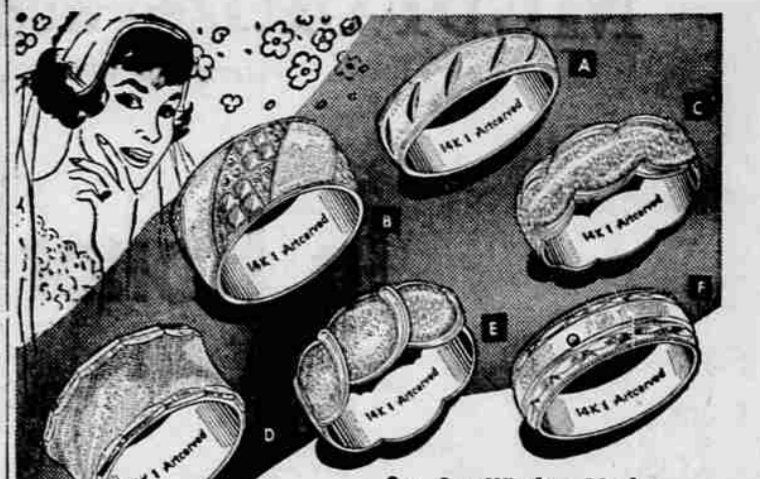
coast, the bride wearing for traveling a salmon colored jacket dress with matching and white accessories. They are living at 335 South Ivy street, Apartment 3.
