Mary Sue Woolfolk Crowned Queen of Portland Festival

Portland — (UPI) — With Oregon's fanciest birthday party officially under way Wednesday at the Centennial Exposition grounds here, the 51st annual Rose Festival selected its queen Wednesday night in Multnomah stadium and the pace of excitement quickened today as the dual celebrations continued.

In a downpour of rain, Mary Sue Woolfolk of Jefferson high school Wednesday night was crowned Queen Mary Sue I to rule over the week-long festival. A crowd of 17,523 gathered in Multnomah stadium despite the adverse weather to watch the selection. Members of the Rose court were protected from the rain by pink umbrellas.

Outlook Not Bright
The weatherman admitted the outlook through Friday was not particularly bright. The forecast was a few showers and occasional sunny periods. Officials hoped for a break in the weather before the Grand Floral parade Saturday.

Nine U. S. Navy ships including the flagship cruisers Helena and Bremerton were to arrive this afternoon to complete the naval contingent here for the festivities.

Dean Vincent Buys Brokerage Firm

Dean Vincent Inc., Portland mortgage brokerage firm, has purchased the mortgage brokerage business of Mark A. Goldy Inc., and will begin operations here July 1, it was announced.

Medford manager will be Richard (Dick) Henselman, who has been Goldy's associate in the brokerage insurance and real estate business. The firm's office will be in the same location as the Goldy's, on Front st. between Sixth and Main sts.

Goldy said he will continue active in other lines of business in Medford, retaining the firm name. Henselman will also continue his association with Goldy.

The Vincent company is one of the largest in the mortgage business in Oregon, and Goldy said their opening an office here will mean a consistent and large supply of mortgage money for southern Oregon's needs. Vincent is mortgage loan correspondent for several large insurance companies, including Metropolitan Life Insurance company of New York, largest in the world.

Dean Vincent Jr., president of the firm, and James F. Kavanagh, first vice president in charge of mortgage loans, will be frequent visitors to Medford as a result of the new move.

Minesweeper Hits Dock at Portland

Portland — (UPI) — The minesweeper USS Inflex, one of the U.S. Navy ships to arrive here Wednesday for the annual Rose Festival, developed a fire in an engine room as it entered the Willamette river from the Columbia river. It lost steering control and grazed the dock of General Petroleum Company, tearing out five pilings.

Navy authorities reported minor damage to the side of the ship and no injuries. The fire was minor and quickly controlled.

The Inflex continued into Portland harbor and tied up at the seawall at the foot of Alder st.

Investigators were checking into the amount of damage at the pier.
