The Medical Roundup

Acne

Dr. Herbert Ratner has written a fine article on acne. He says that since there are several causes

for acne there must be several types of treatment. Because of this, when people write asking me how to treat their acne, I can't give any simple answer. Dr. Ratner says, the physician tries to lessen the activity of the grease-making glands in the skin, perhaps by applying some form of radiation and by modifying the diet.

He will try to combat infection of these glands, perhaps with a small daily dose of some antibiotic drug. Because there is a relation between acne and the glands of internal secretion, it helps in some cases to use estrogenic (varian) substances and perhaps steroids of the corticoid type. Some skin specialists will no longer use x-rays because of the possibility of doing harm, but some still use them. Other men use ultra-violet rays. Most skin specialists advise the youngsters against eating too much and especially against eating foods such as chocolate to which they may happen to be allergic.

The youngster should keep a record of unusual foods eaten the day before his acne flares up. Some doctors give toxicoids, vaccines, vitamins, ointments and psychotherapy. Some give psychotherapy to help the youngster who gets to feeling very unhappy and sexually inferior because of the condition of the face. After the disease has quit, perhaps around the age of 22, if the skin is badly pitted, it can be planed flat again.

Some skin specialists advise that the patient wash his face twice a day with soap. This will tend to open up the mouths of the fat-producing glands. Some advise that a comedone extractor be bought at a drugstore. With this, someone in the home should squeeze out black heads as soon as they form, thus cutting down on the number of infected pimples on the face.

A Vaccine Against Measles

Drs. John M. Adams, David T. Imagawa, Stanley W. Wright and George Tarjan, from the University of California, Los Angeles, Medical School recently announced that they have a vaccine against measles which they have tested on several hundred patients in a state hospital. Three years after these people were vaccinated, an epidemic of measles came along which attacked more than 10 per cent of the patient population.

In this epidemic only a third as many of the vaccinated persons came down

with measles as did those in the unvaccinated group. It is advisable that we have a measles vaccine because in many cases measles is not a mild disease. Last year in this country there were more than twice as many deaths resulting from measles as from polio. Occasionally, measles is followed by an encephalitis (brain fever), and half of the children so affected are left with some permanent injury of the brain. If research workers in the field of viruses can wipe out measles, it will be a great accomplishment.

Six Crater Lake Boy Scouts at Annual Meeting

Six Crater Lake Council Scouters and their wives attended the 49th annual meeting of the National Council, Boy Scouts of America, in San Francisco Friday and Saturday. The delegation was headed by Council President J. A. McDougall; Scout Executive Judson Compton; Camping Chairman Floyd Somers; executive Board Member Bob Church, all of Medford; and Explorer Chairman Carroll Smith and Council Member West Hassell, both of Ashland.

Friday noon the Scouters attended a Region 11 luncheon at the Sir Francis Drake hotel. They joined with Scouters from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Alaska, and parts of Montana, Wyoming and California.

Opening Session

Friday delegates assembled at the Curran theater for the opening session of the 49th annual meeting. Messages were read from Kenneth K. Becktel of San Francisco, retiring president of the National Council, and President Eisenhower, extending his "personal congratulations" and said Scouting "led by a splendid band of volunteers, has been a vital factor in the lives of millions of young Americans."

President Eisenhower is Honorary President of the organization and has been a member of its National Executive Board since 1948.

Special sessions were held Thursday afternoon for council presidents and explorer chairmen, which were attended by McDougall and Smith. The group will return to Medford Saturday evening after attending the final session. The 1962 annual meeting of the National Council will be held in Portland.

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Alaska's Booth Has Two Sections

Portland - Alaska's \$25,000 exhibition booth at the Centennial Exhibition will be divided into two sections, according to Jules Radinsky, personal representative of Gov. William Egan.

Radinsky, here to supervise the exhibit, says that one part of the displays will be devoted to the old traditional Alaska, featuring such symbolic exhibits as stuffed polar bears, Kodiak bears and the world's largest moose, measuring seven feet from the ground to the shoulders.

These, he says, are representative of his state's "smaller animals."

Eskimo ivory carvers will be shown at work as well as totem pole carvers and an eskimo from Alaska's Mountain of Jade will do jade carving. An Aleut woman will demonstrate Attu basket weaving, a dying art. This woman is believed to be the last in the world who knows how to do this type of weaving, so fine that it will hold water.

Second section of the exhibit will portray the new Alaska with an artist's conception of a pulp mill at Ketchikan, a scale model power display and other symbols of Alaska's industrial future. Shown in the International Theater at the Exposition will be pictorial travelogues and the first and only picture of the Russian fishing fleet off the coast of Alaska.

Staffing the booth during the 100 days of the Exposition will be two Eskimo girls, two Aleut girls and a Chilkat Indian, all thoroughly versed in Alaska's lore and eager to answer questions about one of the country's two newest states.
