Fuchs Heads for Iron Curtain

London (UPI)—Klaus Fuchs, the man who gave the atom bomb secret to the Russians, was released from prison today and left for permanent residence behind the Iron Curtain.
A spokesman for the East German foreign ministry announced in East Berlin that Fuchs would go behind the Iron Curtain into Communist East Germany tonight or Wednesday.
Wakefield prison officials confirmed that the 48-year-old German-born nuclear scientist was taken from prison under guard today. He had spent nine years in prison.
The government announced some time ago that Fuchs, who had served about two-thirds of a 14 year prison term, would be released "by the end of June" and allowed to go wherever he chose.

Nyssa Youngsters Drown in River

Nyssa (UPI)—Two stepchildren of Angel Martinez, Nyssa area farm worker, drowned in the Snake river Monday when they stepped into deep water while wading. Martinez managed to pluck a third stepchild from the swift current.
Drowned were Magdalena Martinez, 11, and her 13-year-old brother, Reyes. The stepfather was able to grab little Guadalupe, 9, but the older two were swept out of reach downstream.

Medford Secretary Takes Solo Flight

Sally Adams, Medford's 21-year-old week end pilot, had a successful solo flight yesterday about 7 p.m. Miss Adams is the port local secretary who had never ridden in a small plane before last Saturday.
Jim Duncan of Rogue Flying Service, who furnished the plane and instructor, said about 15 or 20 people were on hand yesterday to watch. Miss Adams flew solo for 15 minutes, including during this time three take-offs and three landings.
Sally had hoped to take enough flight instruction Saturday and Sunday to be able to fly solo by Sunday afternoon. Duncan said she might have done so, but high winds Sunday prohibited it.
