

Tornado Opposes The Dalles In Oregon Semi-final Game.

Black Tornado baseballers aim tonight for the second Medford high appearance in Oregon Class A-1 championship finals in four seasons under the coaching helm of John Kovenz.

The Tornado battles The Dalles Indians this evening in a state high school semi-final. Game time is 8 p.m. at The Dalles and marks Medford's initial tussle under lights this spring. Winner will move on into the championship decision on Saturday night in Multnomah stadium at Portland.

Coincidentally, The Dalles was Medford's semi-final hurdle in 1956 when the Tornado last gained the titular game and took state runner-up laurels under Kovenz tutelage.

Barr May Pitch

The Medford mentor again is expected to call on Dennis Barr, state all-star team choice, for pitching duties. He'll likely face John Heldt,

the Indians' ace twirler. Kovenz will have Tom Laurance immediately at hand should Barr need aid and The Dalles coach Noel Aronson may call Pete Briles should relief service be required.

Barr now has a 10-1 mark and Laurance is 3-3, Heldt 7-0 and Briles 9-0.

Other probable starters for Medford are Bob Pond, catcher; Lowell Dean, first base; Ray Konopasek, second base; Cal Dean, shortstop; Ken Durke, third base; George Ice, left field; Jerry Anderson, center field and Ken Jensen, right field.

The Dalles may have Norm Marks, catcher; Frank Betts or Bob Bailey, first base; Sam Muller, second base; Roger Peters, third base, and Bob Porter, shortstop. In the outfield may be Bob Alford, ary Betts and Ronnie Brown.

Heavy Hitters

Both clubs have a number of plyers hitting above the

300 average. For Medford there are Cal Dean 413, George Ice, 409, Jerry Anderson, 341, Lowell Dean, 333, Ray Konopasek, 328 and Mike Parsons 322. Bat leaders for the Indians are Bob Alford, 386, Heldt, 378, Marks and Muller, 338 each, Briles 333 and Ron Brown, 302.

The Black Tornado last week end picked up considerable confidence when they got by North Bend in the quarter-finals. For, the Bulldogs boast a couple of the top pitchers in the state. Medford got to one of them, Tom Younker, for seven hits.

The Dalles entered the semi-final with a 20-3 record while Medford is 19-6-1. Tornado baseballers are champions of the Southern Oregon conference and District 6 while the Indians held forth in the Blue Mountain circuit and District 7. The Dalles downed Lebanon in a state quarterfinal game.

Losing Perfect Game Brings Award Of Silver Tray and Twelve Goblets

Cincinnati —UPI—Harvey Haddix will have something to show for his losing "perfect game" after all — a silver tray and 12 sterling silver goblets, which will be presented to him by the National League.

League President Warren Giles, who previously had announced that the league would present Haddix with a gift in honor of his feat, today disclosed details of the gift which will be given to Haddix sometime before the Pirates' current home stand ends on June 14.

The silver tray will tell the story with its inscription: "To Harvey Haddix in recognition of his outstanding performance — unprecedented in baseball history — pitching

12 consecutive perfect innings of May 26, 1959.

"Presented by the National League of Professional Baseball Clubs."

The 12 silver goblets will tell the rest of the story. They represent the 12 perfect innings Haddix tossed, and on each will be inscribed the details of a different inning.

There's no goblet, of course, for the 13th inning. If there were, it would have to be a mighty big goblet to get the whole story of that confused frame on it.

Whole Story Given

Felix Mantilla, first Braves' batter in the 13th reached first base on an error, the first Milwaukee runner to reach base against Haddix. Ed Mathews sacrificed and

Tempers Flare Up During Ball Game

United Press International. It's still early in the season, yet tempers already are flaring in that National league pennant race.

Gary Spencer, Willie Mays and Del Rice were the principals Monday night when the San Francisco Giants crept to within 1½ games of first place by wallopping the Milwaukee Braves, 11-2.

First Rice momentarily stunned Spencer when he tagged him out during a run-down between third and home in the seventh inning. Then Mays retaliated by bowling over Rice on a play at the plate during a four-run San Francisco rally in the eighth and sending the Milwaukee catcher to a hospital with a bruised lower shin bone.

Mays himself was taken out of the lineup with shin bruises but said he definitely would play Tuesday night when the teams resume their four-game series.

In the American league, the two teams which got the biggest jump on the New York Yankees continued to fritter away their opportunity to maintain a sizeable lead over the reviving world champions. The first-place Cleveland Indians dropped a 3-1 decision to the Detroit Tigers and the second-place Chicago White Sox lost by the same score to the Kansas City Athletics.

