### Prisoner Hurt In Springfield Riot Succumbs

Springfield, Mo.—(UPI)—A prisoner hurt when lawmen crushed a 16-hour riot in the homosexual wing of the U. S. Medical Center died Wednesday night of a fractured skull.

He was Richard Smith of Salt Lake City, a 24-year-old inmate serving seven years for threatening to kill or harm the President of the United States.

**No Explanation**  
Meanwhile, Warden Russell O. Settle said he is in no hurry to take action against the ring-leaders of the riot. He said he and his staff have found no rational explanation for the outbreak.

He said Earl C. Taylor, 31, of Phenix City, Ala., "one of the most vicious prisoners in the entire federal prison system," was the principal ring-leader. Taylor's two lieutenants were identified as Bryan D. Reed, 24-year-old murderer from Los Angeles, and Carl Roberts, 19, of Kansas City, who is serving time for car theft.

Smith was injured when 100 officers stormed the wing where 106 homosexual and mental patients held five guards captive with knives at their throats. It was not made clear how Smith was injured; whether by officers in the attack force, by another prisoner, or by accident.

**Inmates Questioned**  
Settle said he was in no hurry to take action against the rioters because "mental responsibility" is involved.

A board of inquiry continued to question inmates searching for the reason behind the riot.

"I think it was just a compulsive, aggressive act," Settle said.

"They haven't been able to name any of the demands they said they would make, nor give a rational reason."

### Two Stockholder Suits on File

Eugene—(UPI)—Two stockholder suits were filed in circuit court here Wednesday against the Booth-Kelly Lumber company of Springfield.

Georgia-Pacific Corporation, one of the stockholders, filed a petition asking that Booth-Kelly be forced to produce a record of its stockholders for examination.

Circuit Judge Alfred T. Goodwin granted a writ directing Booth-Kelly to produce the record of stockholders and the bylaws or show cause why the petitions should not be allowed. He set a hearing on both suits for next Monday.

Georgia-Pacific charged in its suit that Booth-Kelly officials refused to allow Georgia-Pacific representatives to examine the list and Miller said the same thing about the bylaws.

### Oregon Teamster Probe May Reopen

Washington—(UPI)—The chief counsel for the Senate Labor Rackets committee said Wednesday there was a "definite possibility" that the committee might reopen its investigation into Teamsters union activities in Oregon.

Counsel Robert F. Kennedy said he might know by late next week whether the committee headed by Sen. John McClelland (D-Ark.) would renew the Oregon Teamsters probe.

If the committee does decide to reopen the case, Kennedy said the first witnesses would probably be called the week of July 6. He would not disclose the nature of the questions that would be put to Oregon witnesses.

### More Than 30,000 Acres of Alaskan Forests on Fire

Fairbanks, Alaska—(UPI)—Forest fires touched off by lightning had advanced over more than 30,000 acres today in scattered areas of Alaska.

Fred Varney, chief fire control officer of the Bureau of Land Management, recruited natives from villages throughout the 49th state and turned to Oregon, California and Montana for help in building an army to stem the destruction.

Three fires accounted for two-thirds of the burned and burning acreage. Two blazes of 8,000 acres each were raging near the junction of Stony and Kuskokwim rivers and the Taylor mountains in interior Alaska. A third fire of about 5,000 acres was advancing near Hughes.

**Animals Roasted**  
Many smaller fires were reported in other regions.

Observers who flew over burning areas reported that many animals were seen racing ahead of the flames, but some were turned and roasted to death. The wildlife in some areas is vital to the livelihood of natives.

The forests of most of Alaska's timbered regions have been left exceptionally dry by a prolonged warm spell with maximum temperatures in the 80s.

### ASNE URGES ACTION

Washington—(UPI)—The president of the American Society of Newspaper Editors has urged quick Senate action on a recommendation by the Senate Rules Committee that payroll information on Senate employees be made available to the public. J. R. Wiggins, the ASNE president and executive editor of the Washington Post and Times Herald, called the committee's action "gratifying."

### Goldwater Raps Senator Morse

Washington—(UPI)—Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) has endangered the dignity and reputation of the Senate with "personal invective" and "intemperate language," Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) charged Wednesday.

In a blast at the Oregon senior senator, Goldwater listed what he called recent examples of "name calling" by Morse.

"There are those who believe certain recent performances on the floor of the Senate have been unconscionable and tend to undermine the reputation of this assembly," Goldwater said. "It seems to me, therefore, that the time has come for those, like myself, who are thoroughly conscious of the rights and privileges of American citizens, to speak out whenever intemperate language or name calling is used in debate."

