

Montague Rodeo Scheduled June 21

Montague, Calif.—The eighth annual Montague Junior Rodeo and associated events will be held here on Saturday and Sunday, June 20 and 21.

Coronation of the queen will be at midnight Saturday, following a dance, with music by the Tiptoppers.

Rodeo events proper will get under way at 11:45 a.m. Sunday with a parade. Everyone in the area has been invited to participate in the march, particularly those entering floats, and riding groups. A number of 4-H clubs have already said they will participate, and it is hoped that all in the county will join, a rodeo spokesman said.

A barbecue lunch will be served at the rodeo grounds at noon, and events will start at 1 p.m., continuing through the afternoon. There will be 11 events in all, for participants aged 8 through 18.

Awards will include ribbons, belt buckles, hackamores and other prizes, in addition to \$125 in prize money, to which will be added entry fees.

Entry blanks are available at Siskiyou Sporting Goods and Hanley's, in Yreka, and the Montague Variety store. Queen candidates also have supplies of entry blanks.

Talent Project 70 Per Cent Complete

Ashland—Jack Nichols, administrative officer of the bureau of reclamation at Camp White, told the Ashland Rotary club last week that the Talent project, valued at \$23,700,000, is 70 per cent complete.

The power and reclamation project will be completed by early summer, 1962, he said.

The last major item in the project is construction of the new Emigrant lake dam which will increase the capacity from 8,400 to 40,000 acre feet. Work of relocating the highway around the new lake is nearing completing, and work is expected to start on the dam project soon.

Discuss Phases
Walter Hoffbuhr, manager of the Talent Irrigation district, Ross Youngblood, district manager for the bureau of land management, and County Commissioner Chester Wendt discussed various phases of the project.

Nichols pointed out that the project was authorized by congress in 1954, and the first appropriation for construction was made in 1956 when \$2 million was authorized for work.

The multi-purpose project will provide 16,000 kilowatts of power from a plant on the

Greensprings, flood control, irrigation and recreation.

Part of the recreational development will be construction of boat docks, parking areas, and water and sewage facilities for public use at Howard Prairie, largest of the reservoirs in the system.

Home Site Plans
Wendt pointed out that there are no plans now for home sites at Howard Prairie, and Youngblood said availability of water for homes may delay action on determining whether there will be home sites.

Howard Prairie reservoir will be drawn down about 12

feet toward the latter part of the summer, Hoffbuhr said, and Emigrant lake will lose as much as 100 feet during irrigation season. Minimum level in Emigrant lake will be 10,000 acre feet.

Because of fluctuations in the water level at Emigrant lake, recreation facilities there may be lost to a certain extent. Wendt said that the county will have jurisdiction over recreation sites at the lakes.
