was amused today when someone sent me a tall and bitter letter directed against me and published by one of the newspapers that carries my column. The man asked, "What does he know about neuroses? Why doesn't he stick to something he knows about?" For 54 years I have been taking care of thousands of people with neuroses and I have written several textbooks on the subject—two of which were medical best-sellers—so it would seem that I do know something about the subject!

Public Officials Linked To Crime

Washington—UPI—Chairman John L. McClellan of the Senate Rackets Committee charged today that "certain public officials" in Lake County, Ind., were in a corrupt alliance with top figures in the Chicago crime syndicate.

The Arkansas Democrat said "public corruption" in Lake County, near Chicago, "is as critical as any that the committee has heretofore exposed."

McClellan did not mention any names in his statement. It was prepared for the opening of hearings on how the situation had affected organized labor and legitimate businessmen in Gary, Ind., and other areas of Lake county.

"Previous hearings of the committee have shown the growing power of the American underworld," McClellan said. "These hearings will underline this growing power in conjunction with the corollary fact of public corruption."

Roseburg Girl, 8, Succumbs To Burns

Roseburg—UPI—The Douglas county sheriff's office Monday reported the death of a six-year-old girl by fire, boosting Oregon's Memorial Day week end accidental toll to eight lives.

Latest victim was Sue Ann Rard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Rard, Oakland. She died in Mercy hospital late Sunday about two hours after a can of gasoline caught fire while she was playing, spraying her with the flaming gas.

She was rushed to the hospital here but died about two hours after arrival.

One other person died as a result of fire during the week end in the state, three persons died in traffic, two drowned and a man died while hiking.

RIGHTeousNESS ELUSIVE

Pomona, Calif.—UPI—A 26-year-old former minister pleaded guilty to burglary charges Monday and was sentenced to 30 days in jail, placed on seven years probation and ordered to seek psychiatric help. Donald J. W. Thralls, former pastor of the Church of the Brethren in nearby Covina, explained: "I was happy to lead others, but I have not been successful in leading myself down the path of righteousness."

Oregon State Dean Appointed

CORVALLIS—UPI—Milosh Popovich, 61, assistant dean of engineering, has been named new dean of administration at Oregon State College, President A. L. Strand said today.

The appointment, which would become effective July 1, is subject to approval of the State Board of Higher Education at its June 16 meeting. Popovich will succeed E. B. Lemon, who retires this month after 68 years service at Oregon State, including 21 years as registrar and 16 years as dean of administration.

Popovich has been assistant dean of engineering and in charge of the engineering experiment station since 1954. From 1950 to 1954 he was chairman of the department of mechanical engineering, and before that he was on the mechanical engineering department staff for five years.

Labor Threat Faces Portland Council

Portland—UPI—The possibility of being put on the "unfair" list of the Multnomah County Labor Council appeared today for the Portland city council.

Monday night Municipal Employees, Local 483, submitted a request to the council asking that the city council be placed on the unfair list for failure to grant any pay increase to city laborers.

Glenn Blake, labor council president, said he sent the request to the body's executive committee for action. One result could be picketing in front of city hall here, he said.
