Central Point American Legion junior baseball team got three-hit pitching from Bill Anhorn and used four of its own safe blows to chalk up its fourth straight triumph of the season last night.

The Cheney Stud nine put over single markers in the second and third cantos to tip Grants Pass Mock Motors 2 to 0 at Cheney field. Next action for the Studs will be here on Saturday evening. Central Point, gunning for its fifth decision in five starts, will be host to Roseburg.

Last night, the Studs combined a triple by Jerry Hauck and a scorcher single by Ed Allen for the second inning tally. In the third they put together a double by Brad Gettling, a sacrifice by Steve Harris and a single by Jim Doster.

Grants Pass threatened to score with at least two men on base in five of its seven batting turns. The Climate city team had three on with no out in the first inning and three on with one down in the third.

Denny Samples started on the hill for Central Point but had control trouble. He walked the first three batters to fill the bags and Anhorn came on in relief. An infield flyout and two strikeouts retired the side. Mock Motors

batters retired in order in the second panel. But, in the third Anhorn hit a batter and walked one before striking out another. He issued another walk to load the sacks but a force out at home and another strikeout got him out of trouble.

No-Hitter Breaked

Anhorn whiffed a total of 10 and walked five in his five innings minus. Mock hit no ball out of the infield until the fifth panel when Rex Benner and Gary Holmes fled out to center. Bob Varner spoiled the no-hitter bid by beating out an infield tap in the sixth inning and Glen Davis followed with a high fly which dropped in for a single. Benner got the other hit in the seventh stanza.

In addition to his double, Gettling socked a first inning triple for the Stud team which is made up of Ashland and Crater high players. Steve Harris also hit safely.

Bill Cole, big, strong-armed Mock Chucker, yielded a total of six hits, fanned nine and allowed just one base on balls.

Central Point backed Anhorn with errorless play and only one miscue was charged to Grants Pass.

Idaho Locals Plan Vote on Contract

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Brown Keeps Title With Gory Victory

Washington—UPI—Champion Joe Brown, very dissatisfied with Wednesday night's gory victory over challenger Paolo Rosi, said today he would remain in the lightweight division and try to equal, at least, the late Benny Leonard's record of eight title defenses.

"I won't try to step up to the welterweight division," said the slender, 33-year-old champion who weighed only 132 pounds while scoring a ninth-round technical knockout victory over bloody Rosi of Italy and New York.

That was Brown's seventh defense in his 100th professional bout, "and it certainly wasn't one of my best performances."

Requires 10 Stitches

Rosi, who had 10 stitches taken in his right brow at Sibley hospital this morning and patches put on three other minor cuts about his eyes, claimed he was the victim of Brown's alleged butts and not his fists.

"I had the title in my hands," declared the baldish, 31-year-old challenger, "until I got his head in my face in the eighth round."

At the end of the eighth session, Rosi—who weighed 134 pounds—was ahead on the score sheets of nine sportswriters at the ringside in Uline Arena. Four writers had Brown ahead and two figured the bout even.

But on the official score sheets, the opinion was evenly divided. Referee Charlie Reynolds favored Rosi on a five-points-must basis, 76-71. Judge Norvel Lee gave each 75 points, and Judge Harvey Volkman, favored Brown, 77-75. The United Press International had Paolo in front, 78-74.

Brown insisted today he had fought a retreating fight in nearly every round, because, "I had to keep out of the way of Rosi's bald, billy-goat head. Otherwise my face would have been a bloody mess from his head—as his face was from my fists."

The estimated 4,500 fans in the arena were greatly disappointed when Drs. Clark Holstead and Jack Kneipp told the referee to notify Rosi that he could not continue because of the profusely bleeding wound—an inch and a half long and a quarter-inch wide—at the outside corner of his right brow.

Seattle Teamsters Vote Work Return

Seattle—UPI—Members of Teamsters Local 174 Wednesday night voted, 5 to 1, to return to their jobs on construction projects today and thus ended the 14-day strike that had kept 15,000 men idle in western Washington and part of eastern Washington for 24 days.

Earlier, members of Operating Engineers locals approved a contract with members of the Associated General Contractors.

The engineers' contract provided for a modified hiring hall arrangement, which had been the main issue in their dispute with the AGC. They also received an across-the-board wage boost of 30 cents an hour now and an additional 25 cents starting June 1, 1960.

The Teamsters' new contract was similar, a spokesman said.

Although the way was cleared for resuming operations today, an industry spokesman said it probably would be Monday before work is back in high gear.
