

Man Indicted for Illegal Stock Sale

Los Angeles - (UPI) - Reno, Nev., businessman Arthur L. Damon, 61, today was under indictment for peddling oil stock without government permission.

The indictment against Damon was returned Wednesday by a federal grand jury. Damon was accused of selling stock in Nev-Teh, a Utah corporation, although the Securities and Exchange Commission had not authorized him to do so.

He manipulated the stock's price on the Salt Lake City Stock Exchange before selling it, the indictment charged.

The indictment further declared that Damon gained control of the company and caused the market price to raise above 45 cents on the Salt Lake City Exchange "through the use of flamboyant and misleading reports" in the mail and by oral statements.

Little Rock School Laws Thrown Out

Little Rock, Ark. - (UPI) - A three judge federal district court today threw out two laws under which Gov. Orval Faubus closed the four Little Rock public high schools last fall and enjoined anyone from preventing gradual integration of the schools.

The ruling was in a decree received at the district clerk's office today. It followed a hearing May 4 on the validity of the two acts of the special session of the Arkansas Legislature.

Act 4 permitted the governor to close the schools, and Act 5 allowed the state to withhold public funds from closed schools.

The ruling voided the governor's proclamation closing the schools. The superintendent of the schools and the school board "and their successors" were ordered to "effectuate the plan of integration" for the public schools of Little Rock.

Oregon Strawberry Receipts Falling

Portland - (UPI) - Receipts of strawberries at Oregon processing plants so far are sharply below those up to the same time a year ago, Carl J. Hansen, representative of the local USIA Fruit and Vegetable Market News service, said today.

Hansen said prices paid the producers were generally unchanged at 13 cents a pound for No. 1 grade fruit 4.0-b. plant. Some premium berries have brought 14 cents and some less desirable berries have gone at 12 cents.

Oregon growers have hauled 13,974,738 pounds of strawberries to canneries and freezing plants so far this season, compared to 52,413,519 pounds at this time a year ago.

Young Bicyclists Head for Portland

Walla Walla - (UPI) - Two Walla Walla youngsters Wednesday began the second leg of their 380-mile bicycle journey to Portland where they will "take in the Centennial and visit relatives."

Sally Jeanne McGovern, 15, and her brother, Loren, 12, pedaled away from Pomeroy Hill Tuesday and spent the night here. They expect to complete the trip Saturday or Sunday.

The travelers carried sleeping bags, letters from their parents to ministers asking permission to sleep in the ministers' yards, and an 1859 penny which they want to give to Mayor Terry Schruck of Portland.

2 Portland Firms Hike Milk Prices

Portland - (UPI) - Two more Portland milk distributors boosted the price of milk 1 cent a quart this week following the price boost pattern set last week by the Dairy Cooperative association. The increase brought the price to 26 cents a quart.

Carnation Co. increased its retail milk prices, except for sizes smaller than a quart, Wednesday. Sunnyside Farms put the increase into effect Monday.

The Dairy Co-Op reported its price increase June 9, noting it was the first in more than a year.
