Chlorine Victims Said Improved

Eugene - UPI - All but one of the 15 persons hospitalized on Sunday after a tank leak spewed chlorine gas over the McCredie Springs swimming pool were on their feet today.

Fourteen persons were discharged from Sacred Heart hospital Monday. The 15th, Mrs. Grace I. Trout, 31, Oakridge, was in "good" condition but probably will remain in the hospital for another day or so, the hospital said Monday night.

Fifty-three persons were taken to the hospital after the accident. Most received outpatient treatment and were released. None of the stricken was knocked unconscious.

State Policeman Harold Taylor, who happened to be in the resort office, was able to stop the chlorine tank, stopping the flow of gas.

The chlorine sprayed across the crowded pool and into bath houses sending dozens of persons fleeing. The mineral springs resort is on Highway 58 near Oakridge east of here.

Disability May Be Added to Policies

Thousands of Oregon veterans eligible under a recent law to add disability income coverage to their National Life Insurance policies have not yet taken advantage of the opportunity, S. T. Brannock, contact representative, VA District Office, Camp White, said today.

For an additional premium, and with evidence of good health at time of application, present holders of World War II and Korean period insurance may secure this special protection.

In event the veteran becomes unemployable through disability, prior to reaching age 60, and lasting longer than six months, VA will pay him as much as \$100 a month for as long as unemployability lasts, Brannock said. The payments do not affect the basic life insurance coverage.

Veterans interested were urged to secure full information at VA's office in the post office building, VA District Office, Camp White.

Pope Pius Once Pondered Quitting

Vatican City - UPI - The late Pope Pius XII once considered abdicating his throne because of illness, a high Vatican source said today.

The source told United Press International that the Pope discussed with his aides what he should do if incapacitated. This was in 1953 when he was seriously ill.

The aides were reported to have told him that an abdication would be a great shock to the Roman Catholic world and that no Pope had done such a thing for at least five centuries.

The Pope eventually recovered and never had to resolve the question of whether he should give up the throne voluntarily, the Vatican source said.

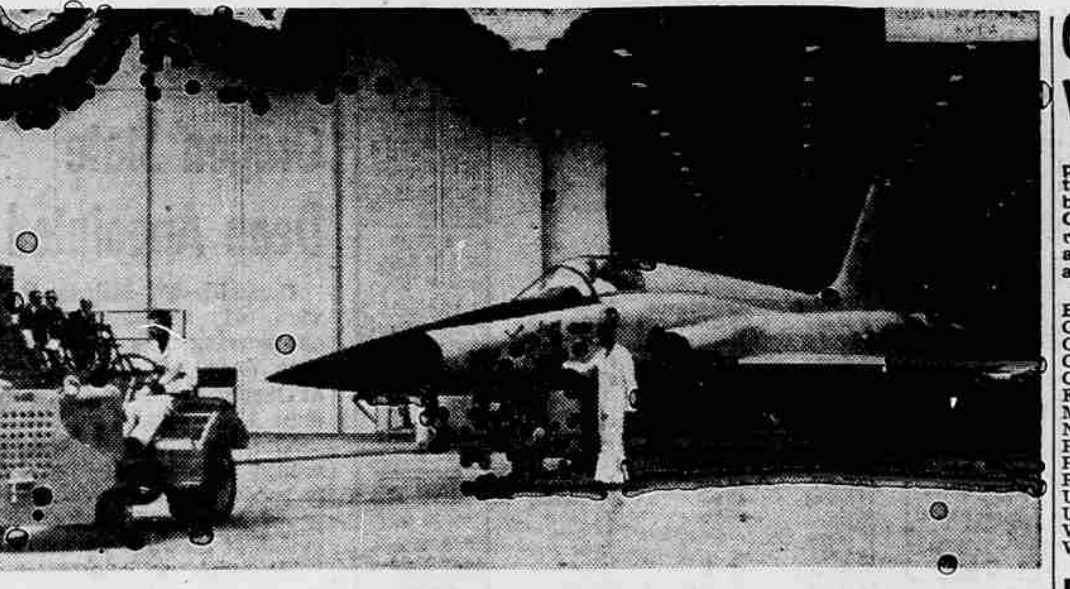

Stocks Take Widest Decline Since May 7

New York - UPI - Stocks today suffered their widest decline since May 7 with a loss in value amounting to nearly \$3 billion.

The declines ranged to 4 points in individual issues. On average the actual decline amounted to about 50 cents a share.

Top-ranking industrial shares were the hardest hit. Allied Chemical lost 4 points. Union Carbide gave up 3 points and declines of 2 points or more appeared in Alcoa, United Aircraft, DuPont, and Westinghouse Electric.

Motors dipped smaller amounts than other sections. Steels also slipped back. Oils were small losers. Chemicals were hard hit. Tobacco had losses running to a point. The electrical equipments also declined.

Babysitter Sees Employer Slain

Dixon, Calif. - UPI - A 13-year old babysitter told homicide inspectors today of seeing a young mother of two mortally wounded by a fusillade of shots fired through the door of her apartment.

The girl, Cathy Sutherland, said she never saw the assailant. But police said the victim's estranged husband had confessed the shooting.

Cathy told officers she was sitting for Mrs. Laverne Wright's two children while the mother worked as a waitress. Shortly after the 13-year-old woman returned home last night she was called to the door but refused to open it.

Shots rang out, the bullets ripping through the door. Mrs. Wright fell dead from two wounds.

Police said Robert Wright, 29, was arrested and he readily admitted the shooting. He was booked in Solano county jail in Fairfield on suspicion of homicide.
