# Stocks in Second Good Day of Gains

New York—(UPI)—Stocks scored good gains for the second straight session today in more active trading.

The rally restored around \$1 billion to market values which brought the two-day gain to around \$3 billion.

Rails turned strong on reports of a sharp increase in car loadings to the best level in 19 months. Heavy industries such as steel and aluminum also met support, as did tires and chemicals.

Profit sharing brought the averages down from their best levels of the day but gains far outnumbered losses. It was the first session in a while which saw new highs exceeding new lows.

# Old House Being Razed for Parking

A residence built more than a half-century ago, at 136 North Oakdale ave., is being torn down to make way for a parking lot for Perl Funeral home.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Perl, who have occupied the residence, have moved to the Barnes apartments at 11th and King sts.

Perl, manager of the funeral home, said that he had lived in the house for 30 years. It was bought with the mortuary property at Sixth st. and Oakdale ave. by his father John Perl in 1924.

The two structures reportedly were built about 1903 by Edgar Hefer, a founder of Lova Lumber and Box company which became Big Pine Lumber company. The home which has been occupied by the Perls formerly served as residence for employees of the occupants of the large house, which is now the mortuary.

Perl said that removal of the smaller structure will make parking lot room for 30 to 35 cars. John Gearhart, Shady Cove, is razing the house for the salvage.

# Pioneer Frost Forecaster Dies

News has been received here of the death June 16 in the Los Angeles area of Floyd Young, pioneer in fruit frost forecasting.

Mr. Young came to Medford in 1917 after western fruit growers had obtained a small congressional appropriation for the investigation of frost protection methods and devices.

For the next 10 years he came to the valley each spring and during that time conducted extra research which forms the basis for most of the knowledge on orchard heating today.

His work included determination of critical temperatures for various fruits at various stages of development; and studies of inversion at Medford and elsewhere, both in free air and in heated orchards; efficiency of various types of orchard heaters and of the most practical ways of using them; effect of soot on pollination; fuel oils and other orchard heating fuels; use of tents and other covers for frost protection; temperatures recorded in various types of instrument shelters; and formulas for the prediction of minimum temperatures.

During the time of Mr. Young's fruit forecast service, he saw it grow as horticulture in the west expanded. At the time of his retirement in 1956, all citrus fruit growing districts of Arizona and California had representatives of the Pomona forecast office working through the winter frost season. The representatives were assigned to the most important deciduous fruit districts of California, Washington, Oregon and Idaho in the spring.

Mr. Young visited Medford annually on his spring inspection trips from 1927 until his retirement.

**Senators May Discuss Progress of Libby Dam**  
Washington—(UPI)—Sen. Frank Church (D-Idaho) said today that Northwestern senators and the International Joint Commission may meet in Spokane later this year to discuss progress on the proposed Libby Dam.

After a meeting between the Senators and the IJC Wednesday, Church said it "revealed the constant attention and effort the commission is giving this problem which means there are high hopes for a not too distant agreement to make possible Libby Dam and a solution to the flooding in the Bonners Ferry area."

**Dog Catchers Strike For Increase in Wages**  
Tacoma — (UPI) — Six city dog catchers and kennel-workers went on strike here Wednesday against the Tacoma-Pierce County Humane Society for higher wages.

The workers, recently affiliated with the Teamsters Union, want a \$30 monthly wage boost. The society offered \$25 per month, but the union rejected the offer and the workers left their jobs.

**Ironworkers Serve Notice of Strike**  
Vancouver, B. C. — (UPI)—Ironworkers served official strike notice on the Structural Steel Association of British Columbia Wednesday.

No strike date was set, but they will be able to walk out after noon Friday.

Traveling time and the employers' desire to import labor from Alberta were the main issues in the dispute.

Portland — (UPI) — Members of the Bend Water Pageant Court were Portland visitors today and Friday for a fast round of press, radio and television appearances, including visits to the Centennial Exposition, a Beaver baseball game Friday night, and a tour of the Jantzen Knitting Mills.

The five young high school princesses, their chaperone and Pageantarian escorts were to arrive at the Portland Chamber of Commerce visitors information center at 2 p.m. today to be met by Chamber officials.

They brought with them a six-foot bat to present to General Manager Tommy Heath of the Portland Beavers baseball club Friday evening. The over-sized bat was made in Bend especially for the occasion, of pine lumber stock.

The visitors planned to invite all of Portland to attend the Centennial Water Pageant to be held in Bend July 2-4.

# Liberace Faces Further Action

London — (UPI) — Liberace, vindicated by a British jury in his libel suit against the tabloid Daily Mirror, today faced further legal action before he could collect his \$22,400 in damages.

He was awarded the money Wednesday from the Mirror and its columnist, William "Cassandra" Connor, on the grounds Connor implied in a 1956 article that he was a homosexual.

The Mirror, which spent an estimated \$45,000 fighting the case, filed notice of an appeal. If the appeal is granted, it would mean a new trial.

Payment of damages was being upheld pending the outcome of the appeal action.

# Idaho Local Votes On Pact Renewal

Lewiston, Idaho — (UPI) — Members of Local 10-364 of the International Woodworkers of America have completed voting on a proposed two-year extension of the work contract with Potlatch Forests, Inc.

Union and company negotiating committees approved a wage clause providing an across-the-board increase of 7 1/2 cents an hour this year and 2 3/4 cents next year for employees at operations at Lewiston, Potlatch, Coeur D'Alene, Deer Park, Kooak-Kamah, and Pierce-Headquarters.

The ballots will be sent to Portland to be counted with Northwest regional ballots.
