Teamsters Eye Life Insurance

San Francisco — Teamsters from 13 western states have threatened to set up their own life insurance business if they cannot get better rates on policies for members.

Einar Mohn, chairman of the Western Conference of Teamsters, said the membership will vote on the proposal at the annual meeting July 7-10.

Mohn said that some 200,000 of the 352,000 members hold \$1,000 life insurance policies through individual locals. He said that the insurance companies insist that the business be transacted through a broker.

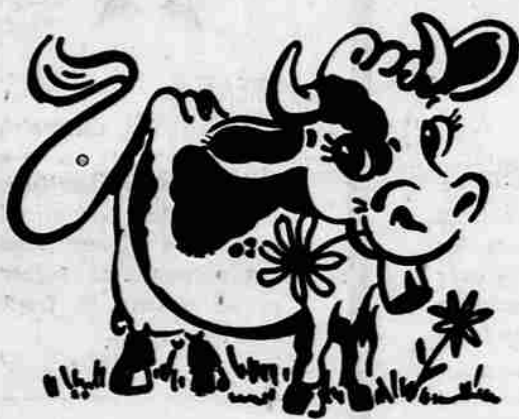
"If they're going to saddle us with paying brokerage fees on millions of dollars for services we don't need, we're going to do something about it," he said.

He said the members would vote on a plan adopted by a policy committee and executive board which would put the 200,000 policies up for open bid.

Louisiana Governor, Shrieking And Cursing, Placed in Asylum

Baton Rouge, La.—(UPI)—Gov. Earl Long, seized by deputies and committed on his wife's warrant in one of the wildest days in Louisiana's turbulent political history, was behind insane asylum bars in his home state today.

Shrieking and cursing, Long was intercepted just three miles outside this capital after he had freed himself from a New Orleans hospital, declared he was the governor "right now," and roared off

in a state highway patrol car for Baton Rouge to entrench himself in office.

Gave Hog Call

The silver-haired Long, 63, gave a piercing hog call, "Whoeeee," and yelled "God damn, God damn," as officers took him away to the Southern State hospital at Mandeville, La., to be held "indefinitely."

Long's violent removal from power stunned the people of Louisiana as nothing had done since his older brother, Huey (Kingfish) Long was assassinated in a corridor of the capitol in 1935.

Remains Governor in Name

Long remained governor in name today. The state constitution provides a governor remains in office until death, resignation or impeachment.

Lt. Gov. Lether Frazer will resume the post of acting governor he has held since Long was taken forcibly to a hospital in Galveston, Tex., 20 days ago. Long is serving his third term as governor and had been preparing to resign so he could run a fourth time.

Long left the Ochsner Foundation hospital in New Orleans late Thursday in a state police car.

An 80-mile-an-hour race up the "Airline highway" along the Mississippi from New Orleans to Baton Rouge between Long and his wife, Blanche, followed and kept the whole state government in suspense. Mrs. Long won by just enough margin to sign the commitment warrant authorizing sheriff's deputies of East Baton Rouge parish to nab her husband.

Charged Political Plot

The wild-eyed Long had accused his wife and political enemies of plotting against him and there was fear of what he might do in revenge if he reached his office and tried to use his power as commander of the state police and the Louisiana National Guard.

A hastily appointed coroner's commitment commission consisting of Coroner Chester William and Dr. Stachman Wyatt, examined Long in the back seat of the white Ford after he was stopped and taken to the East Baton Rouge parish courthouse.

The commission declared Long was suffering from paranoia and schizophrenia.

Crowd Gathers

A crowd of more than 300 gathered around the courthouse as the governor was examined. When he was pulled out of the highway patrol car with four wily officers, there were cries of "no, no, they can't do that to the governor."

One man was arrested for getting too close to the car.

State police threw a heavy cord around the state hospital at Mandeville an hour before the governor was whisked through its gates.

UPI Correspondent William Cook gained entrance to the hospital and was told that Long was "angry and hard to handle."

Dr. Charles Belcher, assistant supervisor, said the governor was in a room by himself which had been until recently a storeroom. He was under "constant attention," Belcher said. Four doctors examined him.

Little Rock School Board Studies Ruling

Little Rock, Ark.—(UPI)—The Little Rock School Board today planned further study of a federal court ruling that opened the way for opening of integrated high schools here next fall, but the board president said an integration program now appears certain.

A three-judge federal court Thursday killed two of the state laws which Gov. Orval Faubus used to close the schools last year.

The court also reminded the school board that it is under a Supreme Court mandate to integrate and members are enjoined from delaying or sidestepping the mandate.

