**Medford Man Files Suit Against County**

**National Economy Expected To Move Up in Last Three Months**

New York—Dun & Bradstreet which keeps its fingers on the pulse of business, has a glowing report on industrial progress and prospects for the year.

Its findings are contained in an article titled "First Hints of a New Boom?" in the current "Dun's Review and Modern Industry."

It doesn't give a conclusion on the boom question but it notes that business men are closely watching the rate of expansion and speculating whether a boom is in the making.

Here is how D & B sizes up the remainder of 1959:

"After a temporary—but somewhat more than seasonal—setback in the third quarter, the economy in the last three months will move to new high ground."

It looks for a rise in employment and a slow dip in unemployment until it is somewhere near the pre-recession average of 4 per cent, with the number of employed at a record level.

Here are the concomitants of increased employment: A record high in personal income which means consumers will spend more, and save more.

Pofits Will Climb  
Higher sales and continued cost cutting will mean wider corporate profit margins.

And wider profit margins will in turn mean businessmen will revise upward their plans for capital spending.

However, Dun and Bradstreet doesn't look for a sizable upturn in industrial building much before the end of 1959. That type of construction will be able to take up some slack of home construction later on. Meantime, commercial building and public construction will keep overall construction totals at a record high.

The economic service believes that the growing cost of mortgage money will soon slow down the rate of home construction. Other building costs also are expected to move up.

The consumer price index is expected to start edging up early in the fall with steady food prices offset by higher apparel, service and housing

costs.

Here are some further findings of the survey:  
Steel production for the first half of this year is likely to top that for any comparable period.

**Auto Sales Are Up**  
With sales of new passenger cars running at the highest levels since 1955, automobile producers expect sales this year to be even a bit higher than the 5.5 million predicted.

Truck output for all of 1959 is estimated at 1.1 million units, up about 20 per cent from last year, but still below the 1.4 million unit record of 1951.

Total dollar volume for consumer spending should run about 5 per cent higher than 1958, with gains in durables outstripping soft goods.

With more buying in durables, there'll be increased use of credit with the prospect of a record high before the end of the year.

Here is what the Dun & Bradstreet survey had to say about inflation stimulants:  
"As volume in most consumer goods increases, prices

will start creeping up from the plateau of recent months.

"This will be particularly true of appliances, because sales gains will be quite significant here.

"In addition, should steel prices have to be raised because of wage boosts, prices on appliances will rise even a little more noticeably than on such items as furniture, apparel, and services.

"Food prices will drift higher, but won't reach the record levels of 1958."

All this would seem to indicate further gains in stocks. This may or not be the case. It all depends on how much of the industrial rise has been discounted by the market in advance. It only discounts a thing once.

**Six Drivers Get Licenses Suspended**

Salem—The department of motor vehicles has released names of 328 drivers whose licenses were ordered suspended during the period beginning June 1, and ending June 5.

Length of suspension varies, depending on charges involved, recommendation of court, discretionary action by the department or requirements of Oregon law. The department said some of the licenses involving financial responsibility and court recommendations may have been reinstated after suspension was ordered.

The department warned drivers that the penalty for driving while suspended is a jail sentence of no less than two days and up to six months, and there may be imposed a fine up to \$500. Under licensing procedures, this will also result in an additional year of suspension.

Atlantic Highlands, N.J.—Corwin Knapp Linson, 95, artist and writer, died at a nursing home here on Wednesday.

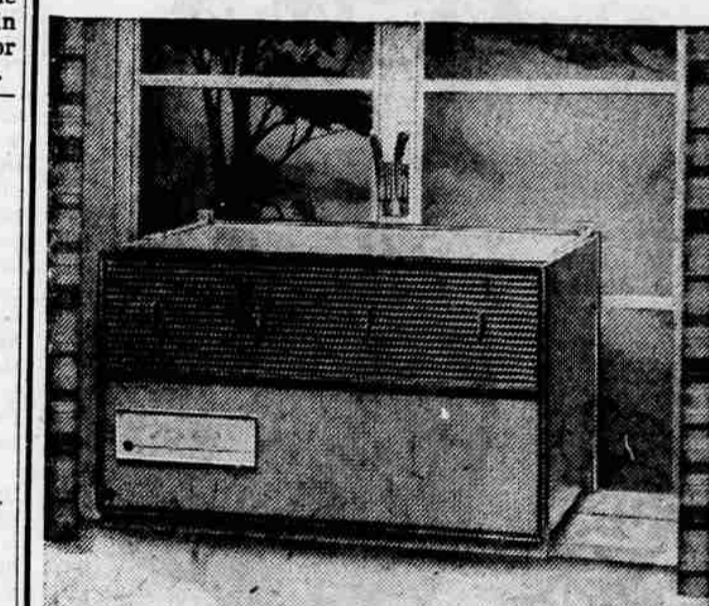