Morse said he was "amused" by the attack and had no intention of discontinuing "calling a spade a spade."

Morse countered Goldwater's remarks by challenging him to introduce a resolution for censure.

Few senators were in the Chamber when Goldwater delivered the attack.

### Eastern Oregon Fires Controlled

Portland—(UPI)—Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service officials said Wednesday that all range and timber blazes in Eastern and Central Oregon were under control but that fire danger remained high.

Clarence Edgington, fire dispatcher for the forest service here, said the largest fire, a 230-acre blaze at the southern edge of the Malheur National forest 15 miles northeast of Burns, was in the mop-up stage. The fire was caused by lightning, he said.

### 11.3 Million Tree Seedlings Shipped From State's Nurseries This Season

Salem—More than 11.3 million forest tree seedlings were shipped from Oregon's two state forestry department nurseries near Corvallis and Elkton during the past planting season for the reforestation of state and privately owned forest lands, according to Assistant State Forester C. D. Maus.

"This represents a production increase of nearly twice that of last year," Maus stated, "and is in response to the tremendous demand for planting stock which has been expressed by private landowners who purchased more than 5.6 million seedlings."

The largest single outlet for the trees has been the multi-million dollar rehabilitation project that is being carried out by the state forestry department.

### Faubus Promises No Cooperation With Integration

Little Rock, Ark.—(UPI)—Gov. Orval Faubus said Wednesday the federal government would have to use "live ammunition" to force integration on Little Rock's four high schools this fall and he would do nothing to help quell possible mob violence.

Faubus, handed two recent setbacks in his fight to maintain segregation in Little Rock, said if the schools should be opened on an integrated basis in September, it would be forced by the federal government and would not be the will of the people.

**Laws Thrown Out**  
Last month, Little Rock voters recalled segregationist members of the Little Rock school board and replaced them with "moderates." Last week, a three judge federal court threw out two 1958 Arkansas laws Faubus used to close the four Little Rock High schools and withhold state money from the school district.

The new school board said it apparently paves the way to reopen the schools this fall under a federal integration order.

But Faubus said this is not necessarily so.

**Opening No Nearer**  
"In spite of the federal court ruling, I don't think we are any nearer to being integrated now than we were in 1957," Faubus said. "We had a plan and a court order then, and we still did not open."

"They used troops in 1957 and marshals in 1958. What they will use if forced integration comes this year, I don't know. But I do know that the integration will be forced, and it will be with live ammunition."

### Central Point Man Appointed

Salem—(UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield Wednesday made six appointments to the Military General Staff of Oregon.

They are all for two year terms starting June 25.

Col. John S. Panek, Portland, will replace Col. Gerald P. Cochran, resigned.

Col. Francis C. Ayres, Central Point, will replace Col. Paul L. Kliever, resigned.

Col. Waldo E. Timm, Portland, was reappointed.

Lt. Col. Richard H. Johanssen, Vancouver, Wash., will replace Col. Carl V. Shoemaker, resigned.

Lt. Col. David Baum, La Grande, will replace Brigadier Gen. Alfred E. Hintz, who resigned to become adjutant general of the Oregon National Guard, a position that is automatically on the general staff.

Lt. Col. Donald N. Anderson, Portland, was also reappointed.

### Seven Named To Bentgrass Group

Salem—(UPI)—Seven appointments to the newly created Highland Bentgrass commission were made by Gov. Mark Hatfield Wednesday.

Named by the governor were: Fred Goffin, Salem; Walter Dozler, Seio; Howard Jenks, Salem; Fred Hottinger, Stayton; Russell Lehman, Dayton; Walter McElhaney, Sublimity, and James Neal, Salem.

The commission was created as a result of a referendum held by the State Department of Agriculture. Six of its members are growers or producers and one member is a handler.

### No Progress in Tillamook Talks

Tillamook—(UPI)—Representatives of the Teamsters union and the Tillamook County Creamery association met with a federal mediator here for four hours Wednesday to discuss the 55-day-old walkout against the association.

Association manager Bealle Dickson said "nothing was accomplished."

It was the first union-management meeting in several weeks. Another meeting was scheduled for Friday.

The strike started May 1 when 17 men in the fluid milk department struck in a wage dispute. Another 160 workers joined the walkout but the creamery has been operating with management personnel and farmers.

The Teamsters' boycott on Tillamook cheese, an outgrowth of the strike here, has been condemned by Tillamook Mayor Loren McKinley and others as a secondary boycott.
