

Jayhawks Power Way To First NCAA Title

Kansas Nets 73 Points For Lead

Lincoln, Neb. (UPI)—The Jayhawks of Kansas powered their way to their first national collegiate athletic association team championship Saturday, winning a meet marked by broken records and a broken heart.

Kansas had a total of 73 points, followed by San Jose State with 48 1/2, Houston 38, Oklahoma 31, Oklahoma State 22 1/2 and Eastern Michigan and Boston, 20 each.

Compilation of the totals was delayed when a fire truck had to be called so its emergency lights would show the spectators their bar in the last event to finish. Nebraska Memorial stadium has no flood lights of its own.

But the Jayhawks had such good luck that no other team could catch them.

Sprinter Charlie Tidwell, broad jumper Ernie Shelby and javelin artist Bill Alley led Kansas to the triumph in a meet that took on particular significance with formation of the 1960 team less than a year away.

Equals World Mark
Tidwell won the 100-yard dash in a time of :09.3, equal to the world's record but not counted as an official mark because of an excessive tailwind. He also took second in the 220 low hurdles.

Alley won the javelin. Shelby took the broad jump and earned a fifth in the hop, step and jump, as Kansas won places in a total of nine events.

The evening's only double winner was Hayes Jones of Eastern Michigan, with twin victories in the 120 high and 440 low hurdles. Jones made the 120's in :22.5, which also would have been a record but for the wind. His time in the 440's of :13.6 was recognized as tying the NCAA record.

The only other recognized record was by John Lawrence of Boston university in the hammer throw.

Shot put No. 1 came in the 100 yard dash finals when Gerald Ray Norton of San Diego State was disqualified because of three false starts. Norton came back, though, to win the 200 yard dash.

Florists, Maids Vie At Memorial Field

Camp White - Two of the top softball attractions at Veterans Administration domiciliary Memorial stadium this summer are billed for tonight and Monday night when the Erv Lind Florists of Portland meet the home field Rogue Valley Dairy Maids.

The Northwest Women's Major league conflicts are set for 8 p.m. Lind's teams comes here as the defending Northwest regional champion while the Maids were 1958 state tourney titlists.

Up to last night Florists had a 7-0 record to head the league standings while the Rogue Valley club stood fourth in the circuit with a 4-6 mark. Lind victories include scores of 3 to 0 and 1 to 0 over the Dairy Maids last week and the home nine will try to even the score for the setbacks.

Three No-Hitters
Florist pitcher for tonight will be picked from among Louise Mazzuca, Jackie Rice and Pearl Pinlon.

Miss Mazzuca, 19-year-old University of Portland student, has pitched three no-hitters and has given up no hits in 22 innings in the league this year. A chucker for Forest Grove last season, she compiled a 14-2 win-loss record and became recognized as one of the top pitchers in the nation last year. She established world tournament record in 1958 when she struck out 26 batters in 16 innings against the defending champion Fresno, Calif., Rockets.

Miss Rice, a Florist since 1957, has gained victories with an excellent assortment of pitches and has been three times a regional all-star.

Excellent Control
A veteran pitcher with the club is inlon, six years a major softball and also ranked as one of the top hurlers in the country. She has excellent control and clever delivery and also has gained regional recognition.

Catchers for the Lind nine are Bev Wadsworth and Montie Wallis. Wadsworth has been named All-American and is a top hitter for the team as well as fine director of plays. A hustler behind the plate, Wallis is in her second season with the Portland nine. She has been named all-star in both Washington and Oregon.

Possible Lind infielders are Carolyn Spady, first base; Carolyn Fitzwater, second base; Margaret Dobson, third base; and Roma Menold, shortstop, and outfielders may be picked from among Delores Price, Hap Piper and Liz Locke and Dot Dobbie.

300 Antlerless Deer Tags for Hart Mountain

Portland - Some 300 Oregon hunters will have an opportunity to hunt deer in the fabulous Hart mountain country this fall. A quota of 300 antlerless deer tags has been set for the area to be issued by the game commission on a drawing basis.

Archery hunters, who normally have a regular season on the refuge, may file application for the tags along with those who prefer to hunt with rifle. The antlerless tag gives the hunter an opportunity to take two deer during the hunting season, one antlerless animal and another on his regular deer tag.

