

Detroit Tigers Continue With Drive To First Place

Who's gonna hold that Tiger if even Hoyt Wilhelm can't?

Seven American league rivals wish they could answer the question as Jimmy Dykes' Detroit Tigers continue their drive toward first place. They're only a game and a half from their goal now and

they've been rolling at a 7.14 clip since losing 15 of their first 17 games.

The Tigers ended Wilhelm's nine-game winning streak and knocked him out of the box for good measure Monday night with a 6-4 victory over the Baltimore Orioles. The coup de grace was a two-run homer by Harvey Kuenn

that marked the first round-tripper off the knuckleball ace in 97 innings.

Hoyt Tagged in 6th, 7th

Wilhelm, who seemed to be throwing the next best thing to an invisible pitch in compiling a 9-0 record and a 1.00 earned run average, shut out the Tigers for five innings but then they tagged him for three runs in the sixth and finished him with Kuenn's homer in the seventh. It marked only the third time in 11 starts that he failed to finish.

The Cleveland Indians ran their winning streak to six games and went into first place with a 5-1 win over the Boston Red Sox and the Washington Senators ended a five-game losing streak with an 8-5 decision over the Kansas City Athletics in other American league games. The Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Milwaukee Braves, 4-0, in the only National League game.

Detroit's Ray Narleski went 7 2/3 innings before giving way to Dave Sisler to gain credit for his fourth victory of the year.

Bell Throws 3-Hitter

Gary Bell pitched a three-hitter and struck out nine batters to win his sixth game for the Indians. The Indians made only eight hits themselves but three were homers — by Minnie Minoso, Mike Baxes and Woody Held. Bill Monquette was the loser.

Harmon Killebrew clouted his 22nd homer and Jim Lemon hit his 17th to lead a 10-hit Washington attack that routed Bud Daley in three innings. John Romonosky shut out the Athletics for eight innings but then was kayoed when the A's scored five runs in the ninth.

Don Drysdale struck out 12 Braves to raise his season total to 103 and win his sixth game. Bob Buhl shut out the Dodgers for six innings but Los Angeles scored four runs in the seventh on a walk, an error, a double by Jim Gilliam and Wally Moon's three-run homer. It was the eighth loss in 12 games for the Braves and Hank Aaron went hitless in four trips.

Phil Sell Hegan

The Philadelphia Phillies sold 38-year-old catcher Jim Hegan to the San Francisco Giants and recalled pitcher Dick Farrell from Buffalo of the International league. Farrell, a relief ace last season who went sour late in the year, was recalled because of several injuries on the Phils' pitching staff.

Los Angeles recalled outfielder Frank Howard from Victoria of the Texas League, where he was hitting .370 with 27 homers.

The Pittsburgh Pirates bought veteran righthander Bob Porterfield from the Chicago Cubs and sold pitcher R. G. Smith to the Detroit Tigers.

And the Phillies dug down deep — a reported \$40,000 worth — for another "bonus baby." He's Larry Daniels, a 19-year-old recent high school graduate from Birmingham, Ala., who is rated a good hitting prospect. He is the fifth bonus player signed by the Phils within the past two weeks for a total estimated outlay of \$290,000.

Daniels is slated for the Phils' Johnson City, Tenn., farm club.

Orioles Trade Harshman To Red Sox; Get Hoelt

The Baltimore Orioles traded southpaw pitcher Jack Harshman to the Boston Red Sox for another lefthander, Billy Hoelt, Monday, as big-league teams broke into a flurry of player-swapping that beats the trading deadline that goes into effect at midnight.

And the emphasis was on pitching talent with the clubs

heading into summer days that will put hurling staffs to the test.

The Orioles and Red Sox had high hopes that the two lefties they swapped at last live up to their promise. A year ago at this time Harshman ranked as the ace of the Baltimore staff with a record of 5-0 and the converted first baseman appeared to be at the peak of his career.

Harshman Slips Badly

But he slipped badly after that and wound up at 12-17 for the season. This year he has an 0-6 record, has failed to finish any of his eight starts and has a 7.42 earned run average. Hoelt, whom Boston obtained from Detroit earlier this year, has a 1-4 mark and a 6.23 era.

In other action on the player mart over the week end, the Red Sox and Washington Senators called off their trade in which the Senators gave Boston relief pitcher Dick Hyde in exchange for Murray Wall. Hyde complained of a sore arm when he reported to Boston and the two clubs agreed to cancel the swap. Left intact, however, was the part of the deal in which Washington gave infielder Herb Plews to Boston for infielder Billy Conso.

