

## Florists Beat RV Maids Twice; Mazzuca Records 3rd No-Hit, No-Run Win

Portland - Louise Mazzuca hurled her third straight no-hit, no-run verdict of the season last night as the Erv Lind Florists nipped the smooth-playing Rogue Valley Dairy Maids 1 to 0 in eight innings and swept a two-game week end and in the Northwest Women's Major Softball League.

The Florists won 3 to 0 Saturday night in a game which each team collect just two hits.

Mazzuca whiffed 11 batters and gave two bases on balls in eight. The Florists reached Allen Callaghan for four errors. The RV pitcher walked seven and struck out two. Mazzuca has given no hits in 22 innings.

In the bottom of the eighth in the Sunday mix, Dot Dobie tripled and two walks filled the bases. An attempted squeeze failed but Carolyn Spady singled to bring in the game's lone tally.

Rogue Valley survived a threat in the sixth inning by getting the side retired after the Linds had loaded the bases with a hit, fielders option and walk with no one out. Hap Piper and Roma Mongold socked the other safeties for the Florists.

**Jobson Homers**  
On Saturday night for the Portlanders, Carolyn Fitzwater reached third base on a single and an error in the third inning and was squeezed home by Dobie. In the sixth inning for two runs, a homer by Margaret Doherty followed by a single to a Florist.

The Dairy Maids in the fifth inning had two possible

runs cut off at the plate. Callaghan gained first base on an error. Pat Barron laid down a sacrifice bunt but a wild throw on the play put the runners on second and third. Shirley Hanson knocked the ball to pitcher Jackie Rice who threw to first. The relay to home caught Callaghan for a double play. Diane Wall hit safely. She then headed for second on a steal effort and on the throw to second, which did not get the runner, Barron ran for home. Barron was out on the throw back from second and sliding home suffered a knee injury which may keep her sidelined two or three weeks.

Janet Pfaff blasted one of the two Rogue Valley hits.

## Winston-Salem NAI A Champ

Sloux Falls, S. D. - (UPI) - Tiny, all-Negro Winston-Salem, N. C., college, with a total enrollment of only 200 boys and a travelling team of three, was the nation's small college track champion today and looked to still bigger things - the coming NCAA big college meet.

Three of Winston-Salem's speedsters came away with seven places between them at last week end's National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NCA) meet, giving Winston-Salem the small college title by one point over second-place East Texas State.

**Triple Winner**  
Four of Winston-Salem's three of them turned in by champion hurdler Elias Gilbert, who won the 220-yard low and the 120 and 440-yard highs, thus becoming the first triple-winner in the NCA meet's eight-year history.

East Texas managed to win two firsts, one second, three thirds, two fourths and a sixth, but still could only amass 55 points to Winston-Salem's 56. Kansas State Teachers, Emporia, Kan., wound up third with 36 1/5 points, followed by Mogan State, Baltimore, Md., with 33; Kearney, Neb., with 26, and Humboldt State, Arcata, Calif., with 23 1/5.

Seattle - (UPI) - The Fresno State Bulldogs Saturday earned the right to represent District 8 in NCAA baseball finals at Omaha, Neb., by blasting Washington, 10-5, in the final game of a three-game series here.

Earlier in the day Washington had made the third game necessary by nipping the California team, 5-4. Fresno State won the series opener Friday night, 3-2.

Steve Anderson of Oregon won the broad jump with 22 feet 10 inches and Dave Edstrom of Oregon was second to Spike Arlt of Washington State in the high hurdles.

Roseburg Lockwood Motors, opening its American Legion junior baseball season, swept a two-game week-end series from the Central Point Cheney Studs. A counter in the top of the seventh inning yesterday gave Roseburg the nod by 1 to 0, a score which was in sharp contrast to the 19 to 10 at Cheney field on Saturday night.

Two hits and the lone miscue charged to the Studs figured in the single run yesterday afternoon. Chuck Hiney safetied but was forced out on Marv French's infield ground ball which Cheney pitcher Bill Anhorn fielded and tossed to second base.

French then raced out to steal. Stud catcher Ed Allen made a fine throw in time but second baseman Brad Gettling was unable to hang on to the horsehide as the runner slid in and French was safe. Les Bogner then hit to drive in his teammate.

In the Saturday scuffle Lockwood accumulated five runs in the first inning, three in the second and five more in the third for a 13 to 0 gap. Central Point cut the margin to 13 to 8 with two markers in the fourth frame and six in the sixth. But Roseburg gained another six in the seventh while the Studs could muster just two more.

**Grants Pass Wednesday**  
The week-end games were non-district affairs. Central Point begins district action on Wednesday as host to Grants Pass Mock Motors. Game time at Cheney field will be 8 p.m.

Yesterday, Lockwood held down the Studs with the combined three-hit twirling of Jerry Halladay and Bob Livingston while Bill Anhorn chucked a creditable seven hitter for the home team. Halladay pitched two hit ball over four innings, striking out five and walking just one before Bogner took over his batting spot to add offensive punch for the Roseburg nine. Livingston gave up one hit and fanned four batters.

Anhorn registered six strikeouts and issued just one base on balls.

Bogner hit two for two yesterday, the only men with more than one hit in the game. Booth was the week end batting star. He had two singles and a triple in four times up yesterday and socked one sacrifice flyout.

Cheney had runners as far as second base in four separate innings yesterday. Longest blast of the afternoon was Anhorn's fly to deep center field over the head of Bob Scott for a two-bagger. Roseburg on Sunday, in addition to its score, had runners three times as far as third base. Two got that far with the help of balks in the fourth canto and one. Roseburg had 12 hits Saturday and the help of 13 bases on balls off three Central Point pitchers. There were six errors on each side. Bob Whipple went the distance pitching for Lockwood. He gave up just four hits but yielded 10 walks. Roseburg slapped five hits in its first inning spree but just one in the second

A pair of fours, which doesn't mean much in poker, wrecked the front-running

Solons twice Sunday night and cut their margin over San Diego to 2 1/2 games. In this case, the "fours" consisted of a four-run rally by the Mounties in the third inning of the opener which boosted Watkins to his 5-1 win and a similar eruption in the second inning of the nightcap that cinched a 6-1 triumph.

But those short bursts in Sacramento were peanuts compared to explosions heard elsewhere. Portland unloaded for seven runs in the seventh inning to crush Phoenix in their solo tilt. Seattle and Salt Lake took turns sandbagging each other with six-run outbursts to split a twin bill. The Rainiers had their big moment in the eighth inning of

the first game to win, 13-7, after the Bees had tallied five in the seventh. Then Salt Lake countered with a half dozen during the same frame to insure a 10-5 win.

After San Diego downed Spokane, 4-2, in a conservative opener, the Indians clinched the finale with a four-run jolt in the second inning and went on to a 5-4 decision.