The archery season on Hart mountain will extend from Sept. 12 through 20. Archers successful in drawing an antlerless tag may take two deer during the season, one on the antlerless tag and one of either sex on the regular deer tag.

On Sept. 26 and 27 the area will be open to rifle hunters successful in drawing antlerless deer permits for the area. No buck hunting with rifles will be allowed on the refuge this fall. However, rifle hunters may take an additional deer during the regular season on their general deer tag.

A fee of \$5 is charged for the antlerless tags, which must be submitted with the applications.

Sword Dancer Blazes To Win After Two-Horse Track Spill

New York - (UPI) - Brookmeade stable's Sword Dancer blazed to a brilliant victory in the \$145,000 Belmont Stakes today. After a two-horse still claimed the life of Eddie Arcaro to the hospital.

Sword Dancer streaked across the finish line three-quarters of a length ahead of Howard B. Keck's Bagdad in the third of the triple crown classics. As he did, half the crowd of 38,105 was looking back toward the final turn where Arcaro lay motionless on the track and Walter Blum, the other rider in the spill, sat dazed.

Examination later at Physicians hospital disclosed Arcaro suffered a concussion and severe sprain of the neck and shoulder muscles. But wet x-ray pictures indicated no fractures.

Arcaro was riding King Ranch's Black Hills and had the colt in third place when suddenly they went down. Motion pictures of the race showed no other horse was close to him at the time. Arcaro shot over Black Hills' head and hit the ground heavily.

Then Lake Erie crashed into the prostrate Black Hills and fell. Lake Erie rolled over Arcaro as Blum sprawled into the mud.

Arcaro complained of pains at the back of his neck and across his shoulders. Blum apparently only was shaken up and recovered quickly.

Black Hills, winner of the Peter Pan Handicap a week ago, broke his right shin bone and had to be destroyed. Lake Erie, owned by Henry O. H. Frelinghuysen, was not injured.

Mrs. Halina Braunstein's Royal Orbit, winner of the Preakness, was third in the mile and one-half classic, but he was a badly beaten third. The big colt was 12 lengths behind Bagdad at the finish.

SILVER SPOON RACES TO CLEAR VICTORY
Inglewood, Calif. - (UPI) - C. V. Whitney's great filly, Silver Spoon, raced to a clear-cut victory Saturday by open lengths of ground in the \$52,700 Cinema Handicap at Hollywood park as Tony Lee finished out of the money.

Avenge her defeat in the Kentucky Derby by Tony Lee, Silver Spoon caught the pace-setting Friar Roach in the stretch and pulled away from him to win under a fine ride by jockey Bill Boland. Civic Pride was third and Prince Cohen fourth as Tony Lee finished sixth in the eight-horse field.

A big Saturday crowd of 51,000 racing fans installed Tony Lee the 4-5 favorite but did not overlook Silver Spoon as they made her the second choice at 2-1 despite the speedy field in the mile and an eighth race for sophomores.

Silver Spoon was timed in 1:47-3/5, breaking the record for the stakes set two years by Round Table of 1:47-4/5. And her time was just four-fifths of a second off the track record.

Silver Spoon returned \$6.40, \$4.20 and \$4.00 across the board. Friar Roach paid \$12.40 and \$7.70 for place and Civic Pride paid \$13.00 for show.

Competition will be staged in almost 30 classes and speeds in excess of 125 miles per hour are anticipated today when the drag racing season opens at the Camp White strip.

Permit Holders Only May Hunt In Two Areas

Portland - Oregon deer hunters are advised by the game commission that deer hunting will be restricted to permit holders only in two areas of the state during the entire season scheduled from Oct. 3 through 25. These areas include the Silver Lake management unit and the Wendling Basin within the McKenzie management unit.

In these two areas hunters may take one deer of either sex during the entire season, but the areas are restricted to permit holders only. In addition to the general deer tag, hunters must have in their possession an antlerless deer permit for the respective unit.

At Silver Lake, 4,000 permits will be issued on a drawing basis. Hunters entering the unit must have one of these permits along with the general season deer tag. No other rifle hunting will be allowed during the entire season. Hunters who intend to hunt for buck deer only and do not have a permit for the Silver Lake management unit will have to do their buck hunting in some other section of the state. All hunters will be required to check in and out of the Silver Lake unit.

