Miss Spader also suggests cutting it into strips or cubes, then coating with seasoned flour and sauteing in butter or bacon fat over a medium gas flame. Beef, pork, chicken, lamb or calves liver can be prepared in this manner.

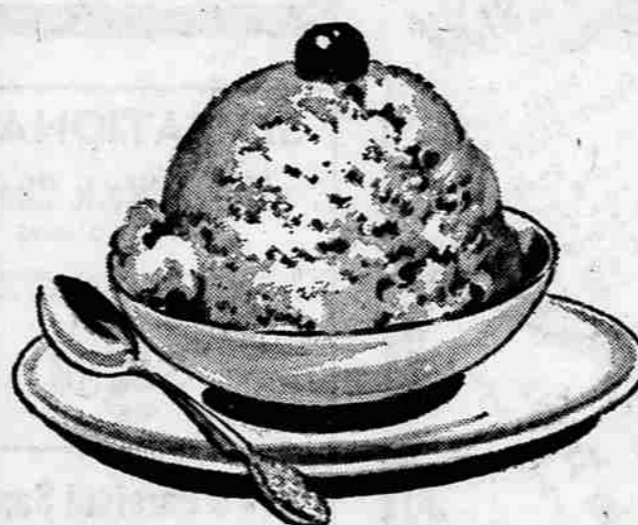