The Indians, who have lost three straight and six of their last eight games, now lead the Yankees by only 5½ games while the White Sox, who have lost seven of 10 games to the Athletics, lead them by only 3½.

Jonas Luta, Detroit pitcher, turned in an eight-inning performance which set a record at 5-5 as the Giants pounded out 14 hits. Jones had a one-hit shutout until the eighth inning when Frank Torre singled home both Milwaukee runs.

Paul Dwyer pitched a five-hitter for the Tigers who have climbed to within 3½ games of first place and are only two games under .500 after the 2-15 start that cost him the manager's job. Under Jim Rice, Dwyke's record is 10-10-10-10.

Bud Phipps pitched a seven-inning performance for the Athletics. Joe Demaree figured in all three of the runs. Demaree scored on a wild pitch and then hit a third homer in the year. Ray Moore got his third against one hit.

Sanford To Pitch For Giants

Milwaukee —UPI—The red hot San Francisco Giants attempt to move within a half a game of Milwaukee today when they send fastballing Jack Sanford against the partially crippled Braves.

The Giants clubbed the Braves in the opener of a four game series last night, 11-2. Bill Rigney's boys used the single to great advantage in the third inning with a six run spree.

Sam Jones went all the way for the Giants and recorded his first win against many losses. He also singled home two of the runs in the third.

The Braves played without ace receiver Del Crandall behind the plate. He complained of double vision in one eye and was a last minute scratch.

Hank Aaron, baseball's leading hitter, had to retire from the contest in the sixth inning with a stiff back. Both may sit out this afternoon's string.

Del Crandall

Milwaukee's second string pitcher, Del Rice, is almost definitely out of today's game. He tangled with Willie Mays on a play at the plate and was carried off the field in a stretcher with a badly bruised shin bone.

Rice's injury may have some interesting ramifications. The scrappy Brave catcher incurred the wrath of the Giants in the top of the seventh when he put a powerful tan on shortstop Darl Spencer. Rice hit Spencer so hard with the ball that the shortstop was momentarily stunned and required first aid on the field. Both clubs hustled out on the diamond but it remained conversational and Spencer stayed on the mound.

Late that inning, Mays crested into Rice and tried to score on Orlando Cepeda. Double plays and Rice were both taken out of the lineup but Mays said he will definitely be ready today.

Blow on Giants' Batter

Blow on Giants' batter in the eighth inning. In having trouble collecting a hit, Mays, who had a hit in the game, came up with two singles in the inning to spark the rally.

In all, the Giants got 14 hits, 10 of them the bases. Jones pitched the Braves eight hits. He walked three and struck out five batters.

All of the Giants' Big Five—John Antonelli, 7; Stu Miller 3-0; Sanford, 6-5; McCormick, 3-3; and Jones, 5-5—are now over the 500 mark for the first time this season.

The Braves are expected to use Carlton Willey against Sanford this afternoon.

Coast Loop Records on File at UC

University of Oregon, Eugene —Administrative records of the Pacific Coast conference, which were collected after 1954, will be deposited in the University of Oregon library.

Representatives of colleges which were members of the athletic conference voted at a meeting to place the records in the library.

Included in the records are conference minutes, committee reports, directors' letters, the constitution, financial records of office operations, National Collegiate Athletic Association material and Rose Bowl radio and television documents.

The conference files will be opened until July 1, 1960, by agreement of the state that they will be available for research purposes with the permission of the university library.

University Librarian Carl Hintz commented that the records will provide a basis for a history of college athletics on the West Coast during the past 50 years. He said the preservation of the PCC files ensures that such history will be written.

Dokey Said Recovering

Inglewood, Calif. —Jockey Ralph Nevo, given less than 50-50 chance to live last Saturday, was reported today to have passed the critical stage.

The veteran 40-year-old rider suffered a fractured skull and fractured vertebrae Saturday when he was thrown from his horse during the Hollywood Derby.

Doctors expressed grave concern for his life after operation, but his recovery has been so speedy that yesterday he was allowed to walk with the help of crutches. He will be kept in the hospital for a few more days, however, because of the delicate nature of the fractures sustained.

Brooks Lawrence (3-5) who lost his previous start against the Dodgers, will be the Cincinnati hurler.

From here they go on to Milwaukee for a three-game stand, then to Philadelphia for three more games and to Pittsburgh for four games before returning to the Coliseum for a series against the Braves starting June 17.