The same holds true in the Wendling Basin in the McKenzie management unit. All hunters entering the basin must have a McKenzie unit permit along with the general season deer tag. No general season buck hunting will be allowed unless the hunter has a McKenzie permit. Although 12,000 permits are to be issued for the McKenzie unit, only 800 permit holders will be allowed in the basin at one time.

All other management units will operate the same as last year. Except for the Silver Lake and Wendling Basin areas, buck hunters may go anywhere in the state to hunt buck deer throughout the entire season. Antlerless deer must be taken on permit only and within the unit and during the time for which the permit was issued.

Hoak Single Gives Win To Pirates

Pittsburgh (UPI)—Don Hoak singled with the bases loaded in the 8th inning Saturday off reliever Art Fowler to score a pair of runs that gave the Pittsburgh Pirates a 5-3 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Fowler had allowed only one hit in two previous innings after replacing starter Stanley Koufax in the 6th inning, but the late-rally Pirates worked him over good in the 8th.

With one out, Dick Stuart singled and Dick Schofield ran for him. Bob Skinner also singled and took second on the throw to third from the outfield.

Fowler walked Bill Mazerowski intentionally to fill them up and Hoak rifled a clean single past shortstop to left to chase home the winning run.

The Pirates might have won by an even wider margin if it were not for two spectacular fielding plays by Dodger second baseman Charlie Neal, who robbed Dick Groat of two base hits and on each occasion turned them into a double play. In the third inning, Neal dived far to his left to spear Groat's low liner and easily doubled Billy Virdon off first. Four innings later, Neal streaked far to his right just a step from the bag to scoop up Groat's sharp liner, tag second forcing a base runner, and then firing to first to retire the batter.

Ronnie Kline picked up the victory, his 6th against 3 losses. He scattered 11 Dodger hits to become the first Pirate hurler to travel the distance in nearly a week.

Pittsburgh broke a scoreless tie with two runs in the fourth when Mazerowski chased one home with a sacrifice fly and Hoak delivered a run-scoring double. The other Pirate runs came in the fifth inning when Stuart grounded out allowing Virdon to score from third.

Los Angeles scored its first run in the fifth inning despite a beautiful fielding play by second baseman Mazerowski. With Junior Gilliam on second and Neal on first, Duke Snider grounded sharply between first and second. But Mazerowski threw himself at the ball, gloved it and threw to the plate from a prone position in an attempt to get the speeding Gilliam.

The throw bounced twice before it skidded off catcher Smokey Burgess' glove as Gilliam slid in safely. No error was charged.

The Dodgers scored their final two runs in the sixth inning around a base on balls.

Pisono, who was hitting .185 for Richmond in the International league, was brought up to provide defensive insurance against the loss of Bauer, who suffered a pulled hamstring muscle in his left leg on Wednesday and will be sidelined about two weeks.

Glandular Fever Sidelines Carey

New York (UPI)—The New York Yankees placed third baseman Andy Carey on the disabled list Saturday only a few hours after bringing up outfielder Jim Pisoni to replace ailing Hank Bauer.

Carey was found to be suffering from glandular fever and has been hospitalized at Lenox Hill Hospital. Dr. Snyder Gaynor, club physician, said glandular fever "is not serious... but confining... and requires complete rest for an undetermined period."

Carey had only a .171 batting average this year and lost his job to Hector Lopez when the latter was acquired from Kansas City.

Olmedo defeated Kurt Nielsen, Danish Davis Cup player and two-time Wimbledon finalist, 6-3, 3-6, 6-4. Olmedo, a Peruvian studying at the University of Southern California, is favored for the men's title in this year's Wimbledon championships starting June 22.

Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., won the women's crown by defeating Sally Moore of Bakersfield, Calif., 6-1, 7-5. Miss Hard, defeated Tony in the 1957 Wimbledon final, and Miss Moore will be two of America's top entries in the Wimbledon women's play this year.

Miss Hard and Jeanne Arth of St. Paul, Minn., won the women's doubles title by defeating Janet Hoops of Seattle, Wash., and Pat Ward of Britain, 6-3, 6-4. Bob Mark and Rod Laver of Australia captured the men's doubles crown by rallying to defeat New Zealand's Lew Gerrard and Mark Otway, 6-8, 6-3, 6-1.