No Alternative

"I see no alternative but to proceed with some plan of integration," Board President Everett Tucker Jr. said when the decision was announced.

Tucker called a meeting of the board Thursday afternoon but said afterward that no action was taken on the federal court decision.

"We just kicked it around and didn't come to any definite conclusions," Tucker said.

He said the board would meet again with its attorneys as soon as they have a chance to study the decision.

Appeal Seen Certain

Tucker said he feels certain that the federal court decision will be appealed.

The laws the federal court knocked out were Acts 4 and 5 in a "package" that Faubus had passed in a special session of the Arkansas Legislature last fall. He used the same laws to keep the schools closed last term.

Act 4 allowed the governor to close the schools to keep Negroes out and Act 5 allowed him to withhold public funds from closed schools.

Acts Unconstitutional

The new court ruling said that Act 4 is clearly unconstitutional under the due process and equal protection clauses of the 14th Amendment and conferred no authority upon the governor to close the public high schools in Little Rock."

Act 5 complements Act 4 and for the same reason is unconstitutional, the court said.

Living Costs Soar To Record Figure

Washington — (UPI)—Living costs edged up to a new all-time high in May, the government reported today.

Higher prices were reported for all major categories of consumer spending, including food, clothing, housing, medical care and transportation.

The consumer price index, based on a 1947-49 price average of 100, rose one-tenth of a point from April to a May reading of 124.0, a new high.

Hike Said Seasonal

Labor Department price Chief H. E. Riley said the increase was seasonal and that "for all practical purposes" the stability living costs over the past year has not been broken.

The price index hit 123.9 in July 1958, which was a new high at that time.

The department also reported that take home pay and buying power of factory workers climbed to new highs last month. Take home pay averaged \$81.03 for a worker with three dependents, about 9 per cent higher in dollars and purchasing power than a year ago.

Pay Boost Due

The upward trend of the price index means some 100,000 aircraft manufacturing workers will get a pay boost of one cent an hour. Their wages are tied by contract to the cost of living.

Food prices rose slightly in May after declining in eight of the previous nine months. The 0.1 per cent rise stemmed from higher prices for restaurant meals, fresh fruits and vegetables.

The increase would have been even greater except for a sharp decline in egg prices.

Clothing Costs More

All classes of clothing cost more in May, the report said, with shoes, especially men's and children's, posting the biggest increases.

Housing costs rose because of advances in prices of home repair and maintenance, gas, electricity and insurance. Residential rents showed no average increase for the first time since February 1957.

The cost of medical care rose 0.4 per cent, mainly because of higher physicians' fees. Some mark ups for drugs and hospital rates also were reported.

Riley said there was "nothing very unusual" in the May rise. The index has dipped in May only once in 12 years and has held steady only once, he added.

Wall Street Chatter

New York — (UPI)— Investors have trained their sights on outer space.

Chemical Fund, Inc., a mutual fund, points out that much of the present interest in space age stocks is speculative, being concentrated in a small group of companies active in rocket and fuel development.

The fund says investors seeking to participate in this new growth field on an investment rather than speculative basis should diversify their attention on a diversified list of well established chemical and related companies which should be among the chief beneficiaries of this new science.

The Fitch survey recommends the following 12 "low-priced stock favorites": American Metal-Climax, American Zinc, Baldwin-Lima, Dover Corp., Elastic Stop Nut, Harco, Harnischfeger, Lamson & Sessions, Poor & Co., Standard Products and Smith-Douglas.

In the oils, Fitch likes Argo, Getty, Pure, Indiana Standard and Union Oil, while in the missile stocks it recommends Boeing, Martin and Lockheed for speculation and McDonnell and North American for long-term appreciation.

Three attractive issues which should benefit from the capital goods recovery now getting underway are Cooper-Bessemer, Eagle-Picher and Pullman Inc., according to Shearson, Hammill & Co.

Bache & Co. notes that such steel issues as U.S. Steel, Allegheny Ludlum and Universal Cyclops maintained strong technical patterns during the recent sell-off and should continue to give a better account of themselves than the market in general.

Playboy Fined For Drunk Driving

Malibu, Calif. — (UPI)— Millionaire playboy Frederick Tillinghast III, who allegedly threatened to have a state high patrol officer sent to the breadlines, was convicted Thursday of drunk driving.

He was fined \$263.

The oilman-stockbroker was arrested May 15 by Officer George McClelland.

"I have \$44 million, you poor cop, more money than you'll ever see in your lifetime, and I'll have you on a breadline tomorrow," he allegedly told McClelland.
