Patterson Bludgeons Sparmates

Chatham, N. J.—Floyd Patterson is throwing bombs all over the ring here to make certain he won't be trapped by Ingemar Johansson's reported secret workouts.

Champion Patterson, whose six knockdowns in three rounds Sunday probably set an all-time training camp record, declared today, "I won't be fooled by the Swede's Palooka showings in public."

No one should know more about secret workouts than young Patterson and his cloak-and-dagger manager, Gus D'Amato, who admittedly staged sparring sessions before fights with Archie Moore and Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson.

Johansson, training at Grossinger, N. Y., hasn't scored a single legitimate knockdown in his 144 rounds of sparring in preparation for next week's heavyweight title fight. He has looked like a "nothing" fighter.

Has Spy
Yet, the unbeaten Swede-champion of Europe—is reputedly the most deadly right-hand puncher in the heavy division. He knocked out top contender Eddie Machen of Redding, Calif., in the first round last September. Machen was on the deck three times.

Pilot D'Amato said today, "I have a spy at Johansson's camp—and I don't mean Harry Davidson, Johansson's rejected American manager. My spy tells me trainer Whitey Bimstein has been hiring top-flight sparring partners in New York for Johansson; but those guys never show up at Grossingers."

And he tells me Johansson is absent from his house regularly in the forenoons. Just where the Swede boxes with those secret sparmates, we haven't been able to find out for sure. But we believe it's up at the empty airplane hangar where Rocky Marciano used to train. That's a couple miles from Johansson's headquarters."

Adenauer Declares Over-All Situation At Geneva Is Bad

Adenauer seemed completely relaxed. He received me in his large office in a former royal palace overlooking the Rhine. His health seemed good. Despite the chill of early evening, all windows were wide open.

His handshake and his voice were firm. His relatively unlined face showed neither his 83 years nor the political storm raging about his head over his decision to remain as chancellor.

Although his staff had prepared suggested answers to six basic questions which had been submitted in advance, Adenauer disregarded the aide memoire and answered readily and extemporaneously.

Adenauer said of the Big Four Foreign Ministers' conference at Geneva that "the over-all situation is bad."

Expanding on his suggestion for a four-week recess, he said: "I would not suggest the conference be broken off. That would give the Soviets a wonderful opportunity to start a propaganda offensive. The West must do all in its power to prevent the Soviet ultimatum on Berlin from becoming effective."

While he doubted that the Communists would start a nuclear war over Berlin, Adenauer said that the crisis is nevertheless "by all means a test of Western solidarity."

Adenauer expressed the belief that the minimum requirement for a big-power summit conference must be that "a treaty basis for Berlin is assured. Certain modifications — I think here of the agent theory — might be possible without in any way affecting the imperative contractual basis.

Attitude Approved
"Without basing western rights in Berlin on a firm contract, a summit meeting could serve no purpose," he continued. He said he knew the United States held the same view, and approved of this attitude.

The chancellor recalled that in the Big Four agreement at Paris in July, 1949, ending the Berlin blockade, free access to Berlin was specifically guaranteed.

"The United States and Great Britain at that time set up guard posts along the access routes and sent regular military patrols to insure that the agreement was actually effective," he said.

"For some reason — I don't know why — these measures were later dropped. Had they been continued, this business today would never have happened."

Adenauer said no atom-free zone "smaller than from the Atlantic to the Urals" made sense in the light of technological developments in atomic missiles. The atom-free zones proposed by

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98 Men Abandon Burning Cable Ship

London — (UPI) — Ninety-eight men, including nine U.S. telephone engineers, abandoned the burning cable ship Ocean Layer about 500 miles off the French coast early today and were taken safely aboard a German freighter.

The 4,534-ton British vessel was laying the west to east section of the first telephone cable between North America and the European mainland.

Fire broke out early Sunday and Capt. A. McPherson Ross ordered all hands into lifeboats. Ross radioed three hours later that all were safely aboard the German freighter Flavia, en route to Hamburg.
