"They hustled. You can't ask any more than that," he declared. "They didn't quit," he added.

"I was a little disappointed and the kids were, too," the mentor stated concerning the 4 to 3 loss to the Indians. Main regret concerning the game was not being able to take advantage of the opportunities to score, particularly after tying up the game in the seventh inning. Kovenz said that he was "real pleased" to see the Tornado "come back" in what would have ordinarily been the last inning of the game.

American Legion junior baseball will be next for a number of Medford high players. Coach Kovenz will handle the team and has called for the crew to assemble next Wednesday for drill. The team will have a warm-up on June 12 against Grants Pass and will have a league engagement with the same club on June 14. Still listing Sugar Ray as champion in its latest ratings today, the magazine points out that Robinson has been stripped of his title by the National Boxing association—of which New York is not a member.

Officers Warn Against Picking Up Fawn Deer

State police have issued a reminder that it is unlawful to pick up fawn deer.

They said that this is the time of year when doe deer will be giving birth to fawns as well as the time of year when people will be visiting streams and forests for recreation.

It is expected that these people seeking recreation will see a number of fawns. In most instances, police said, the mother will not be seen with her fawn for she probably will be nearby in search of food.

Doer Will Return

Officers pointed out that many people are of the opinion, if they do not see the doe with her fawn, that she has abandoned it or has met with some disaster. This, in most instances is not true, according to police, and they cautioned people against picking up fawns even though they feel they are doing a good deed.

Police said that a doe will always return to her fawn and accept it, contrary to the opinion of some people that, if the fawn is touched or handled, the mother will abandon it to starve. According to Oregon statute, it is unlawful for any person except the game commission to take, carry or move from its natural habitat and to hold in captivity the young of any game bird or animal.

TOUGHER PITCHING
Part of the disappointment lay in the indications that Medford for the full season was a better hitting club with better pitching than The Dalles. Against the Indians, the Tornado, nevertheless, ran into tougher pitching than anticipated. Kovenz reported concerning the northeast and north central Oregon champs that "they had a good club and they hustled."

While Medford at The Dalles played its only game under lights of the season, the lights were not really a determining factor in the game, according to the Tornado coach. He said that Medford hitting might have been better under daylight conditions but that Indian hitting might have been better, too.

UMP'S CALL TOO QUICK

Concerning the seventh inning infield fly ruling which probably cost Medford a run, and a winning one at that, Kovenz said he felt that shortstop Bob Porter, who muffed the catch and threw wild to third base, was not reasonably under the ball. He felt that the umpire made his call too quickly on the play. The Dalles' infield was playing in close at the time, since the bases were loaded, with the idea of cutting off a run.

Porter had to go well back for the ball to short left field. The book calls for the infield fly rule, with the batter automatically out, when (with runners on first and second or with the bases loaded) a fair fly ball is hit which can be caught by an infielder with ordinary effort. The batter is out whether the ball is caught or not. It's the job of the umpire to declare "infield fly" immediately when it is apparent a batted ball will be such a fly.

FOUR RUNS POSSIBLE

Walks to Ray Konopasek and Wayne Thompson and a hit by Ken Durkee set up the situation at The Dalles. Ken Jensen hit a fly to short left field and was ruled out. Konopasek scored on the muff and wild throw to third. Had Jensen been allowed first base, the sacks would have been loaded with no one out.

A hit by Cal Dean, walk to Lowell Dean and sacrifice flyout by George Ice came after Jensen's fly, enough for three more runs in the inning, instead of the two as it turned out.

THING TO DO

When Ken Durkee held up on third base on his long blast opening the game, the Black Tornado "played it the way it should have been played," Kovenz maintained. There was a good relay in from the outfield and "it was the thing to do," he stated. "It was good baseball," according to the mentor. He pointed to the order of batters following the lead-off man, Jensen, the Deans, Ice and remarked, "If they can't bring you in, no one can." He drove his point further home with the comment, "why press your luck?"

