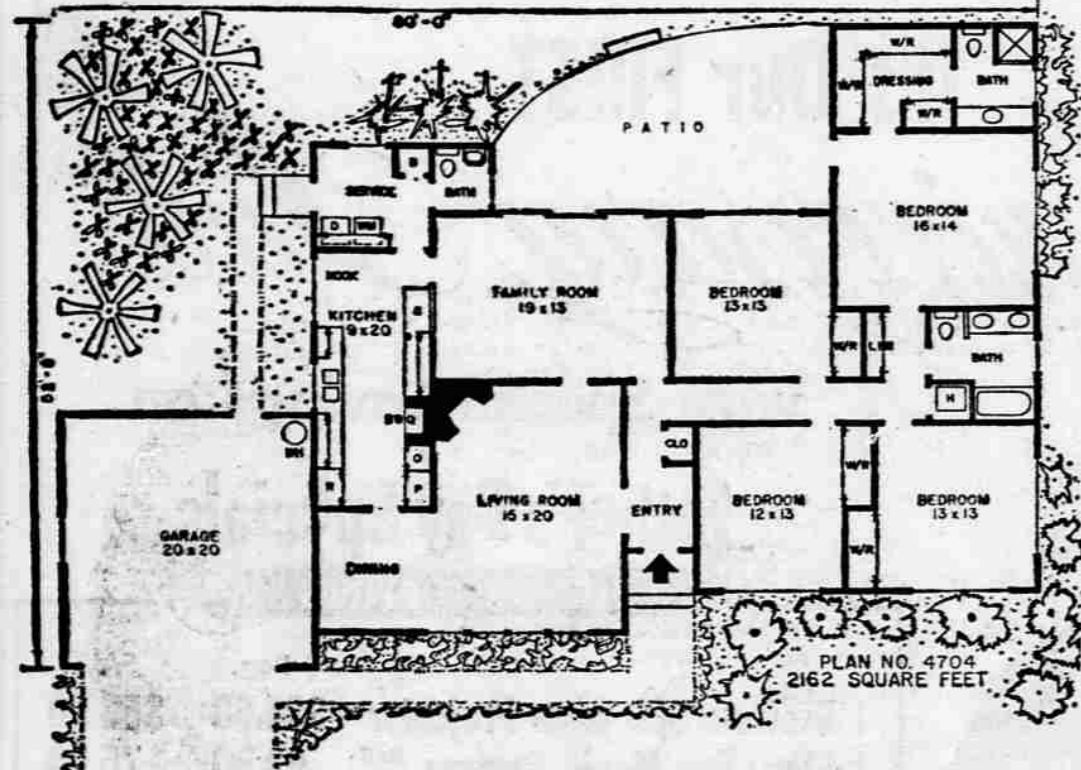

This door could be eliminated if it interferes with furniture arrangements.

Space is available in the service area for a freezer, sewing table, or ??? Supplementing the regular built-in appliances, a pantry, bar-b-q and eating area are features of the kitchen. A cased opening and partial wall opens the kitchen to the family room.

All bedrooms are exceptionally large and will accommodate twin beds. Access to the patio and rear yard is available from the master bedroom. The master bedroom suite has a private dressing room and bath.

An overly large linen storage opens onto the hallway along with a guest closet and space for the forced air heater.

The main bath offers twin pullman lavatories which are separated from the water closet by a partial wall with opaque glass above. A half bath off the service is convenient to the rear yard and kitchen area.

Stone veneer, cedar shake roofing, aluminum casement and louvre windows combine to present an exterior which will be as modern tomorrow