The St. Louis Cardinals purchased third baseman Dick Gray from Los Angeles.

Webfoots Tuning for AAU Meet

University of Oregon, Eugene — (Special) — Four Oregon track stars moved to Boulder, Colo., Monday and set up training headquarters with Coach Bill Bowerman on the University of Colorado campus in preparation for the National AAU championships next weekend.

The Webfoot foursome is head by veteran miler Jim Grelle and includes three-miler Dick Miller, quarter miler Otis Davis and freshman miler Dyrrol Burelson. All but Burelson competed last week end in the NCAA championships at Lincoln, Neb., and decided to spend the week at Boulder to acquaint themselves with the high altitude.

Berths on the United States team which will meet Russia in July and the squad which will enter the Pan-American Games in August will be at stake at the AAU meet. Last year Grelle won a spot.

A fifth Webfoot star, decathlete man Dave Edstrom, will continue his work here preparing for the national championships at Kingsburg, Calif., on June 25-26. He also was on the team which went to Russia last summer.

July 4 Meet

Meanwhile the local track organization, the Emerald Empire athletic association, announced ticket applications for its second annual Fourth of July meet, would be in the mail Monday.

Dr. Ralph Christenson, president of the group which will sponsor the Oregon AA meet, said that three special events are planned this year in addition to the regular schedule and outstanding fields in each are expected.

Burelson and Sig Ohlemann, the Duck freshman ace from Canada, will be in the 880, Grelle and George Larson in the mile, and Ex-Duck stars Bill Dellinger and Pete Mundle will face Dick Miller in the two mile.

Invitations have also been sent to Ernie Cunniffe of Stanford and Don Bowden of California in the 880, defending champion Alex Henderson of Arizona State, Oklahoma's Gale Hodgson and Washington's Jack Larson in the mile and Laszlo Tabori in the two mile. All are expected to be on hand unless they are chosen on one of the teams which will tour Europe immediately following the AAU meet this weekend.

Lind Florists Beat RV Maids; Mazzuca Hurling String Ends

Memorial Stadium, Camp White — Erv Lind's high-powered, alert and sure-fielding Florists of Portland, spurred by the deceptive twirling of Louise Mazzuca, bounced the Rogue Valley Dairy Maids 9 to 0 here last night for their 10th win against no setbacks this season in the Northwest Women's Major Softball league.

But the home diamond Dairy Maids, who got off to an erratic start in suffering their fourth loss to the Portlanders, had one big consolation. When Ellen Callaghan laid down a bunt in the second inning and beat it out for a single, she ended a long string of hitless innings chalk-

ed up from the pitching slab by Miss Mazzuca.

The Florist flinger had gone 40 innings this year, before the bunt, without giving up a hit. Twenty-eight of these no-hit, no run innings have been in Northwest league play.

Handcuffed, virtually handcuffed the Dairy Maids, otherwise. The one safe blow was the only one she yielded. She struck out 16 batters and walked four. Dairy Maids got on base on just five occasions.

On offense the Florists put six of their eight hits with four bases on balls and a flock of errors to record their runs. Four of the tallies were in the first inning when the Portlanders got just one hit, by Hap Piper, and two walks to go along with the miscues. Piper was credited with two runs batted in.

Mazzuca, herself, contributed to the scoring with a triple, driving home Montie Wallis, who had singled in the fourth inning. The pitcher then came home on an error. A double by Liz Locke, a groundout by Delores Price and a single by Roma Menold gained a marker in the fifth inning. In the sixth another pair crossed home on an error, a pair of wild pitches, two walks, a fielder's option and a hit by Price.

Rogue Valley four times had runners as far as second base.

Piper and Wallis each lashed two hits for the Florists.

Callaghan pitched the first four innings for the Maids, allowing five hits and three bases on balls and fanning one batter. Doris Hickson went the last three on the slab. She gave four hits and four walks.

Nifty sacrifice bunts were put down for the Maids by Janet Pfaff and Diane Wall.

While neither team has completed the first half of league play, the Lind victories of 2 to 0 on Sunday and 9 to 0 last night were in the second half of play. The Florists are 8-0 for their first half and the Maids 4-6. Rogue Valley finishes the front part of its slate with a trip to Vancouver, B.C. for games this Saturday and Sunday. The Portlanders left here for a non-league jaunt into California and Arizona.
