Hong Kong Finds Huge Problem In Caring for Chinese Refugees

Hong Kong (UPI) — The junk
almost noiselessly through the
South China Sea. Below
decks, a pitiful handful of hu-
manity crouched and sweated
out the hours to freedom.

Suddenly, on the almost
black horizon, a British patrol
boat appeared. The junk mas-
ter took no chances. In a mat-
ter of minutes, his human
cargo had been knocked uncon-
scious and dumped into the sea.

This is the tragic, all-too-
frequent ending for poor Chi-
nese attempting to flee the
Communist mainland for the
free port city of Hong Kong.

It is also part of the heart-
rending struggle Hong Kong
faces to provide for its ever
swelling population of refu-
gees.

It will take another five
years to build housing for the
350,000 impoverished refu-
gees still eking out an exis-
tence while living in squalid
squatters' villages or on roof-
tops or the streets.

Population Growing
And that won't be the end,
because the population is
growing annually, and at a

greater rate than present gov-
ernment plans for construct-
ing low-cost housing.

It's not just the flow of re-
fugees that plagues crowded
Hong Kong. It also is the
natural increase, which now
runs better than 80,000 annu-
ally.

The colony's population is
estimated at about three mil-
lion. It probably is more. But
this mass of people is squash-
ed into a colony which has
only 12 square miles of habi-
table land. The balance of
Hong Kong's 369 square miles
is mostly useless or being used
for farming.

Already, the government has
resettled 280,000 persons, an
equal number living in
squatters' huts, plus about 70-
000 living on roof-tops, will be
given housing during the next
five years.

Costs Pretty Penny
The program has cost the
government a pretty penny. Since
1952, resettlement con-
struction has cost 77 million
Hong Kong dollars (about \$13
million) and this year's budg-
et calls for an expenditure of
36 million HK dollars. Added
to this are various social wel-
fare assistance given refugees,
such as medical care, clothing,

etc. Where did all these home-
less come from? The refugees
poured into Hong Kong by the
tens of thousands as the
Communist armies pushed
south in 1949. From 800,000,
Hong Kong's population rose to
more than two million.

At first, the British govern-
ment willingly offered them
asylum. It had been tradition-
al for Chinese in Hong Kong
and in South China to pass
back and forth freely.

But the flood of refugees
had to be stemmed some way.
The flow actually began to
diminish after the first three
years, but there still was a
sufficient number entering
Hong Kong to cause concern.

In 1955, the British closed the
border to general travel, al-
lowed only as many Chinese
to enter as left.

Didn't Last Long
The quota system didn't last
long, but it was re-imposed in
1956 — of necessity.
