Nixon Honor Guest At Birthday Party Held at Birthplace

Los Angeles—UPI—Vice President Richard M. Nixon, a California native, returns today to nearby Yerba Linda, his birthplace, for a delayed birthday celebration.

The house where Nixon was born 46 years ago last Jan. 9 was purchased by contributions in the town of 3,000 persons some 35 miles southeast of Los Angeles. It is on the rear of the Yerba Linda Elementary School and marked by a plaque.

The vice president's belated visit was to include a reception at the school for him, his mother, Hannah, his wife, Pat, and their two daughters. The Nixons moved to nearby Whittier when Nixon was a child, and he grew up there.

The Yerba Linda visit was made as Nixon neared the end of a five-day, non-political visit to the west. He was to leave afterward for San Diego, where he will be given the first honorary degree awarded by the University of San Diego. He will leave for Washington tonight.

The Nixon family Sunday toured Disneyland in nearby Anaheim. The vice president led a parade topped by 76 trombone players playing "seventy-six trombones" and later had a hand in dedicating \$8 million in new amusements at the huge fun center.

Persons traveling to Europe are required by those countries to have smallpox vaccination in addition to the recommended inoculations.

Typus shots are recommended for persons who plan to visit any of the Communist countries.

Asia-bound travelers are advised to receive the general inoculations recommended plus smallpox, typhus, cholera and yellow fever protection.

Visitors to Africa need protection from smallpox, typhus and yellow fever also, the USPHS advises.

For those who will travel the Americas, from Alaska to the southernmost tip of Chile—smallpox and yellow fever vaccinations are a must for the majority of these countries.

Ashland—Two additional courses have been added to the summer school schedule at Southern Oregon college, college officials reported today.

Senator Defends Strauss Nomination

Washington—UPI—Sen. Prescott Bush (R-Conn.) said today the Senate would bring "disgrace upon itself" if it permitted "deliberate persecution and defamation" to thwart the nomination of Lewis L. Strauss as commerce secretary.

"Irreparable damage to the reputation of the Senate as an institution will result if his nomination is not confirmed by a substantial majority," Bush said in a speech prepared for Senate delivery.

Floor debate on the Strauss nomination entered its second week. Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.) was reported hoping to obtain unanimous Senate agreement for a limitation on debate so a final vote could be reached later this week.

Democratic strategists said their GOP counterparts were not enthusiastic about a debate limitation.

For those who will travel the Americas, from Alaska to the southernmost tip of Chile—smallpox and yellow fever vaccinations are a must for the majority of these countries.

All immunizations, with the exception of the yellow fever vaccination, may be obtained from a private physician.

Most of the vaccinations can be obtained either free or for a fee from state or local health departments, where yellow fever shots are obtained. The USPHS publishes a list of these departments, one of which is near you.
