Pile Driver Strike Discussed

Portland—(UPI)—A special committee of the Multnomah County Central Labor Council met again Tuesday with striking Pile Drivers and local contractors to try to solve a strike which started nearly a month ago.

The strike has idled about \$15 million in construction in the Portland area. Chief negotiator at dispute has been a union demand for a hiring hall.

Glenn Blake, Council president, said "a little progress" had been made.

Several mid-Williamette sand, gravel and ready-mix concrete plants remained tied up as a result of a strike lock-out. Federal mediation talks are scheduled Thursday in Salem to try to end the dispute.

Russia, Albania Call for Balkan Summit Meeting

London—(UPI)—A Soviet magazine reported today that the Soviet Union and Albania have called for a Balkan summit conference to discuss "urgent questions."

The New Times magazine said the meeting would be held in the Balkans and would be a "democratic one."

The Soviet Union and Albania have proposed the calling of a summit meeting of the Balkan States to discuss urgent questions and turn the Balkans into a "democratic zone."

The New Times said in the version distributed by the official Soviet news agency, Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev is now in Albania, where he is scheduled to spend a 15-day tour Thursday.

Western observers had predicted that a Balkan summit meeting would result from Khrushchev's journey. The New Times article was the first mention here of such a meeting.

The magazine said the broad purpose of the suggested meeting "is to safeguard the peace in the Eastern Mediterranean and to do away with the causes of tension in the Balkans."

South America Discusses Slums

Lima, Peru—(UPI)—The rapid spread of "ghetto town" slums around South America's major cities was the subject of a major inter-American conference here Nov. 16-27.

Planning authorities from the U. S. and 30 Latin American republics planned their knowledge to map plans for an urgent effort to eradicate or transform the so-called "barrio brujos," dense conglomerations of inadequate dwellings lacking the most elementary sanitary services.

The slum towns reflect Latin America's rapid population growth, and the tendency for population to concentrate around cities. The meeting experts estimated that Latin America needs at least 1,000,000 new dwellings each year to keep pace with population growth.

Senate Passes Bill On Price Supports

Washington—(UPI)—The Senate today overwhelmingly approved a \$4 billion farm bill providing a \$90,000 ceiling on price support benefits to individual farmers.

The measure was approved by a roll call vote of 76-10.

Salem—(UPI)—A price-protest meeting of strawberry growers has been called for Thursday at 3 p.m. in the Woodburn armory, George Landrith, Salem-area berry grower, said today.

Landrith said all growers who were not satisfied with the 12-cents a pound price posted Monday at Birdseye division of General Foods, Woodburn, should come to the meeting.

Birdseye was the first processor to post a price for the 1959 strawberry crop in the mid-Willamette area.

The 12-cent price was the same one paid here last year. California is paying 14 cents this year.

Loyal Troops Report Nicaragua Victories

Managua, Nicaragua—(UPI)—Loyal troops reported victories today over airborne invaders from Costa Rica, but government spokesmen said three invasion schooners were on the way from Cuba by sea.

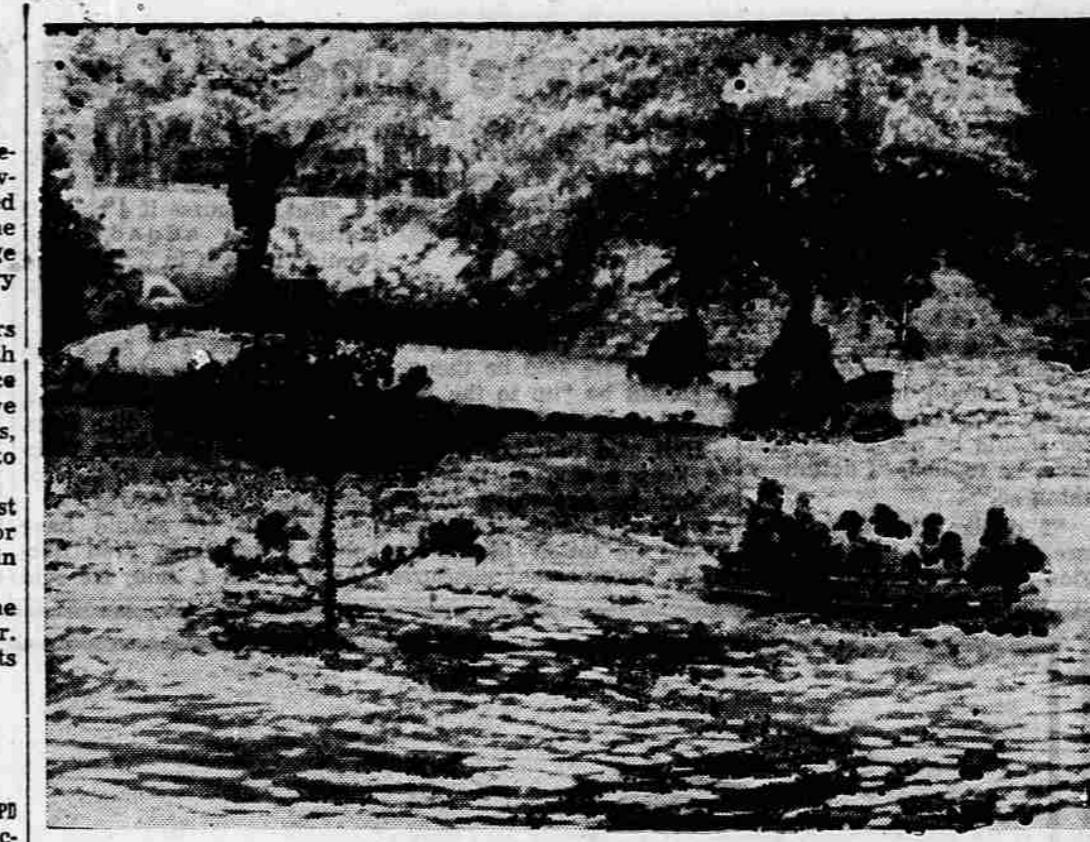
CHARLES ARTHUR ILER

Buyers Attracted By Stock Decline

New York—(UPI)—Stocks rallied irregularly today. Tuesday's decline attracted buyers early in the session when the electronics registered wide gains and many special issues moved ahead.

Enough of the leaders rose to help restore some of the industrial group's loss. Rails dipped most of the day but many were firmer as the close neared.

Utilities registered their 12th decline in 13 sessions. Aluminum issues ruled strong with gains ranging to more than 2 points in Alcoa which has just been included in the group used to calculate the industrial average. Kennecott led the coppers higher.

Automobile issues were firmer. J. I. Case rose a point. Textron was bid up on an increase in its dividend. Litton Industries split when the company was named to develop a guidance system for the Eagle missile.

Brazil Largest In South America

Washington—(UPI)—The countries that make up South America are Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, British Guiana, Chile, Colombia, Dutch Guiana, Ecuador, French Guiana, Paraguay, Peru, Uruguay and Venezuela.

The largest of these is Brazil with 61 million people living in 3,288,050 square miles. The smallest is Dutch Guiana with a population of 250,000 and an area of 55,400 square miles.

Central America consists of British Honduras, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua and Panama. The largest of these, Mexico, has a population of almost 31 million and an area of 760,373 square miles.

British Honduras is the smallest in population with about 81,000, but El Salvador is the smallest in area, 8,259 square miles.
