

# German Communists Believe in Eventual West Berlin Control

Editor's note: What weight should be given to German Communist threats of a Berlin blockade? What control does the Communist regime hold over the people of East Germany?

To seek the answers, UPI's Wellington Long, news manager for Germany, joined other Western correspondents on a visit to East Germany this week. Here is his report.

East Berlin—UPI—The Communist regime in East Germany probably is bluffing when it threatens to force the Western Allies out of West Berlin.

But the German Communists do believe that sooner or later they will have a great degree of influence over the activities of the Allied garrisons in Berlin and their supply.

The Communists are less confident about their control over 10 million restless East Germans.

That is the sum of impressions gathered during a visit to East Berlin.

**'Overzealousness' Blamed for Wires**  
Washington—UPI—Sen. George A. Smathers (D-Fla.) said Tuesday an overzealous constituent has admitted sending him 47 telegrams signed with other people's names urging confirmation of Adm. Lewis L. Strauss as commerce secretary.

Smathers reported last week that two of the purported signers advised that they had not authorized use of their names.

He told the Senate that he has received indignant complaints from two of the signers.

The mystery was cleared Monday, he said, when he received a wire from David Kemmerer, Palm Beach, Fla., saying that "through an excess of zeal" he had sent 47 separate telegrams bearing different names urging confirmation of Strauss.

to East Berlin and East Germany this week and from talks with all sorts of people ranging from Communist Party central committee down to railway ticket takers and construction workers.

**Less Threatening in Private**  
When speaking for the record they talk through of how the Soviet will back them up in the long list of things they say they will forbid the Allies to do.

When they're not talking propaganda the German Communist leaders speak a lot less threateningly. They still maintain that East Germany will sign a separate treaty with Russia, but they are vague on details and indicate it will be the simple passage of time that will give them control over West Berlin's lifelines.

Asked at what point in stalemated East-German negotiations an East German-Russian peace treaty would be signed, East Berlin's Communist Party Chief Paul Verner declared, "When that would be, no one can say. I'm no fortune teller, but we won't wait until 1961 when the Adenauer regime in West Germany is to have completed its atomic armament."

The Communists still refuse to believe that the West will not agree to their peace treaty demands, and they think they're making gains as far as winning some sort of recognition from the Western powers.

They believe the Allies now are moving towards an agreement whereby they will negotiate with the East German regime in supplying their garrisons in West Berlin.

But the Communists still worry about their own influence in East Germany. "The regime would not last a minute if the Soviet army left," said a man met in the East Berlin railway station. "Even a lot of party members could switch. But as long as the Russian army is here, there won't be another revolt."

## Enforcement Program Discussed by Police

If motorists drove as well as they know how, there would be fewer traffic accidents, injuries and deaths, according to Chief of Police Charles P. Champlin of Medford.

Chief Champlin made this point recently in discussing the department's traffic safety enforcement program.

"By and large," he said, "it's not lack of driving ability or knowledge that causes accidents. The cause usually is carelessness, taking that once-in-a-while chance, violating the law that is there for your safety."

From the background of his experience, Chief Champlin said, he believes there is no such thing as a minor violation. He said so-called minor violations lead to many traffic accidents.

An enforcement program, he explained, is partially an education program with a fine doing much to bring a violator's attention to the problem. Two more serious means of education - license suspension and jail sentence - are used when the fine has not

succeeded in getting the motorist to obey the law, he added.

"Before you start feeling sorry for someone you see getting a ticket," Chief Champlin said, "remember that motorist was committing a traffic violation which the records show causes accidents. When one of our officers stops a violator, he is saving lives - possibly your own."

**Perkins Assigned to Draw Up Program**  
Detective Lt. Lyle Perkins, Medford police, has been assigned the responsibility for drawing up a program of organization and procedure for the Western States Crime Conference.

Perkins was one of an estimated 350 delegates at a meeting of the WSSC held last week at Kalispell, Mont.

## Building Permits Total \$559,675

Medford building permits for construction with a total value of \$559,675 were issued last month, the city building department reported. A total of 148 permits were reported.

April's figure showed valuation at \$322,902 and total permits at 159. May, 1958 brought 108 permits with total valuation at \$287,160, records show.

Twenty permits for new single-family residences valued at \$282,000 were issued last month, according to the report. One new permit for a new \$12,000 duplex was also reported.

Three permits for new businesses valued at a total of \$135,000 were issued last month. Eight permits for remodeling or repairing businesses, in the total amount of \$56,300, were also reported.

In addition, a permit was issued for constructing underground facilities valued at \$38,000 for California Oregon Power company on its property at South Grape st. and Stewart ave.

A total of 1,177 inspections were reported last month, compared to 1,243 in April and 1,145 in March. The May fee total was reported at \$2,226.40 against \$5,955.08 in April.

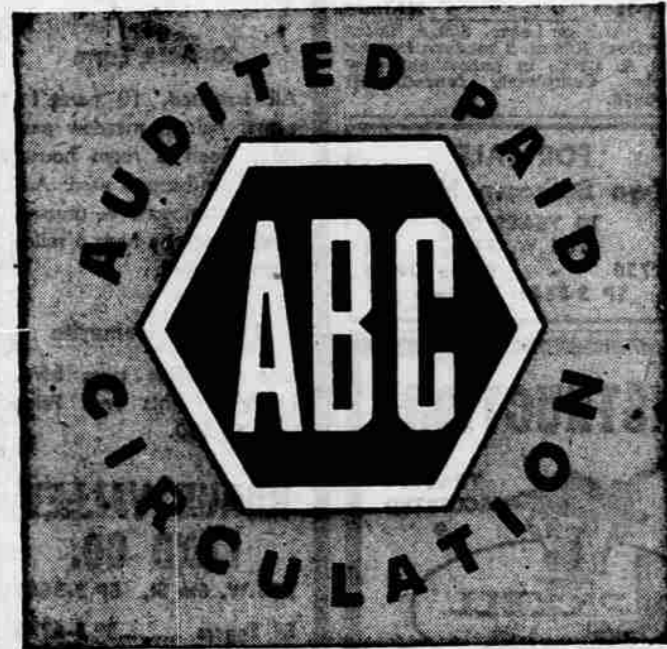
