Auto Industry Prospects Bright

Portland—UPI—An automobile industry executive said today that business is good this year and prospects for the future are even brighter.

William F. Hufstader, head of General Motors' distribution staff, told a noon luncheon meeting of newsmen that a forecast made earlier of six million passenger car sales in the United States this year is becoming a realistic estimate of the industry's potential.

This figure, he said, would represent a gain of more than 1,300,000 units over the 1958 total. It includes half a million foreign imports.

For the first time in a number of years, he said, the industry experienced a spring upturn in demand.

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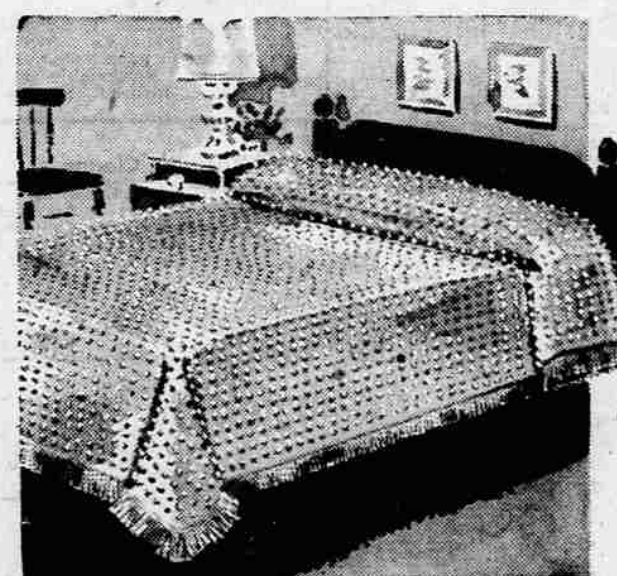
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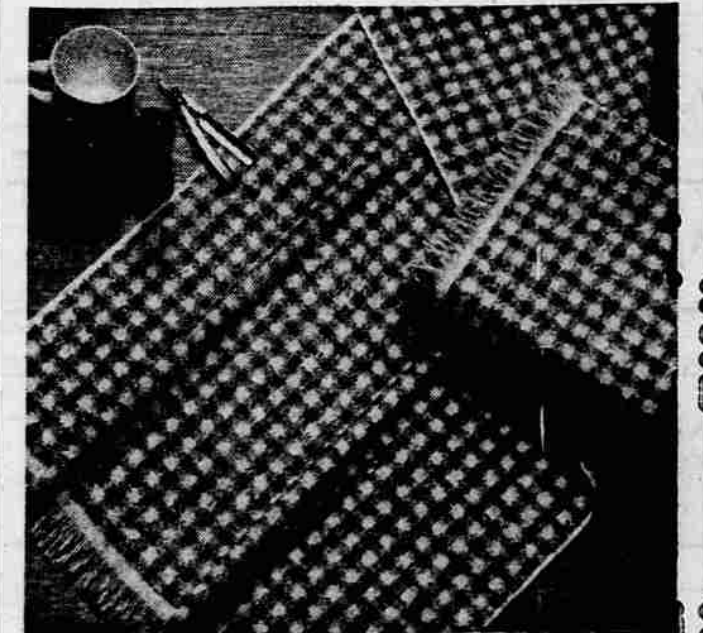
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
