Wheat Surplus Pressures Congress

Washington - UPI - A new forecast of a bumper 1959 wheat crop put additional pressure on Congress today to pass legislation to reduce the mounting wheat surplus.

But a mood of defeatism seized the House on the second day of debate on the measure. A revolt by Democratic congressmen from big cities threatened to torpedo a Democratic plan for cutting production of surplus wheat.

The Republican plan also appeared to have little chance of passage. Should all legislation be scuttled, it would leave Democratic farm leaders without an answer to President Eisenhower's challenge that Congress do something to combat wheat surpluses.

The main list of steels at their best showed gains of 1/2 to more than 2 points with new highs in Jones & Laughlin, Wheeling, Inland, and Carpenter Steel. The last at its best was up 7 1/2 points.

Chemicals dipped from their best after DuPont had risen 5 points and Allied Chemical 2. Aluminum issues, recent strong spots, rose to new highs and later slipped off on realizing. Automobile issues made an irregular decline.

9,626 Persons View Exposition
Portland - UPI - Oregon's 100-day Centennial Exposition was off to a damp but enthusiastic start today.

Attendance at the first day of the show was 9,626. About 1,000 persons showed up for opening ceremonies which featured a 100-gun salute and a ribbon cutting ceremony led by Gov. Mark Hatfield, Gov. Albert Rosellini of Washington was among those present.

It was rainy during the late afternoon and evening hours and more rain was falling today.

Public Hearings on Planners' Agenda
Two public hearings head the agenda for the Medford planning commission's meeting at 7:30 o'clock tonight at city hall.

One hearing concerns a request for a change of zone from single and two family residential to limited commercial for properties along the south side of East Jackson st. between Genesee and Stark sts.

A request for re-zoning a single property in this block was denied previously as spot zoning. The present request according to statements at official city meetings, was encouraged by the recent rezoning of property at the northeast corner of Genesee and Jackson to limited commercial to permit a branch office of the Rogue Valley State bank.

The other hearing slated for tonight concerns a requested zone change for property at Biddle and McAndrews rds. from single family residential to light industrial, reportedly to permit development of a trailer park.

Logging Engine to Take Final Trip
Medford's gift iron horse, a logging locomotive donated to the city by Medford Corporation, is slated to make its last run from the Butte Falls timber country June 27.

The last run was reported at last night's city parks and recreation commission meeting by Russ Jamison, commission president.

Bill Gates, Medco railroad yard foreman, told the commission that two cars and a caboose could seat approximately 114 guests on the run from Henshaw rd. below Butte Falls to the Medco siding in Medford.

The locomotive's final destination, by a route and methods as yet undetermined, will be the city's West Jackson st. park site.

The commission last night discussed who should have priority for making the trip.

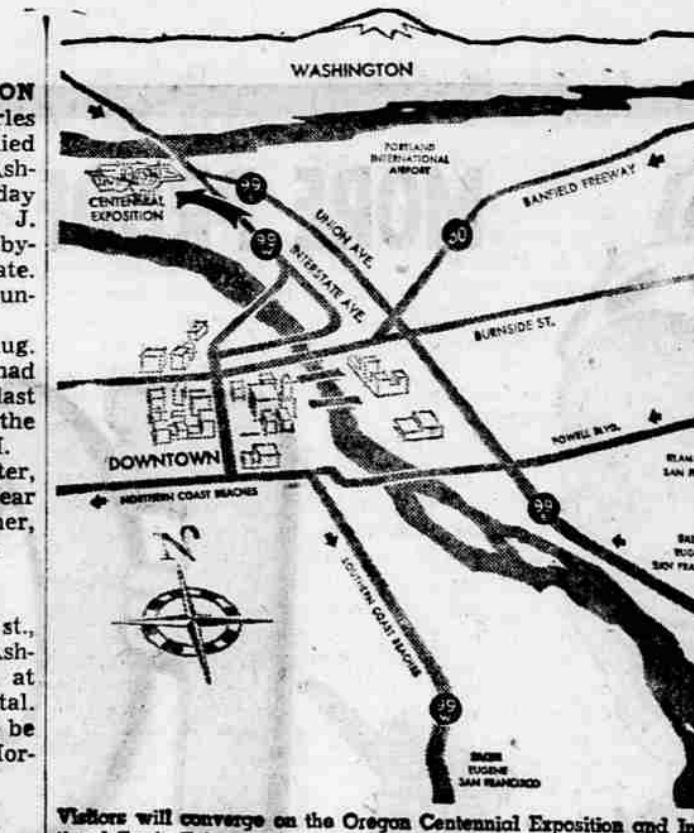

Creek Pollution Trouble Reviewed At Kiwanis Club

This city is perhaps at the crossroads in determining whether it will be a clean community, Russell DeForest, Medford attorney, declared yesterday in a report on the Bear creek pollution problem to members of the Kiwanis club.

DeForest, president of the Medford chapter of Oregon Sportsmen club of Jackson County, warned that this community could become like some of the "hub" cities of the midwest where streams have deteriorated.

Addressing the service club's luncheon at Rogue Valley Country club, DeForest told Kiwanians that, if the people of the community do not treat the creek pollution matter with consideration, the people living along the stream will not treat it with consideration. He mentioned that an underlying cause of the problem is thoughtlessness and he brought out how the trouble grows by multiplication of various causes of pollution.

The speaker told of individuals who look upon the creek as a means of saving money for disposal. He stated that this is not a proper attitude and is a short range viewpoint. DeForest emphasized that the longer range view of treating the disposal problem as a business expense is best for a clean community.

In solving the Bear creek trouble, he pointed to laws already on the books, which can be enforced and to the possibility of increasing streamflow. He voiced the opinion that voluntary cooperation, advocated by state authorities, is not succeeding.

DeForest mentioned the importance of Bear creek from the standpoints of health, aesthetic value and fish and wildlife.

On the matter of health, he said that it is almost impossible to keep children away from the stream. Aesthetically, he spoke of the creek as a detriment to Medford and deflating to property value in the form of an "open sewer."

Whether the city has a nice environment is important to the growth of the community, DeForest said.

The attorney reported that Bear Creek is one of the better steelhead spawning streams in this area and that it is a natural trout fishery.

Nicaragua Rebel Invaders Surrender

Managua, Nicaragua - UPI - More than 40 rebel invaders were reported today to have surrendered unconditionally to Nicaraguan troops but another 16 vowed to fight to the death.

A high government official said the mass surrender took place in the Santo Domingo area.

It had been expected. Two foreign correspondents returned from the area with a Roman Catholic priest Wednesday and reported 46 invaders had hoisted a white bed-sheet in a farmyard and were ready to give up.

Santo Domingo is one of two fronts established by more than 100 invaders flown in from Costa Rica May 31 and June 1.

The military reported that invaders on the other front, Olama, had broken up into small groups and scattered.
