

Indians Trip Black Tornado in A-1 Diamond Semi-Final

Porter Blow Brings 4-3 Nod; The Dalles To Face Jeff in Saturday Finale

Stage is now set for the state high school baseball championship games on Saturday, June 6, at Multnomah Stadium in Portland. Adrian will play Gaston at 5 p.m. for the B school toga. Sutherland will oppose Sherwood at 7 p.m. in the A-2 finale and Jefferson will meet The Dalles at 9 p.m. for the A-1 crown.

The Dalles—Shortstop Bob Porter singled home rightfielder Bob Alford with the winning run with two out in the bottom of the 12th inning here last night to propel The Dalles Indians into the finals for the Oregon Class A-1 high school baseball diadem. Porter's blast into left field with the bases filled in the fifth extra stanza gave the Indians a 4 to 3 nod over the Medford Black Tornado in a state semi-final game. The Dalles will meet Jefferson of Portland next Saturday night at Multnomah stadium in Portland for the big school crown. Jeff tipped Tigard 4 to 1 in the other semi on Monday night.

The Indians piled up three of their runs in the third inning and Medford sent the contest into overtime with all of its three markers in an odd seventh inning.

Barr Lifted
Winning hit in the tussle came off Tom Laurance, who had gone to the hill in the seventh inning after starter Dennis Barr was lifted for pinch-batter Wayne Thompson.

The Dalles' relief chucker Pete Briles led off the 12th by flying out but catcher Norm Marks was safe when first baseman Lowell Dean dropped the throw from shortstop Cal Dean on a ground ball. Marks was forced at second on Alford's grounder. That made it two out with one man on base.

A wild pitch by Laurance enabled Alford to go to second. Leftfielder Chuck Searcy walked and both runners advanced on another wild pitch. Centerfielder Gary Betts walked to fill the sacks. Then Porter broke up the long evening.

The Dalles did their third inning tallying on a hit by second baseman Sam Muller, bases on balls to first baseman Frank Betts and starting pitcher John Heldt, a ground out by third baseman Roger Peters, an error when Marks' hard liner got through centerfielder Jerry Anderson, and a wild pitch by Barr.

Infield Fly Ruled
In the seventh in the successful move to keep the game alive, Medford loaded the bases with none out with walks to second baseman Ray Konopasek and Thompson and a safety by third baseman Ken Durkee.

Then came a situation which possibly meant the difference between winning and losing for the Black Tornado. Rightfielder Ken Jensen hit a high flyball into short left field (or deep shortstop). The ball was dropped by shortstop Porter. He overthrew third base, Konopasek scooted home and the other runners advanced. The run counted by umpire Ken Westover called Jensen out by invoking the infield fly rule.

Had Jensen been ruled safe on a dropped outfield fly (interpretation), Medford might have made it four runs in the inning. Next Cal Dean single scored Thompson and went to second base on the throw-in. Lowell Dean walked to fill the bases. Leftfielder George Ice fled out to left, Durkee scored on

the sacrifice but Cal Dean was caught at third base on the throw-in for a double play retiring the side.

14 Bases on Balls
The Dalles got to Tornado tossers Barr and Laurance for only two hits off each. Barr struck out batters six times and Laurance four. Medford's chuckers yielded a total of 14 bases on balls, eight by Barr and six by Laurance. These augmented the Indian threat through the game but only four of the free passes figured in the scoring.

Heldt allowed three hits by the Tornado and Briles two with Durkee and Cal Dean each getting two safe blows for Medford. Durkee's towering triple to center field leading off the game was the only extra base swat of the night. Heldt whiffed seven and walked five and Briles fanned five and issued three bases on balls.

Both clubs missed other opportunities to score. The Dalles left 14 men on base and Medford stranded 13. The Tornado had a big chance in the fourth when it loaded the sacs, with one out, on two errors and a walk. But Konopasek lined to second baseman Miller who tagged second for an unassisted double play to stop the bid.

Thought Conservative
Medford also had men on second and third bases with one out in the ninth inning on Cal Dean's single and an error. Ice fled out and Anderson fanned. Tornado runners reached second base on three other occasions. Some observers felt Medford played it conservatively on Durkee's three-bagger and that he had a chance to make it all the way.

The Indians got a man to third base in the first inning and had the bases filled with one out in the fifth. They had men on first and second with one out in the seventh.