REAL FINE SEASON

We go right along in agreement with coach Johnny's feeling that the Black Tornado diamonds had a good year. They had a real fine season. How else can you regard a record of 19 victories against just six setbacks, an undefeated regular league mark and not only a district title but the southwestern Oregon crown. The fact that pitcher Dennis Barr was named to the State all-star game squad and the fact that six members of the Tornado crew were chosen to the conference all-star team by the votes of rival players and coaches are other evidences that the 1959 season was one that Medford baseballers can be proud of.

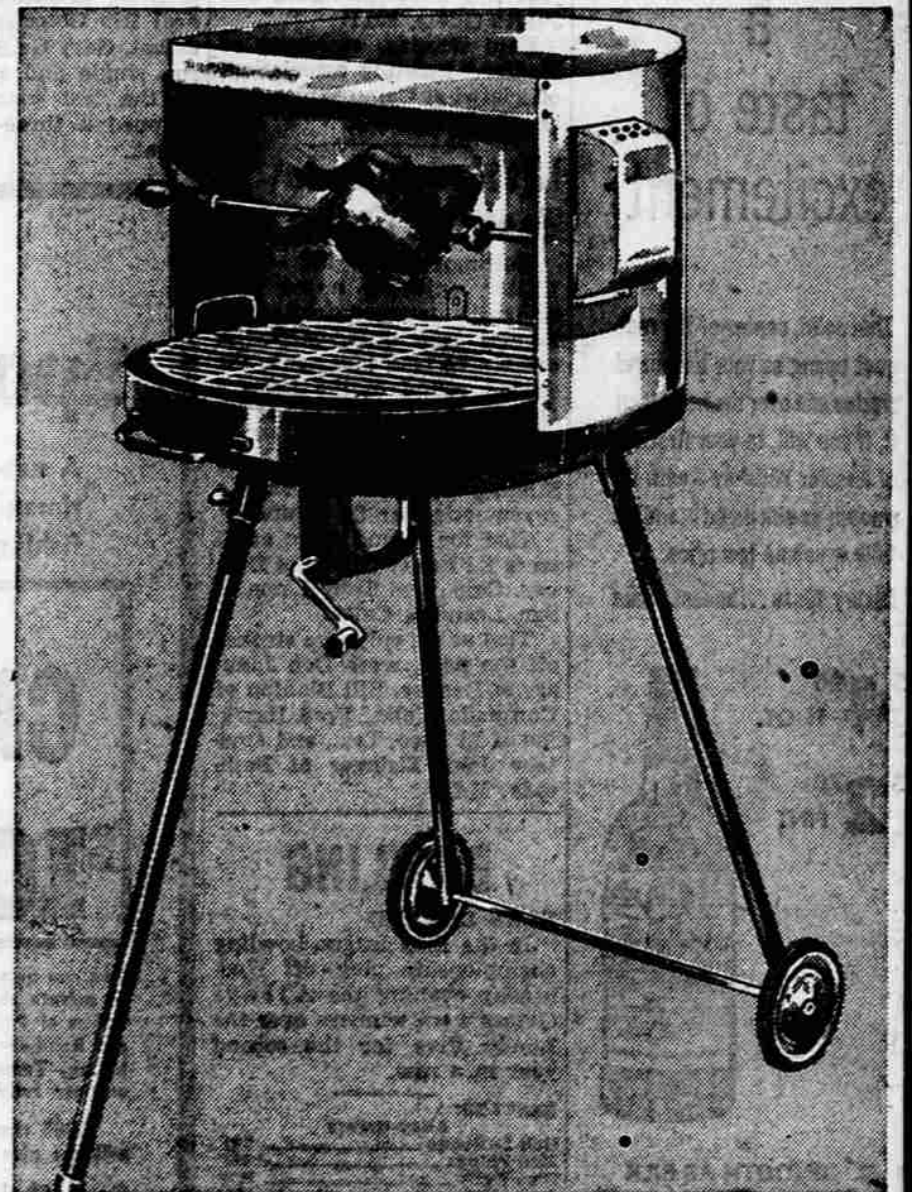
