

Stubblefield Nabs Three Contests

Ashtand - Jerry Stubblefield was a triple winner and Doyle Bransom, Leonard Griggs and Pat Pepper were double victors in their respective divisions Friday evening in the first "all-comers" track and field meet at Southern Oregon college here.

Stubblefield, Ashtand and the University of Oregon, won the open division 100-yard dash in .09.9, the javelin with 135 feet and the shot put with 38 feet 1 inch.

In the high school class Griggs, Medford, took the 100 in .10.2 and the 220-yard sprint in .23. Bransom, Jacksonville, nabbed the javelin with 149 feet and the broad jump with 19-7. Pepper, Central Point, took the junior high javelin with 137 feet and the shot put with 44-4.

There were 27 participants in the meet jointly sponsored by the college, the Ashtand YMCA and the Ashtand city recreation department.

Other open winners were Stuart Baker, Ashtand and SOC, the 220 in .23.5 and Charles Swingle, Phoenix and SOC, the half-mile in 2:11.

Mike Hood, Medford, took the high school high jump at 5-10 and Ron Baker, Phoenix, the shot put with 42-5. Skip Bennett, Medford, won the pole vault at 9-6. Ray Smith, Medford, the half-mile in 2:12. Robert Hamilton, Medford, the 120-yard low hurdles in .14.7 and Joe Boorman, Ashtand, the high hurdles in .22.

In the junior rivalry, David Colwell, Ashtand copped the pole vault at 9-6. Gary Wald, Central Point, the 75-yard dash in .08.2. Jim Wald the 150 in .16.2. Dennis Bolz, Phoenix, the 120 low hurdles in .21 and Gary Bransom, Jacksonville, the high jump at 4-6.

Next meet here will be held Friday, June 26, with field events to start at 7:15 p.m. and the first running event at 7:45 p.m.

old Swede endowed with both a winning personality and an impressively paralyzing right hand, is writing a new chapter of promise in this international ring saga.

Johansson's challenge of champion Floyd Patterson for the title on June 25 has captured the fancy of the customers that promoter Bill Rosensohn is doing a brisk business in \$100 Yankee Stadium ringside seats.

(Local fight fans will be able to see the heavyweight title bout larger than life for a fraction of the ring-side cost via TelePrompTer corporation's closed-circuit television network at the Craterian theatre.)

The brawny Swede, undefeated in 21 pro fights with 13 knockouts, is seeking to join a highly select group of non-American heavyweight champions. Although the Stars and Stripes has had no monopoly in the lighter weights, particularly in recent years, only four heavyweights born outside the U. S. have been titleholders since the "modern" era was ushered in by John L. Sullivan in 1882.

Foreigners By Birth Those four were Bob Fitzsimmons, who came to the United States from Australia and was born in Cornwall, England; Tommy Burns, a native of Canada; Max Schmeling of Germany and Carnera.

Even Fitzsimmons and Burns were "foreigners" largely through the technicality of birth. Ruby Robert had campaigned in the U. S. for seven years before defeating Jim Corbett for the title in 1897 with the famed "solar plexus" punch. And Burns did virtually all of his fighting in this country on the way to winning the championship from Marvin Hart in 1906.

Schmeling was one of the ablest of the imported heavyweights. He won the title on a foul in a bout with Jack Sharkey in 1930 after Gene Tunney's retirement but lost it to Sharkey by decision two years later.

Louis Revenge There followed Max's two memorable fights with Joe Louis. In June, 1936, the scowling German kayoed Louis in the 12th round of a non-title bout at Yankee Stadium, the only loss Joe was to suffer on his way to the championship.

Two years and three days later, 70,000 fans contributed to one of the eight gates in history to top a million dollars to see the second meeting, this time for the title, in the same ball park.

This time, Joe felled Schmeling three times in the first round to win in only two minutes and four seconds.

In between Schmeling's two losing title bouts with Sharkey and Louis, the giant 6-foot, 6-in 254-pound Carnera flashed briefly across the fistic skies like a ponderous oversized sputnik. He dethroned Sharkey in 1933 but was knocked out in 11 rounds by Baer the following year.

Foreigners Contribute That was the last time a foreigner held the title, but it doesn't begin to tell the story of the contribution of other fighters from abroad.

One of the most colorful occasions, certain to pop readily into mind wherever such things are discussed, is the Jack Dempsey - Georges Carpentier bout in 1921, when the "million dollar gate" became a reality under the astute promotion of fabulous Rex Rickard.

Carpentier, slender French "Orchid Man," was a bona fide middleweight, Dempsey one of the most ferocious heavies of all time. But Rickard, making the most of Carpentier's World War I heroism, his international glamor and the wacky spirit of the post-war '20s, packed 80,183 spectators into flimsy temporary wooden stands in Jersey City.

Firpo Fierce Foe Another high spot of Dempsey's career was his fierce bout with Luis Angel Firpo, the "Bull of the Pampas" from Argentina. Louis had two of his most difficult fights against Tommy Farr, the valiant Welshman, and Arturo Godoy, agile Argentinean.

In more recent years, the output of foreign challengers has slowed down to a trickle. Rocky Marciano had little difficulty with Don Cockell, and Patterson used Brian London to advantage in his 11-round tuneup for Johansson on May 1.

But neither of those two Brits carried the record, the fighting equipment or personal magnetism of Johansson. The burly Swede has turned the calendar back to the exciting days of Carpentier, Firpo and Schmeling.

Ortiz Cops Junior Toga

New York - (UPI) - Carlos Ortiz, brand new junior welterweight champion, yelled today for a shot at the lightweight crown after he finished July maneuvers with the National Guard.

Swarthy, well-built Ortiz of New York and Puerto Rico won the revived junior welterweight title Friday night on a second round technical knockout over southpaw Kenny Lane at Madison Square Garden.

A right smash between the eyes cut such a deep, bloody gash at the inside corner of Lane's right brow that the scheduled 12-round bout was stopped between the second and third rounds. That's a second-round TKO under the rules of the New York State Athletic commission.

The one-and-one-quarter-inch gash required 10 stitches. Ortiz, 22, had felled sandy-haired Kenny for a count of four with a right to the chin earlier in the second session of this first title fight for the synthetic 140-pound crown in nearly 13 years.

The victory not only gave Carlos the resurrected title but it avenged a Dec. 31 defeat by Lane at Miami Beach and it made Ortiz top contender for Joe Brown's lightweight 135-pound championship.

He also had a triple, double and single, and failed to connect only in his final trip to the plate.

Harvard Crew Tops Yale Men

New London (UPI) - Harvard university's crew Saturday night finished its first unbeaten season since 1942 when it defeated Yale university during a driving rainstorm on the Thames river.

Held up a half-hour by a thunderstorm, the varsity race didn't start until after 8 p.m. EDT, but when it did Harvard jumped into a quick lead and maintained it through the entire race.

At the one-mile mark it was Harvard by a length. At the two-mile post it was a length-and-a-quarter and after three miles the crimson sweepers had increased it to two lengths.

At the finish, which came in almost total darkness, the crimson crew reached the Gold Star Memorial bridge 2 1/2 lengths ahead of Yale. It was the first victory for Harvard over Yale in six years.

The best race of the night was the freshman race. Yale, coming from a length behind during the last quarter-mile, caught the crimson and swept across the finish line in 10 minutes, 44-2/5 seconds for the two miles which was only 1 1/2 seconds ahead of the Harvard crew.

The junior varsity race was much the same as the varsity competition. Harvard went out front early in the three-mile grind and was never threatened throughout. It finished the race in 15 minutes, 50 seconds.