Each team had two double plays. The Dalles now has 21 scalps against three losses for the season. Medford wound up the season with 10 victories, 7 losses and 1 tie.

Basilio Agrees To Bout Terms
New York—(UP)—Promoter Norman Rothschild, Syracuse, announced today that Carmen Basilio has accepted terms to fight Gene Fullmer for the National Boxing Association version of the world middleweight championship at a western site to be determined later. Rothschild said the cities under consideration were Los Angeles, San Francisco, Salt Lake City, and Ogden, Utah. Denver and Chicago also were designated as possible sites. The date for the match was designated as the first or second week of August. Both Basilio and Fullmer, who comes from West Jordan, Utah, has held the world middleweight crown, although they never have met in the ring. Almost 10 million people belong to trade unions in Great Britain. There are nearly 650 of these unions in the country.

Ted Socks 2,500th Hit

Kansas City, Mo.—(UP)—Ted Williams, 40-year-old Boston Red Sox star outfielder who last night hit the 2,500th base hit of his major league career, took the occasion pretty much in his stride.

He might have been a little happier had not the Kansas City Athletics triumphed over Boston, 5-3.

Williams' hit was a ringing double into left center field in the first inning off right-hander Ray Herbert. The game was halted while the umpire presented the ball to Williams.

After the game Williams said he well remembered his first hit.

"It was off Charlie Ruffing in Yankee Stadium. It was a high, fast ball and I hit it over a 407-foot sign in right center field."

That first hit occurred April 20, 1939. Ted chuckled as he recalled.

"After I made that first hit I got to second base and Joe Gordon (now manager of the Cleveland Indians) said to me, 'Kid, are you scared?'"

"And I said, 'Yes I am scared.' Gordon said to me, 'Kid, you got nothing to worry about.'"

Ray Robinson May Have Lost Big Pay Chance

New York—(UP)—Sugar Ray Robinson won a big argument when he retained New York recognition as world middleweight champion, but it began to appear today that he may have lost a big pay day.

The "sugar man," who has won many a tough decision in the ring, was handed a surprise victory Tuesday when the New York State Athletic Commission refused to go along with the National Boxing Association, which has stripped Robinson of his title for failure to meet Carmen Basilio.

But Basilio now indicates that the decision means little as far as he's concerned—he's going ahead with plans to fight ex-champ Gene Fullmer in a bout to be recognized as a title fight by the NBA. That could mean a big jolt in the pocketbook for Robinson. Although Robinson then would be free to defend his New York version of the crown against some other opponent such as Germany's Gustav Scholz, a Robinson-Scholz bout doesn't figure to make nearly as much as Robinson-Basilio.

Approval Likely For Star Tussle

Milwaukee—(UP)—Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick's cheer and ironing out such details as radio and television commitments is all that stands between a second major league All-Star game in Los Angeles in August. Executive Vice President Birdie Tebbetts of the Milwaukee Braves said Tuesday club owners and players had approved a second game and tentatively selected Los Angeles as the site. A likely date is Aug. 3—an open date for both leagues.

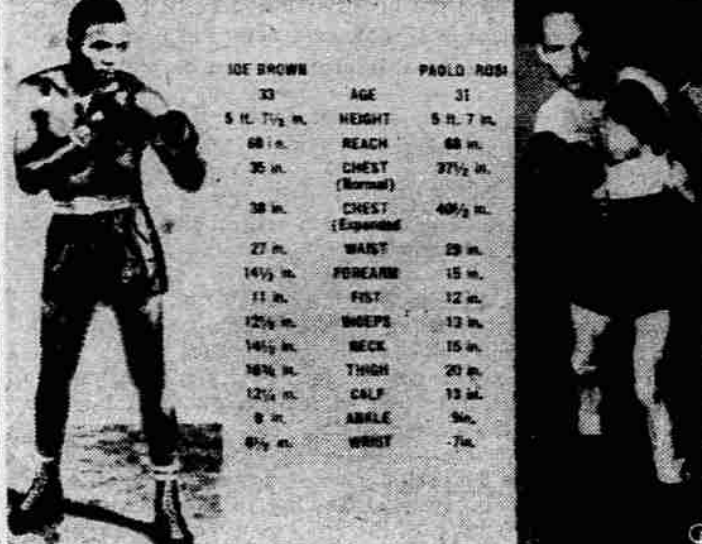
The regular all-star game is set for July 7 in Pittsburgh. Players Suggest
Frick has indicated he will go along with a second all-star game which was advanced by player representative Robin Roberts of the Philadelphia Phillies as a means of increasing the players' pension fund and providing cash for minor league aid and youth baseball programs.

