

Dillon Confirmed As Undersecretary

Washington - (UPI) - Senate confirmation of C. Douglas Dillon as undersecretary of commerce was overshadowed for a few hours Tuesday by debate on Dillon.

The Senate's okay finally came by voice vote Tuesday night after it brushed aside Sen. Russell B. Long's one-man attack on Dillon's handling of the economic foreign aid program.

Dillon succeeds Christian A. Herter in the State Department's No. 2 post.

Long found no support in the Foreign Relations Committee or on the Senate floor for his charge that Dillon's administration of the economic aid program made possible "huge profits by political favorites and corrupt heads of government around the world."

The Strauss nomination battle was marked by disclosure late Tuesday that a Florida man had admitted signing other people's names to 47 telegrams sent to Sen. George A. Smathers (D-Fla.) urging Strauss' confirmation.

Columnist Heard In Liberace Trial

London - (UPI) - Columnist William Connor took the stand in his own defense today at the Liberace libel trial and denied he ever had any intention of saying the pianist was homosexual.

Connor testified that Liberace's performances had "left him with a feeling of astonishment to begin with and then of nausea . . . because of the flamboyant nature of his appearance, the actual spectacle of the man and then because of the cloying, sickening nature of what he was singing and trying to put across."

Liberace is suing the tabloid London Daily Mirror and Connor, who writes a column under the pen name of Cassandra, for libel, charging they had implied he was a homosexual. Liberace has denied this.

Portland Man Stabbed in Back

Portland - (UPI) - Clarence "Smoky" Williams, 44, Portland shoe shine man, was stabbed to death in a downtown Portland restaurant and tavern Tuesday night. He was dead on arrival at Good Samaritan Hospital.

Police held Ralph Peralto, Portland, for questioning. Bartender Alex Elizendo, 42, told police that just before the stabbing, he broke up a fight at the bar between Williams and Peralto.

Elizendo told police he ordered Peralto out of the place. He said the man subsequently re-entered the tavern several times and was put out each time.

Another witness told police that the last time Peralto entered, Williams was walking down the bar, and was stabbed in the back. He said Williams ran out of the building with Peralto following. Williams collapsed around the corner with two knife wounds in the back.

Water Resources Redraft Considered

Seattle - (UPI) - A third redraft of a proposed water resources program was considered by the Columbia River Interstate Compact Commission at a meeting here Tuesday. No final action was taken.

The compact would have to be approved by Idaho, Montana, Washington and Oregon to be effective. Nevada, Utah and Wyoming also belong to the seven-member commission but their approval would not be required. Earlier drafts failed to win the approval of Oregon and Washington.
