Morse Withdraws Neuberger Support

'Differences' Will Be Placed Before Voters

Series of Vital Issues To Be Aired

Washington - (UP) - Sen. Wayne L. Morse (D-Ore.) said today he will not support Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) for reelection and will place their "differences" before Oregon voters next year.

Morse, whose rift with his junior colleague has been widening over the past two years, reemphasized statements he made last week.

"I shall take to the people of Oregon in 1960 my differences of opinion with Neuberger on what I consider a series of very vital issues," he said. "I shall not support him for reelection."

Welcomed Back

The 46-year-old Neuberger, only recently recovered from a cancer attack, said he would seek reelection if his health permitted.

The only apparent slackening in the rift between him and Morse came early this year when Morse led the Senate in welcoming Neuberger back from his illness.

Morse campaigned vigorously throughout Oregon in 1954 when Neuberger, generally rated the underdog, unseated Sen. Guy Cordon (R-Ore.). At the time, Morse hailed Neuberger's victory as a great triumph for liberalism.

But differences gradually sprang up and the split widened.

Differences Not Listed

In announcing his open opposition, Morse did not detail the "differences of opinion" or list the "vital issues" on which he found fault with Neuberger.

Neuberger would not elaborate on a statement he made last week. He said then he had "no ill will or malice against Morse" and "certainly hoped" the two could remain friends.

The younger senator said he had "done my best in the Senate to make an honest, fair record... based on my conscience and such knowledge as I have. I have tried to avoid political abuse and extreme partisanship. I have felt that I should make judgments based on facts rather than malice against other people."

Neuberger, however, accused Morse 10 days ago of causing "disruption among Democrats in Oregon's congressional delegation" after Morse had "described Neuberger as a 'rubber stamp' supporter of administration foreign policies."

Neuberger pointed out that Democratic Presidential hopeful Hubert Humphrey and John Kennedy had voting records closely paralleling his own and that such policies as foreign aid and reciprocal trade had been started or supported by Democratic Presidents Roosevelt and Truman.

Morse then wired Oregon newspaper editors that Neuberger "in his typical fashion, again sidesteps each issue with phraseological evasion." "In the political campaign ahead, I intend to point out to the voters of Oregon the sorry record he had made on issue after issue and will let the record speak for itself."

Mice Blasted Toward Space

Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif. - (UP) - The United States today blasted two "space mice" toward space aboard Discoverer III in an experiment aimed at the world's first recovery of live animals from a satellite.

The Thor-based launch lifted off the pad at 12:08 p.m. (gmt) carrying the two black, pig-like mice.

It was the first recovery attempt to put animals into orbit. The Discoverer III in 1957 with the dog, "Teosie," to establish it. But they were unable to establish the capsule's return.

Animals have been recovered from rockets shot high into space but not from orbit.

Hatfield Appoints Portland Man as Adjutant General

Maison Retained For Four Years

Salem - (UP) - Gov. Mark Hatfield appointed Brig. Gen. Alfred E. Hintz, Portland, as Oregon's new adjutant general Tuesday.

At the same time the governor announced that H. G. (Fod) Maison, superintendent of the Oregon state police since 1946, will be retained for another four-year term.

Gen. Hintz, a guard veteran, will replace Col. Robert Irving, who was appointed acting adjutant general by Hatfield on the death of Gen. Thomas E. Riles.

The governor said Col. Irving would remain with the guard "in some capacity."

Hintz, a 51-year-old Portland police patrolman, started with the Oregon Guard in 1940 and served overseas until 1945. He served with the Regular Army in 1946 and 1947.

In order to return to the Guard he accepted a commission as major in the 41st division artillery in 1948 and rose to command the 41st division artillery in 1951.

Maison, who rose to the rank of major general with the 41st division, began his duty with the state police in 1931, the year it was founded.

His term does not expire until August, but the governor explained:

West Studying Plan for Appeals Commission

One Unyielding Condition Made

Geneva - (UP) - The West is studying a new plan which would establish an East-West appeals commission over the access route to Berlin and include East and West Germans on it, informed sources reported today.

The sources said the western Big Three and West Germany are considering such an offer in the presently deadlocked Foreign Ministers' Conference on one unyielding condition: That Russia guarantee western rights in West Berlin and free Western access to the city.

The plan was still in the study stage as East and West went into another secret negotiating session this afternoon.

Beforehand, the western ministers spent an hour at U.S. headquarters discussing how best to follow up British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd's appeal to Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko Tuesday to let "practical work" begin.

Secretary of State Christian Herter, French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville and Lloyd were reported in firm agreement that Russia should take the first step forward if it wants agreement here, since it was Moscow that set off the current Berlin crisis by demanding that the West get out under threat of a separate Kremlin peace treaty with East Germany.

Eisenhower Says Progress Lacking For Summit Talk

Charges by Lewis Declared Untrue

Washington - (UP) - President Eisenhower said today that the Geneva foreign ministers meeting had not yet, in his opinion, made sufficient progress to warrant holding a summit conference.

The chief executive, in his first news conference in three weeks, told more than 300 reporters he was willing to define satisfactory progress rather liberally. But even so, he said, the meeting going on now had not yet produced sufficient evidence to justify planning for a top level meeting later in the summer.

Oregon Fugitive Arrested Quietly On Cattle Ranch

Picture Seen on 'Wanted' Poster

Thermopolis, Wyo. - (UP) - Richard Allen Hunt, 26, wanted for kidnaping one Oregon police chief and wounding another in a wild spree last March, was arrested quietly Tuesday on a cattle ranch where he had been working since April 13.

Hunt only last week was placed on the FBI's 10 most wanted fugitive list.

Hunt surrendered to two sheriff's officers at the ranch 35 miles west of here as he ate lunch in a bunkhouse. He was picked up after a resident saw his picture on a "wanted poster" in the local post office.

Didn't Resist

Sheriff Eddie Todorovich said Hunt was not armed and did not resist arrest. The fugitive will be turned over to a U.S. marshal at Cheyenne.

U.S. Commissioner Joe Cavalli said Hunt verbally waived extradition to Oregon.

On March 24 Hunt was stopped in Harrisburg, Ore., by Police Chief E. G. McPhee. The chief was abducted and let go on a road between Harrisburg and Brownsville.

At the latter town Police Chief Robert Kennow, who was at a roadblock, was shot in the face and wounded. Hunt fled into the hills and vanished despite one of the largest manhunts in western Oregon history.

Hunt said he traveled through California, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico. He told the sheriff he also worked on a ranch near Sheridan, Wyo.

Hyd in Bushes

Todorovich said Hunt told him he hid out in the bushes all day - "within 30 to 40 feet" of a posse - after the Brownsville shooting. Later, he said he swam the Willamette river in Oregon and nearly froze to death.

Undersheriff David Schott, who made the arrest with Todorovich, described Hunt as "real clean cut." The foreman at the ranch called him a "top hand." Hunt had worked on a ranch near Harrisburg, Ore., before he fled.

The foreman asked Hunt if there was anything the ranch crew could do to help. Hunt replied: "There's nobody can help me now, with what I'm in."

Hunt also was wanted for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution and interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle.