The major leagues held two All-Star games during the war with the second game against former major leaguers in service. Tebbetts said the plan next year will be to hold the two games in American league cities and extend the normal All-Star break to four days to permit playing of both contests. After that, the games will alternate between the leagues like they do now.

Brown Defends Title Against Paolo Rosi

Washington—(UP)—Champion Joe Brown, slender Negro boxer-puncher, is favored at 12-5 to beat Italian Paolo Rosi, a baldish rawboned slugger, tonight in their battle of "oldest men" for the world lightweight crown. They are the oldest pair to fight for the 135-pound title; Brown, 33, and Rosi, 31. But each is still such an effective puncher that some "sportsmen" are offering 7-5 that the bout at Uline Arena does not last its scheduled 15 rounds, regardless of the winner.

Promoter Goldie Ahearn expects a near-capacity 7,500 and a gate of more than \$50,000, despite two days of steady rain that curtailed somewhat the sale of tickets for this indoor show. Washington's first title fight in 18 years will be held at 7 p.m. (PST). The last championship fight here was on May 23, 1941, when Joe Louis won on a seventh-round disqualification over big Buddy Baer.

Brown, who now lives at Baton Rouge, La., is making his seventh defense of the title in his 100th professional fight. He hopes within the next year to equal or surpass the eight successful defenses made by the late Benny Leonard who retired undefeated. However, Joe indicated in his last three performances that he may be slipping. He kept his title by an eyelash after 15 furious rounds with southpaw Kenny Lane. He lost a non-title decision to Johnny Busso but managed

to beat Busso in a title fight, last Feb. 11, over the full 15-round route. Nine Consecutive Wins
Rosi—formerly of Rieta, Italy—but now a naturalized citizen living in New York—earned tonight's shot by coming through his last nine bouts unbeaten, although held to one draw. His best wins on that string were a decision and a knockout in two bouts with Bobby Scanlon and a decision over Busso. This year he outpointed Flash Elorde and stopped Frankie Ryff in 3 on April 10.

Rosi, son of a fireworks manufacturer, is an aggressive banger, who fights either from the upright stance or from the bob and weave. A converted southpaw, his left hook is as dangerous as his right uppercut. Rosi didn't turn professional until he was 23. That accounts for his having only 36 fights. He won 31, lost four and has one draw. He registered 13 knockouts.

Haddix, Aaron Tie for Honor

Cincinnati—(UP)—Harvey Haddix of Pittsburgh, who pitched perfect ball for 12 innings and still lost, had to settle for a tie with Hank Aaron of Milwaukee today in the National League's "Player of the Month" award for May. Haddix polled 17 votes, the same number as Aaron, from a voting committee of 40 baseball writers and broadcasters who participate in the NL's monthly balloting.

Phil Moyer Halts Chico

Portland—(UP)—Portland's Phil Moyer, normally a counter-puncher, turned aggressor Tuesday night in scoring a technical knockout over Chico Cirino, San Francisco, in the fifth round of their scheduled 10-round middleweight bout in Portland Auditorium. There were no knockdowns.

Cirino was unable to answer the bell for the sixth round because of an injured hand. Moyer hit solidly with both lefts and rights. It was the first fight for Moyer, who weighed 152, since his losing April battle with Yama Bahama, British West Indies, in a bout televised nationally from here. Cirino weighed 155.

Olympic Games Withdrawal of U.S. Proposed

Washington—(UP)—The United States should withdraw from the 1960 Olympic Games if the Nationalist Chinese are not allowed to compete, in the opinion of Rep. Francis E. Dorn (R-N.Y.).

Dorn's statement followed an accusation by the U. S. State Department Tuesday that the International Olympic committee had bowed to "Communist pressures" in expelling Nationalist China from membership.

Dorn called the expulsion of Nationalist China "shameful" and that IOC President Avery Brundage of the United States

should resign his position in protest.

"The United States must not allow a friend of many years to be pushed aside by Communist blackmail," said Dorn. "We must prove to all our Allies that the United States will support every one of our friends."
